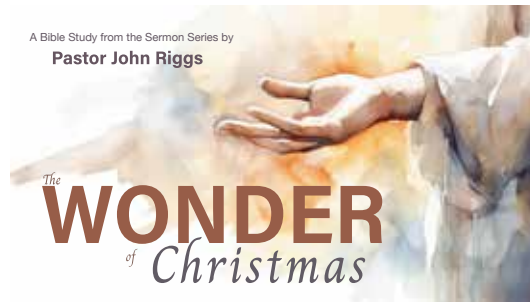




A Bible Study from the Sermon Series by

The Word became flesh: What is the incarnation of Christ?

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14)

1. The incarnation was God's plan established before the foundation of the world (Ephesians 1:3-4).
2. The incarnation is both miraculous and mysterious; God coming down and taking on human flesh (Philippians 2:5-8).
3. Christ was in the incarnation both fully God and fully man. (John 1: 1-3, 1:14).

Why the incarnation of Christ was necessary

"The land shall not be sold in perpetuity, for the land is mine. For you are strangers and sojourners with me. And in all the country you possess, you shall allow a redemption of the land.

"If your brother becomes poor and sells part of his property, then his nearest redeemer shall come and redeem what his brother has sold." (Leviticus 25:23-25)

1. The Kinsman Redeemer: Read Leviticus 25:23-25 and Ruth 4:25
2. Genealogy of Christ: Read Matthew 1:1-16
3. As you read, begin to make the connection in Leviticus and Ruth with three things:
 - A. Genealogy: the bloodline is important in order to redeem
 - B. Legal: the person must actually be able to pay the debt
 - C. Willing: is the person willing to redeem what was lost
