THE ULTIMATE REVELATION

When watching a mystery show on TV or in the theater, the climactic moment occurs when all the characters are finally assembled at the end. The detective holds everyone's attention as he lays out, point by point, how the events took place. All the minute details individuals couldn't recognize in the moment, the sly gumshoe uncovered behind the scenes. The suspense builds as the facts are revealed, until the detective ultimately pulls off a mask while everyone present gasps: Old Man Johnson?!

Directly after the chaotic events of the Holy Week, Luke records similar events experienced by two disciples returning home from the Jerusalem Passover celebration. The story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus is one of my favorites in the Bible. Every time I hear it, I imagine myself travelling with Cleopas and his partner, whose name is unrevealed, experiencing what they did that night. They were discussing the events of the weekend when a mysterious man, the very subject of their story, joined them. Upon hearing the distress and confusion expressed by His disciples, Jesus, the Good Teacher, directed their attention toward Scripture, as He constantly does, to reintroduce them to the true Savior they were promised, rather than the creation of expectations of their own minds.

Did He begin His revelation in Scripture with the verse He used to begin His ministry? "The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor" (Isaiah 61:1–2). The Messiah is anointed of the Holy Spirit, yet also the Son of God and King of all: "I will proclaim the Lord's decree: He said to me, 'You are my son; today I have become your father. Ask me, and I will make the nations your inheritance, the ends of the earth your possession'" (Psalm 2:7–8). He is the Son of Man who will rule the nations (Daniel 7:13–14). He came to earth to establish God's new covenant with us, that we may know Him and His commandments and He will forgive our sins (Jeremiah 31:31–34).

From the very beginning of the story of salvation, Jesus He has been a part of it. He is the instrument through which God promised Abraham: "I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you" (Genesis 12:3). He is the star coming out of Jacob (Numbers 24:17), the scepter which will not depart from Judah (Genesis 49:10), and the greater offspring of David who will establish His kingdom forever (2 Samuel 7:12–16).

Perhaps Jesus directed them toward the Old Testament stories foretelling His life. God's provision of a sacrificial ram in place of Abraham's beloved son Isaac on Mt Moriah. Jesus as the embodiment of Jacob's ladder, on which we are now allowed to ascend. Jesus, the Passover lamb, sacrificed to save His people. He is the manna, the living bread. He is the rock in the desert, struck to bring forth living water. Ultimately, He was raised up like the bronze snake to heal His people.

He is Immanuel, born of a virgin (Isaiah 7:14) in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2). He was subject of a plot to murder Him (Jeremiah 31:15) but was protected and later called out of Egypt (Hosea 11:1). He healed during His ministry (Isaiah 35:1–6). He was praised by the masses on Palm Sunday (Psalm 118:25–29) while entering the city humbly riding on a donkey (Zechariah 9:9).

Then, in the final act, Jesus was rejected by the Jewish leaders, and despised. He took on all the sins of humanity (Isaiah 53). He experienced scorn and disgrace (Psalm 69:19–21) while being mocked and forsaken (Psalm 22) and He died. But one additional prophesy is revealed: "I keep my eyes always on the Lord. With him at my right hand, I will not be shaken. Therefore my heart is glad and my tongue rejoices; my body also will rest secure, because you will not abandon me to the realm of the dead, nor will you let your faithful one see decay (Psalm 16:8–11).

In my mind I see, with every revelation from Scripture, the disciples experiencing more and more awe at the intricate plan of salvation that was laid out in front of them. Their uncertainty regarding Jesus' station as the Messiah melts away in the face of the ancient Spirit-inspired writings and His true mission becomes clear to them. After they stop for the night and Jesus blesses their dinner, the veil is fully removed, and the elation of the disciples is unbridled. "Were not our hearts burning within us while He talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32)

As we traverse the season of Lent into Holy Week and Easter and beyond, we acknowledge Jesus' selfless sacrifice and extraordinary love, but also the plan of salvation that God devised. He refused to lose us because of our sins and was willing to pay the highest price to redeem us. May your Lent and Holy Week be especially meaningful this year, and save an extra Alleluia for the Easter season!

God's blessings to you, in the worship we offer to God and in the life we lead to His glory. **†††**

I read a recent post about someone wondering how Operation Christmas Child decides who gets to receive a shoebox, and whether there is an income bracket criteria. In response to that, let me share my experience of receiving a shoebox as a child in the Philippines.

I was 6 years old when I received my shoebox. Our group of kids were not poor; we were middle class in the city. Our families had secure jobs, paid thousands

for private school education, and vacationed to different countries abroad. However, we were poor in the gospel. The shoebox gifts were used as tools for us to get to feel God's great love. We were taught about how Jesus died on the cross to save us from our sins.

OCC may primarily send boxes to poor communities (and that is a wonderful thing), but we must remember that these shoeboxes are not aid. These are gifts of gospel opportunities. Every person, regardless of background, deserves to hear the gospel.





IT'S THE REAL THING

Seems like these days we are being constantly barraged with news and advertisements touting Artificial Intelligence, or Al. Al isn't a new concept. It was discussed in some of my Computer Science classes back in the late 1970s. In fact, the term "Artificial Intelligence" can be traced back to 1956, the year I was born.

The concept of AI has always been met with at least a bit of skepticism. I recall comments being made like "I'll take human intelligence over artificial intelligence any day." Some of you may recall when in 1988 an AI powered computer first beat a human grandmaster in a game of chess. That was a big deal. Today we have AI controlling actual vehicles. Sometimes they behave nicely and sometimes they run through red lights and crash into things. But what else can you expect considering AI is based on human intelligence which is flawed by sin.

Similarly, there is Godly wisdom and human (artificial) wisdom. Just as AI is subject to our human flaws, human wisdom is corrupted by sinful motives and ideas. While there is much pressure to live our lives based on human wisdom, we must be very careful in its application; for human wisdom values self, possessions, pride, self-reliance and status, but Godly wisdom turns all that around.

"But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere." James 3:17

"For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength." 1 Corinthians 1:25

In His Sermon on the Mount Jesus taught...

"Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock." Matthew 7:24

The next time you are tempted by human ("artificial") wisdom, consider these words from King Solomon who was truly gifted with Godly wisdom.

"Blessed are those who find wisdom, those who gain understanding, for she is more profitable than silver and yields better returns than gold. She is more precious than rubies; nothing you desire can compare with her." Proverbs 3: 13-18.

And how do we find this wisdom?

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; all who follow His precepts have good understanding." Psalms 111:10

"If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you." James 1:5

Don't be led astray by human wisdom which can lead you where you don't want to go. Rather, seek God's wisdom as revealed by the Holy Spirit through Word and sacrament and prayer. Just like Coca'Cola, Godly wisdom is the real thing.

The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.
