Brad and Sarah challenged us to look back on 2025, and I've been doing that a lot recently. 2025, personally, was a year of ups and downs. In January, I got the joy to travel to North Carolina with my Baptist Women in Ministry cohort and spend a few days relaxing on the beach and resting with other youth and children's ministers. February came and my dad was in and out of hospitals and skilled nursing centers and I felt I spent more time in the emergency room than I did my own home. March came and I got the joy of going to London with my sister to see her favorite band perform. It started out rocky with our original flight being cancelled due to Heathrow being on fire, but we got there eventually and had a grand time. April came and we lost my Nannie. She was one of my people and I miss her dearly. Then the summer came and I was busy with Kids Off Broadway and camps. Those were life giving to me. Kid's Off Broadway, though it is stressful, it always a wonderful time. Youth camp was very fun this year, getting to see the youth work on houses in Mississippi was amazing. They were exhausted by the end, but they loved the experience. Kid's camp was so much fun! Getting to praise God with kid's and see the love of Jesus through their eyes is something I will never take for granted. The end of the summer brought promotion Sunday where we now have 8 in our youth group. That is amazing! Those kids have really gelled this year and they are their own little community and support one another well. At the end of August, I ended up having an ovarian cyst rupture, which was not fun in the slightest. It has caused me to pause and think about my health more. September brought the elementary retreat where the kids asked great questions and grew in their faith. October brought Trunk-or-Treat, and we saw so many people come into our building that day. I heard several parents say they were thankful to have a safe place they could bring their kids to enjoy the holiday. November came and the youth went on their retreat weekend, and we learned about how God's grace continues to find us even when we don't deserve it. My father also got to come home for a few days at Thanksgiving and spend it with the family. It was a hard time being without my Nannie, but my sister and I split up her usual foods she would make, and we attempted to make them for Thanksgiving. December is always a busy month, but a great month, nonetheless. It brought Christmas parties and lock-ins. I did get pretty sick, but it came and went quickly. December also had Christmas Eve which is one of my favorite nights of the year, seeing the kids do the live nativity scene. One kid was worried because they didn't get to practice beforehand. I told him, "Mary and Joseph didn't get to practice either", and he accepted that. He knew that not everything needs to be planned out. As 2026 begins, I am thankful for 2025. 2025 caused me to grow in several ways; mentally, spiritually, physically. It brought me closer to God and closer to my family. It made me think hard about my life and about the children's and youth ministries. I am truly thankful for 2025 and all it has done for me, and I look forward to 2026. It will be a great year for the Children's and Youth Ministries at FBCOKC.

EVERYBODY can do SOMETHING for the KINGDOM

When I served as youth minister at FBCOKC, I scheduled an opportunity for our students to go volunteer at the Regional Foodbank of Oklahoma. If you've never had the chance to volunteer there, you need to go experience it! It's incredible how much they do to feed individuals and families in Oklahoma. When we arrived, we were all given a brief orientation and specific roles for the afternoon. Our task was to pack bags of frozen corn and put them into boxes to be shipped out. Each of us had a different job on the assembly line:

- A few people were tasked with breaking up the frozen corn inside a gigantic container.
- After the corn was broken up, a few others were tasked with scooping the corn into plastic bags.
- After the corn was bagged, it was handed to a different set of volunteers who would weigh the bags on a scale to make sure they had the proper amount.
- After the bags of corn were weighed, they were handed to different volunteers who would use a machine to seal the bags shut.
- The sealed bags were handed to another set of volunteers who packed the finished bags into boxes and loaded them onto the truck.

After we finished packing corn for four hours, the kids were tired! I don't think any of them ate corn for a while after that. Ha ha! But we had a debriefing session where I asked them a question: What was THE most essential job on the assembly line? What job was so important that we couldn't have completed our task without it?

The students gave various answers until one of the girls caught on to where I was headed and answered me by saying, "All of them were essential. We needed all of them to get the job done." She was exactly right. If you remove even just one of the roles, the whole assembly line falls apart. Can you imagine the scene if we had 20 people trying to all scoop the corn into the bags, but no one to weigh and seal them? Or what if we had everyone ready to pack the boxes and put them on the truck, but no one to do the scoop, weigh, and seal?

The Kingdom of God is kind of like that. All of us are uniquely gifted to contribute to the work God has to put this world back together again. We ALL have a role, a job, a mission. No matter what seasons of life we find ourselves in. God is NOT through with us until we breathe our last breath.

Maybe you have physical limitations that prevent you from being able to serve in the ways in which you have in the past. The Church (and our church specifically) needs encouragers, note writers, prayer warriors, and wise sages to mentor younger generations.

Maybe you speak a different language, play a sport or an instrument, or have knowledge in a particular school subject (Math, Reading, Science, etc.)? How could any of those skills be used to glorify God in this world?

Maybe you're really gifted at working with your hands as an artist or making household repairs. Maybe you love watching movies and showing others how God is present in those stories.

The possibilities are endless. The bottom line is that EVERYBODY can do SOMETHING for the KINGDOM OF GOD. Pay attention to how God is speaking to you right now in this very season of your life.

Over the course of 2026, I am going to share lots of different opportunities for you to serve in various ways at our church, in our community, and in our world. I can't wait to serve alongside you this coming year as we discover where God is calling us to be His presence.



