Gingerbread has a long and developed history which dates back to the 11th century here in Europe. It was pressed into moulds to make various shapes. "The first gingerbread man is credited to Queen Elizabeth I, who knocked the socks off visiting dignitaries by presenting them with one baked in their own likeness." ¹ The gingerbread man has widely become a symbol of the Christmas season!

However, beyond the sights and scents of the gingerbread man, Christmas is really about a different man. Christmas is about Emmanuel—*God with us.* The gingerbread man is a lifeless, doughy figure. It looks good, and potentially makes us "feel" good. But the God-man, Jesus Christ, is the living Son of God who came to deliver mankind from their impossible plight—which does far more than simply make us "feel" good at Christmastime.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made." John 1:1-3

"The Word" is Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who created all things. The Bible tells in Genesis 1:26 that in the very act of His creating, Jesus Christ created **us** in His image and likeness. It also declares that **we** are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14). Queen Elizabeth's gingerbread men represented various dignitaries. But more than these lifeless men of dough, **we** have been created by and for Jesus Christ to live for a purpose. Sadly though, our sins have separated us from this purpose, and we hear of death's intrusion in various man-made forms: abortion, euthanasia, murder, suicide,

You can discover a whole new meaning to what Christmas is all about! "For the wages of sin is death; *but the gift of God* is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23) This Christmas, as you experience the delight of gingerbread, think on this—"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that *whosoever believeth in him* should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16)
