

BIBLE STUDIES

12-Week Bible Study: David, A Man After God's Heart

This Bible study examines David's life, exploring His faith, struggles, and his role in God's redemptive plan. Each week focuses on a key theme and includes relevant Scripture passages. The group meets in the lower level, Room 8, beginning at 6:30 p.m. each Wedneday. What we discover can be helpful in navigating our own trials, troubles and triumphs as we study God's Heart and Ways. Isaiah 55:8-9 tells us, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways My ways, declares the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways and My thoughts than your thoughts." Join us at any time as we gather together.

Ladies Bible Study

Every first and third Tuesday from September through May, Chapel's ladies love to gather for study and fellowship. In 2024, we began a new study of "Heroines of Faith" in the Bible. Why should we study biblical heroines of faith? Because it is a Bible study about some ordinary women who can edify and encourage our walk with God and each other in some extraordinary ways. Such a celebration of the work of redemption that God brings about in and through the lives of saints points to our Lord, Jesus Christ. From January through May, we studied: Sarai/Sarah (c. 2166 B.C.) with the themes of resistance and courage. Deborah and Jael (c. 1209-1159 B.C.) with themes of leadership, and Ruth (c. 1209-1159 B.C.) considering the themes of loyalty, love, and redemption.

Our study has introduced us to Hannah (c. 1100 B.C.) around the theme of prayer, Abigail (c. 1050-1010 B. C.) under the theme of peacemaking, Esther (c. 486-465 B.C.) with the themes of providence and obedience, Mary, Mother of Jesus (c. 4 B.C.), with the topics of obedience and family. This September 16, 2025, we resumed with Mary Magdalene (30-33 A.D.) under the topics of service and faith. Then finally we will finish with Women of Godly Character with the themes of character and beauty.

When you join our ladies you will quickly see that our study is not intended to move quickly, but rather at a pace allowing for discussion, laughter, sharing, and prayer. Please feel free to join us at any time. ****

THE GOSPEL OF CHRIST JESUS

What is sin?

Sin is the breaking of God's Law in rebellion to God's will. "Whoever keeps the whole Law but stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it" (James 2:10). "Therefore, no one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the Law, rather through the Law we become conscious of sin" (Romans 3:20).

From the inherited "original sin" of Adam we have been corrupted and depraved.

By our own free will, we sin in thought, word, and deed against God's Law. We desire nothing of God's will. We are lost and condemned creatures unable to fulfill God's Law; unable to save ourselves from the agony of eternal death. God hates sin, and we will be held accountable for the sins which we commit.

"For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23). From the Law and the Prophets, the righteousness of God has been made known. "This righteousness of God is given through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe" (Romans 3:22). "God presented Christ as a sacrifice of atonement, through the shedding of His blood – to be received by faith" (Romans 3: 25).

What is Grace?

Grace is the unmerited, unending favor and kindness through which God offers hope, redemption and transformation.

Since the fall of Adam, God had compassion on mankind and through His mercy and grace sent His Son to redeem mankind from their sins. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16).

In our stead, Jesus lived the perfect life which we could not, and He bore the judgement of God's wrath for our sins. Jesus suffered the pains of eternal death which were meant for us. "For our sake God [the Father] made him [Christ] to be sin, who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:19).

Christ Jesus was raised from death on the third day for our justification, declaring us righteous before God. "By grace you have been saved through faith, and not of yourselves: it is a gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast" (Ephesians 2: 8-9).

What is Faith?

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). It is the object of your faith, Jesus Christ, that saves you, not the strength of your faith. God's Word, Baptism, and Holy Communion are given to you for the strengthening of your faith. Through contrition and repentance, the Holy Spirit daily sanctifies us until life eternal. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" (2 Corinthians 5:17) ***

"By faith Abraham, even though he was past age--and Sarah herself was barren--was enabled to become a father because he considered him faithful who had made the promise."

"By faith Isaac blessed Jacob and Esau in regard to their future."

"By faith Jacob, when he was dying, blessed each of Joseph's sons, and worshiped as he leaned on the top of his staff."

"By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter." ... just to list a few.

While the LAMP Mission trips did not go as planned this summer due to the ongoing wildfires in Northern Manitoba, we were still able to travel to the town of Churchill to bring the Good News of Jesus to the children there. This was the first time since 2019 that a LAMP team was able to get to Churchill.

The team consisted of Ellen and Mike Kehe. We knew this was going to be a "reintroduction" year, a time to reconnect with the community and the children, all of whom were too young to attend Bible Camp the last time a LAMP team was there. Our purpose, in addition to being with the children, was to build and make plans for future years, in the hope that word would spread that the LAMP team is back, and would be coming back each summer.



Just as in any LAMP Mission trip, our primary mission was the Bible School week with the children. Due to the flight schedule, we arrived in Churchill Tuesday afternoon, which meant our Bible School "week" was going to be Wednesday – Sunday. We spent the day Tuesday learning where we would be holding Bible School, setting up, and walking the town to spread the word, and we found out that posters about our Bible School were up around town.

We had no idea how many children we were going to see on that first day, though we found out that there was a community children's camp that was happening the first three days of our time. We prayed that God would lead children to us, and He delivered quality in place of quantity. We had a total of 8 children through the week that participated, and while the number is not overwhelming, the interaction with each of the children was remarkable.



Most of these children were very new to anything we had to share about God, the stories we had, and Jesus' love for them. The question from one of the girls, "what is sin," stands out in my mind as an example of the opportunities that we had to share the Gospel with them as they soaked it all in



The children were all 8, 9, or 10 years old – what a perfect age to tell them about Jesus, answer all their questions, and just have fun together. That's what we did, and Lord willing, we will be able to go back to do next summer! **†††**
