

Miracles and Hope

*"Jesus looked at them and said, 'With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible.'" —
Matthew 19:26 (NIV)*

1. Hope Prepares the Heart for Miracles

Hope is the fertile soil where miracles take root. Without hope, we stop expecting God to move. With hope, we live in readiness, believing that even in the bleakest situations, His power can break through. - The woman with the issue of blood hoped she would be healed if she touched Jesus' garment (Mark 5:25–34). - Blind Bartimaeus hoped his cry would get Jesus' attention, and it did (Mark 10:46–52).

2. Miracles Strengthen and Renew Hope

When God performs a miracle, it's more than just a supernatural intervention — it's a testimony that fuels faith for the future. - The parting of the Red Sea didn't just save Israel; it became a lasting reminder of God's deliverance (Exodus 14). - Jesus feeding the 5,000 didn't just satisfy hunger; it reminded the crowd that God cares for every need (John 6:1–14).

3. The Cycle of Hope and Miracles

1. Hope looks up — We fix our eyes on God instead of the problem. 2. Faith steps out — We act on the belief that God is able. 3. Miracles happen — God manifests His power in His timing. 4. Hope is renewed — The testimony fuels fresh expectation.

4. Living in the Expectancy Zone

A miracle-working God calls us to live with constant anticipation, knowing that what is impossible for man is always possible for Him. This doesn't mean every prayer is answered the way we imagine — but it does mean we can expect His goodness, power, and presence to meet us in every situation.

5. Prayer for Miracles and Hope

Lord, I thank You that You are still the God of miracles. Fill my heart with hope when I face what seems impossible. Teach me to trust Your timing and Your way. Let every miracle in my life be a reminder that You are faithful. May my hope in You be unshakable, and may others see Your power through my testimony. Amen.