Serving Opportunities

What is CareForOKC?

CareForOKC is our church's community ministry. It's located on the Ground Floor of FBCOKC and serves clients on Monday afternoons from 4-6pm. We have a food pantry which is like a tiny grocery store. Canned vegetables, meats, produce, milk, eggs, pastas, bread, desserts, and a lot more. Clients get to shop for groceries. We also have a clothes closet that has clothes for women, men, and children. If you've never been to CareForOKC, we'd love for you to come down and take a tour. We serve over 75 families every single week.

Who does CareForOKC serve?

CareForOKC serves the working poor, those experiencing homelessness, immigrants and refugees new to Oklahoma City, folks who may have lost their jobs or are in another life transition, victims of domestic violence, the disabled, and many more.

How does CareForOKC provide this service to the community?

We have an incredible lay team of volunteers that serve clients on Monday nights. Volunteers check in clients, assist them in the food pantry and clothes closet, and help people get their food/clothes loaded into their vehicles. In addition to Monday afternoons, we have drivers who pick up food donated from Wal-Mart and bring it to CareForOKC, we have other volunteers who come up during the week and restock the food pantry shelves or process clothes in the closet.

Where Does the Food Come From at CareForOKC?

CareForOKC has partnerships with a local Wal-Mart where we pick up donated food twice a week and deliver it to the church. We also have a partnership with the Regional Foodbank of Oklahoma that enables us to buy bulk food items at a discounted cost. Occasionally, we will receive free items from the foodbank in addition to the goods we buy. In addition to Wal-Mart and the Regional Foodbank, we receive food and monetary donations from our FBCOKC church family and the community.

How can I pray for and support this ministry?

You may noticed that your grocery bill is more expensive these days. Items that we purchase from the Regional Foodbank for our food pantry, which are often heavily discounted, are becoming more expensive or even not available. Due to the recent cuts to federal aid, our CareForOKC team is spending more money purchasing food to help keep our shelves stocked each week. Our reality is not unique. Community ministries in our area and across the nation are working to find creative ways to continue serving folks despite the effects of inflation and budget cuts. God has been so faithful in providing for our needs and we trust that God will continue to be faithful as we love our neighbors as ourselves. We can't express how thankful we are for your prayers, countless volunteer hours, food and clothes donations, financial gifts, and so much more. ****Looking Ahead: Embracing the Future with Faith and Optimism****

****What Does Looking Ahead Mean to Me?****

Looking ahead is more than just refraining from dwelling on the past or constantly anticipating the next setback. At times, I find myself caught in these patterns, fixating on what has already happened or anxiously waiting for the next challenge to arise. However, as this new year begins, I am determined to shift my perspective. I want to focus on the broader vision of what God has prepared for me.

****Transforming Pain into Purpose****

When I was a child, and my parents scolded me, I frequently found myself caught in a loop of regret and questioning my own actions. I would dwell in those emotions, allowing them to overwhelm me, and convince myself that I was unloved if my parents viewed me negatively. Those moments became opportunities for self-pity, but unfortunately, I was the only one attending those pity parties. This way of thinking robbed me of genuine joy and happiness, making it challenging to move forward and embrace new possibilities.

****Choosing to See the Glass Half Full****

Over time, I have come to realize that viewing life through a lens of negativity serves no one. This year, I want to pause and acknowledge that God understands the bigger picture, and that knowledge helps me see the glass as half full. With this new perspective, it is up to me to choose how I respond to the truth that God knows my past, present, and future. Rather than living in constant fear of what might go wrong, I want to reflect with gratitude on the challenges that have taught me to trust in someone greater than myself. As the saying goes, “iron sharpens iron.” Together, we can challenge each other, share insights, and cultivate a shared commitment to becoming our best selves. She also encouraged us to use our words to bless others in our worship community, whether they are younger or older, recognizing the power of encouragement and shared wisdom.

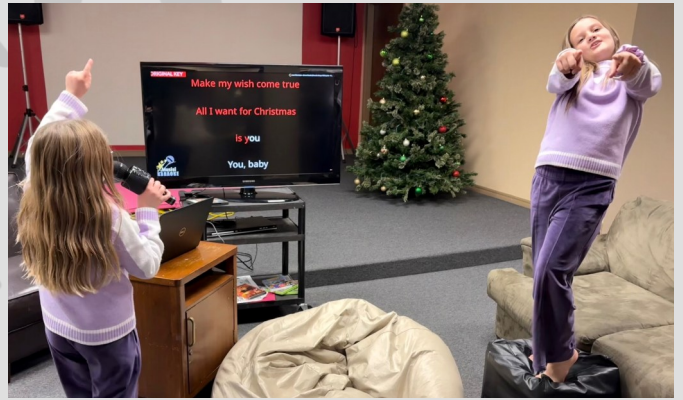
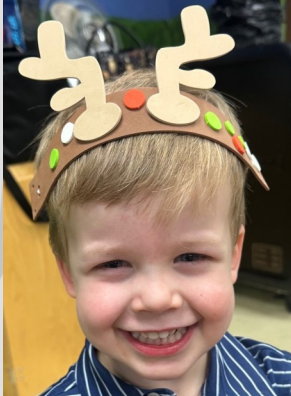
