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### **CHAPEL TRAVELERS' TRIP TO HANNIBAL**

On a cloudy and storm threatened Monday, May 19, members and friends drove the scenic and peaceful route to Hannibal, Missouri using three borrowed white vans.

As we neared the historic town, nestled along the banks of the Mississippi River we rounded the curve to find a quiet place with a powerful legacy. It's the boyhood home of Samuel Clemens, better known to the world as Mark Twain, whose adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn captured the spirit of a restless, changing America.

Twain once wrote, "The river has a new story to tell every day." And it's true - the Mississippi is always flowing, always shifting, just like our lives. Culture changes. Values shift. What's popular one day is forgotten the next.

Yet in the midst of all this, we hear the words of Hebrews 13:8: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever."

What a comfort for us as Christians. In a world that feels more like a winding river than a solid road, Christ is our anchor. Unlike the characters in Twain's novels – always searching for identity, security, meaning, and adventure, or even escape – we are found. God finds us, calls us, names us, and grounds us in the unchanging truth of God's Word.

Twain was famous for his wit and skepticism. He often questioned religion, and yet he observed human nature with startling accuracy. He once said, "It's not the parts of the Bible I don't understand that bother me - it's the parts I do." In a way, that's a deeply Lutheran insight. God's Word doesn't need to be made more complicated - it simply needs to be heard, studied, and taken seriously.

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

HEBREWS 13:8

And when we do, we discover a Savior who doesn't change, whose grace doesn't run dry, whose promises are not washed away by time or tide. Christ's death on the cross and His resurrection are once-for-all events - sufficient for all people, in all times.



In a town like Hannibal, where steamboats used to come and go, and where tourists now walk streets once traveled by barefoot boys with fishing poles, we're reminded that everything earthly fades.

But as LCMS Lutherans, we proclaim a hope that doesn't fade: Salvation by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone.

Let's pray: Lord Jesus Christ, in a world that changes by the minute, we thank You that You remain the same. You are our constant, our Savior, our firm foundation. Help us to trust in Your unchanging promises and to proclaim Your love boldly – wherever we go - In Jesus' name we pray. Amen. \*\*\*



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
### LAMP MINISTRY UPDATE

Our Chapel of the Cross-based LAMP teams currently have 17 people planning on serving this summer! God continues to open doors leading us to be able to serve at 4 communities this summer: Brochet and Lynn Lake, Manitoba, along with the New-to-us sites of the Marcel Colomb Reserve, which is about 45 minutes from Lynn Lake and Churchill, Manitoba.

However, it has been an unusually dry spring in Manitoba and Ontario, along with extreme wind conditions. As a result, these provinces are fighting multiple wildfires since late May. As of this writing, two of the communities we plan to serve have been affected by the wildfires requiring evacuations.

Our first call is to pray for the people of these communities, and the people who are working tirelessly to protect the communities from destruction by these wildfires. The residents of these communities are sheltered 4 hours away, everyday waiting for the latest word on when they might be able to return.



Our next call to pray for God's guidance for our teams as we prepare and make our way to the people. Pray that God will give us the right words of encouragement and comfort, hope and peace that only comes from our Heavenly Father.

### OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

We have learned the destination for the shoeboxes we packed last November! The tracking information we received has informed us that they were received by children in Madagascar! They were shipped there in December of 2024. Madagascar is an island nation off the southeast coast of Africa. It is also the world's 4th largest island. The nation is 50% Christian, 42% Ethnic religions and 7% Muslim. There are 18 official ethnic groups that comprise the nation of Madagascar. We pray that God would continue to work through the opportunities that each shoebox gift offers, and the ministry partners that are there to share His Good News!

In 2024 the total number shoebox gifts put together and shipped to children was 11,927,439! That also means 11,927,439 Gospel Opportunities!! That is a lot of congregations working together 1,5,10,50 shoeboxes at a time. Here at Chapel in 2024, we packed 135 of those boxes.

Collection of items for shoeboxes for this year's Shoebox packing continues. Each month we focus on different items that can be packed in a shoebox for a gift for children all over the world.

May and June: PERSONAL CARE ITEMS: tooth brush, manicure set, small brush, comb/ pick. (Soap and any liquids not allowed) AND TOYS: Barbie dolls, small baby dolls, matchbox cars, action figures, small lego set, tennis balls, small foam balls, jump rope, and slinkies.

