Genogram Reflection & Healing Exercise

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." — Jeremiah 29:11

Reframing Through Faith

- Where can you trace God's faithfulness in your family's story, even in the midst of pain?
- What do you believe God is inviting you to break or release from your lineage?
- What new legacy do you desire to begin in your own life and household?

Healing Activity

Write a "Letter of Release"

- Address it to your family line (past generations).
- · Acknowledge the pain honestly.
- Declare, through Christ, that the cycles stop with you.
- End by speaking blessings forward for future generations.

Example: "In Christ's name, I release the burden of shame carried through our family. I break agreement with fear and declare courage, faith, and healing for my children and grandchildren."

Prayer of Closure; Group Prayer

Gracious and Loving Father,

We have opened the pages of our family stories. Some of what we have seen has been painful, and yet we thank You that nothing is hidden from Your sight. You are the God who sees us, and You are the God who heals us.

Lord, we bring before You the broken places in our family lines—addictions, anger, abandonment, abuse, silence, and shame. We acknowledge the weight of what has been passed down, but we declare that through Christ Jesus we are no longer bound by those chains. Your Word tells us that whom the Son sets free is free indeed, and we receive that freedom over our bloodlines today.

We ask for Your Spirit to bring comfort where there are raw wounds, courage where there is fear, and hope where there has been despair. Give us the grace to forgive where bitterness has taken root, and wisdom to establish new patterns of love, respect, and holiness.

Lord, bless every family represented here. Where there has been destruction, plant restoration. Where there has been curses, release blessings. Where there has been generational brokenness, raise up generational healing and legacy.


