A Letter of THANKS-GIVING

To all God's holy people in Christ Jesus at First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City:

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. To borrow the words from the Apostle Paul, written to his beloved congregation in Philippi as he remained in prison in Rome, "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that HE who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus."

Church family, it is an honor to serve the Lord with you every day. As we come to this month of Thanksgiving, I want to offer you my heartfelt gratitude. Thank you for all the ways you serve the Lord through this church and give of yourself to further the Kingdom of God. We are not a perfect church, but we are authentically and passionately striving to be faithful to who God has called us to be. You are Christ-centered, driven by love, covered in grace, and faithful disciples. You are authentic and generous. You are living examples of our calling to Love God, Love Others, and Make Disciples. I am in awe of you! What a joy it is to be a small part of this kingdom-building place.

Because of your faithfulness and generosity, we have been able to do remarkable things this year that we pray will have a lasting impact on the kingdom of God. This year we have walked through the entire book of Luke, and we are nearing the end of our study in the book of Acts. We've rejoiced at the birth of the newborn king, we've wandered in the wilderness with Jesus for 40 days, and stood with him as he proclaimed in his hometown that the Spirit of the Lord was upon him and had anointed him to proclaim good news to the poor, freedom for the prisoners, recovery of sight for the blind, and to set the oppressed free. We've answered the call of all the disciples to come and follow him. We've worshipped Jesus as he healed the man with leprosy, knowing that miracles don't always come. We've come to the table with Levi the tax collector, and watched as the fishermen learned to forgive and become brothers with this one who had extorted them. We have listened and considered which type of soil we might be as the seed is sown into our lives.



We've bent down low with the good Samaritan to help the wounded man left for dead and realized that is exactly how Jesus cares for us. We have been the prodigal son and the older brother all at the same time. We've shared in the Last Supper with the disciples and eaten the bread and drank from the cup. We wept at the crucifixion on Good Friday, recognizing our own sin that was laid upon him, and rejoiced at the resurrection on Easter Sunday morning.

Then, beginning in June, we've been a part of that first apostolic church as God unleashed his Spirit upon them and sent them out into the world with his presence and his power. At every turn, the Spirit was breaking through barriers to reach more and more people because Christ came for all. He is the Good Shepherd who leaves the 99 to chase after the one lost sheep. Hopefully, throughout this year, we've remembered that we are a part of that very story right now. We are a part of the ongoing work that began with Christ and was entrusted to his followers. What a thing it is to be loved, called, and equipped by Christ!

This year, I have watched as visitors became familiar faces. I have rejoiced as friends found freedom from sin and addiction. I have been inspired by our deacons and lay leaders through their wisdom and faithfulness. Perhaps the most profound thing about this year for me is this. When we gather on Sunday mornings for worship, there is a real sense in the room that God is there with us. I have come to expect the Spirit to move because it's so often the case.

An important aspect of being a disciple and an active church member is supporting the mission and ministry of the church. We do this by volunteering our time to serve on committees or ministry areas. We also support the church through prayer. There is perhaps nothing more important that we can do as a church family than pray for our church. Did you know we have a prayer room at FBCOKC? It is newly updated! You are invited to come and use this peaceful space to study or pray throughout the week or on Sunday mornings. We will dedicate the entire month of January to this most important aspect of discipleship.

Lastly, we are called to support the mission and ministry of the church financially. This is part of our act of worship. We bring our offering to the Lord. It reminds us that all we have comes from the Lord. Through giving, we are a part of something bigger than ourselves. We are participating in the work God is doing as we bind together as the body of Christ.

As of the beginning of October, our giving was at 90%. That is up from 81.5% at the same time last year. Thank you so much for giving! We are a financially healthy church that doesn't rely on any one individual to support our ministry budget, but rather our giving comes from all of us giving the Lord what we can and trusting God to multiply it for his purposes. Would you consider helping us finish the year strong? We are a small congregation with a very large, beautiful church building.

We have such an incredible opportunity to be the presence of Christ in our community. Our building has become a haven for the community. We are receiving more opportunities each year to partner with other kingdom-building ministries through the use of our building. These partnerships help support the mission and ministry of First Baptist Church.

I want to thank all of you for sacrificially giving to the church. God is working through your giving. Brad and I give to the church because we want to be a part of what God is doing in this place. We believe in this church and its future. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 9, "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your hearts to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work." It is both a sacrifice and a deep joy to give to the Lord. For our family, giving is also about putting our trust in God that he will provide for our needs as well as the needs of the church. We lay it down and trust God with the rest.

If we never talk about giving, we miss out on learning about an important part of our faith and obedience to Christ. As I read through the Old Testament this year, I read about the beauty of all the people bringing what they had to build the Tabernacle in the wilderness. They all got to be a part of building the dwelling place for God, the place to worship and make sacrifices. They were a part of something bigger than themselves, something heavenly. I remember feeling that way when we made our commitment to give to Renew First 18 years ago. (For those who are newer, Renew First was a capital campaign done by FBCOKC in 2007 to renovate and update parts of our church building.)