July and August: CLOTHING: t-shirts, shorts, flip flops, skirts, undergarments, socks, simple dresses AND SCHOOL SUPPLIES: small notebooks, paper, pencils, crayons, markers, colored pencils, scissors, pencil sharpeners.

September: SMALL GAMES: cards, uno, small Jenga, matching, tic tac toe, dominoes.

October: donations for shipping.

Our 2025 Shoebox Packing Day will be Sunday, November 2, after the 11am Worship Service. Once again, a light lunch will be served and then the packing will begin! Everyone is welcome to grab a shoebox or two, pack it with items from everything that will be laid out in the gym, and bless a child somewhere in the world! †††

### God's Hand in My Journey

I never had Africa on my bucket list, but God had something special planned for me, and I answered the call. I discovered the Kid Care Team opportunity through LCMS International Missions after attending Jason and Anne Marie Stephenson's commissioning and sending service at Synod. They were set to go to Tanzania, and I felt a calling to support them.

LCMS missionaries in Africa gather twice a year, and the Kid Care Team provides Biblically-based curriculum to the nearly 30 children of our missionary families. I signed up for the October 2024 gathering. During the application process, including interviews and a background check, the Stephensons returned to the U.S. for medical treatment, and it was determined they wouldn't be going back. Prayerfully, I decided to continue my mission to support the other missionary families.

God blessed every aspect of this decision, including an unexpected additional trip to Kenya in April. Emotional, spiritual, and financial support arrived in both big and small ways. From luggage to carry supplies, to full financial backing, I saw God's hand in every detail of planning, travel, and service. And thank you for all the support!

### **Dispelling Myths**

Many images of missionaries in Africa depict isolated communities in "the bush," but most of our missionaries live in towns and cities, teaching local men to become pastors and women to become deaconesses. One missionary even requested theology books for his advanced students, highlighting the educational aspect of their mission.







Life isn't always easy in these urban settings. Water requires daily sterilization, and many roads are not paved and are in poor condition. Despite these challenges, the people I encountered—from the airport to the hotel and beyond—were all very kind.

There was an unspoken understanding that, as a tourist, I needed to be cautious, but God surrounded me with His presence, ensuring my safety.

### Serving the Children

During my first trip, I teamed up with a Director of Christian Education (DCE) from Chicago to lead the younger children. Other team members worked with middle and high school students. Our curriculum centered around "Follow Me," and activities included Bible story reenactments, crafts, songs, and discussions about what it means to follow Jesus. Two eight-year-olds even engaged in a theological discussion about Jesus' willingness to go to the cross, demonstrating how intently they were listening and the depth of their faith.

In Kenya, my focus was on teens with the theme of resilience. These kids face unique challenges as "third-culture" children, balancing life between their home country and their new environment, so they know about resilience. They enjoyed reconnecting with friends but were less enthusiastic about discussing their feelings. To address this, I adjusted the lesson plans to give them more time to socialize while still incorporating discussion and practice of resilience skills.

### **SALT AND LIGHT**


In the first century, a Roman soldier came home and announced that he got paid. His wife asked what he received and he replied, some silver coins and a sack of salt. She exclaimed that she really needed the salt. At that time in history salt was a valuable commodity. The word "salary" originates from the Latin word "salarium," which meant "salt allowance" or "salt money." You might wonder why salt was so valuable. Let's see:

- 1. It was a form of currency (you could exchange it for gold or payment).
- 2. Food preservation
- 3. Flavoring
- 4. Medical uses
- 5. Religious practices (see Lev. 2:13)
- 6. Superstition that it could drive away evil spirits
- 7. Fertilizer and weed killer

Jesus says we are the salt of the earth; He explains why we must preserve others for the Kingdom of God, have a positive impact, preserve our salt (Faith), and share the Gospel.

Jesus also talked about light. In the First Century, oil lamps were a common source of light because they were made of clay and were cheap. Clay lamps were filled with oil. A wick was added for lighting. Now, if you put your lamp on the floor, you receive little light, Jesus suggests that you put your lamp on a lampstand (Matthew 5:15) and get even more light. Christians should be visible examples of God's grace, love, and shining brightly for all to see.

One day may they say that you were worth your salt, and your light shined brightly. †††