It meant something to me to be a part of the work God was doing here at FBCOKC. That was the first time Brad and I started giving consistently to a church.

It did something for my relationship with God to give to the church. It was this important act of obedience, a loosening of my tight grip. I think I was even a little proud that we were giving when we had so little, as though I had done something special. Then, over time, something shifted in me. The more I came to understand the weight of God giving his own Son to rescue us from our sins, the more my small gift seemed, well, small. God has given me everything and everything I have comes from Him. God wasn't asking me to give because he needed it. He was asking me to give generously because I owe him everything and this was an important part of remembering that everything I have comes from God. All of it.

There have been times in our lives when the bills were bigger than our paychecks (particularly medical bills in our case). Somehow, in those moments, by God's grace and the generosity of others, we always had enough. We always had food on our table, a roof over our heads, and money to pay the medical bills. What is money to God? Could he not multiply loaves and fish to meet all our needs? It's just that money has a way of wrapping its tentacles around us and pulling on us. It was always about giving our hearts to God and freeing us from the love of money. What God has always been after is our heart! It makes me think of that beautiful Christmas song we sing each year, *In the Bleak Midwinter*.

"What can I give him? Poor as I am. If I were a shepherd, I would give a lamb. If I were a wise man, I would do my part. But what can I give him? I'll give him my heart."

That is what God has desired all along! As we enter the season of Advent in the coming weeks, let's look with hopeful anticipation to the celebration of the birth of Christ. Church family, you are incredible servants of the Lord. You live out your faith every day. Thank you. Because you gave to the ministry of First Baptist, we were able to do so much good for the Kingdom of God. This is a letter to tell you thank you. Thank you for sharing your gifts and talents. Thank you for investing in kingdom work.

Because you gave...

- We bought teaching materials for Sunday morning Bible studies for children, youth, and adults. Throughout our church, on Sunday mornings people are studying God's word, asking great questions, growing in their faith, and challenging one another. Thank you!
- We were able to continue our small group ministries that meet throughout the week all over the city. We have more groups than every before!
- This year, we were able to use our building to host these congregations: Trinity Chinese Baptist Church, Redeemed Presbyterian Church, and Sudanese Christian Fellowship. Beginning December 1, we will welcome another congregation to worship in our church on Sunday afternoons. The Apostolic Lighthouse of Oklahoma will worship in our Theater each week, a young and growing congregation with both male and female leadership!
- We also host The Academy of Classical Christian Studies and have an incredible partnership with them as we use and restore this great facility. They are currently doing a canned food drive to support Care-ForOKC
- We partner with Crossings Community Clinic to offer medical and dental services to our community through this free and charitable clinic.
- We hosted a national writer's conference called Poets Painters and Prophets, which welcomed guests from all over the country. We hosted a city-wide worship service in January and the state-wide Neighbors Conference in March. This weekend, we will host another conference on church revitalization through using church property for kingdom building purposes! That's us!
- We hosted the YMCA summer camp and this winter we will host the YMCA basketball league.
- We hosted Bright Music for their concerts throughout the year, a blessing to both organizations!
- We host countless children and youth sporting events and practices for different organizations in our community. Our gym is a tremendous blessing!



- We were able to serve our community through CareForOKC all year long. Because you gave, we fed hundreds of people who might otherwise go hungry and clothed those in need. This ministry is the heartbeat of our church, and it is only possible because so many people volunteer their time week after week. We are currently collecting coats and blankets to help our neighbors stay warm throughout the coming winter months. Thank you!
- We hosted an amazing community event this fall in the dining hall called Trunk or Treat. We welcomed hundreds of people from the Oklahoma City community and let them know that this is a church that cares about our community.
- Kids Off Broadway was a tremendous success with children and teenagers experiencing God's love and growing in their faith. Thank you!
- We were able to hire a new Administrative Assistant, who is completely fantastic at her job. This paved the way for Brad Stewart to step into his new role as our Missions Pastor and Toni Adams to add Minister of Discipleship to her responsibilities. They are able to do more ministry because Miranda is so great at taking care of the administrative responsibilities. What a blessing!
- We are able to offer bags to the homeless in our community throughout the week which include food and
 water. Through your donations, FBCOKC has supported our Missions Partner Restore Schools, through a
 school supply drive, grilling food for the distribution pickup at MLK Elementary, and providing dinner
 for the teachers at MLK Elementary during Parent Teacher Conferences.
- We were able to support our Missions Partner Hope is Alive Ministries by supporting one of their women's houses here in OKC, known as W2. We were able to continue providing a Finding Hope Support Group. Thank you!
- We continued to develop our partnership with CBF Field Personnel Elket Rodriguez. We now serve as his Encourager Church and support his ministry to our neighbors living on the border. We sent our first mission team down to the border just a few short weeks ago! Be on the lookout for more mission opportunities in the coming year.
- Many, many other ministry opportunities were possible because YOU gave: First Family Feasts, Children's and Youth Camps, Children's and Youth Retreats, a Women's Retreat, Rooted Ministry Events, and a Thanksgiving Feast with our partner churches in our building!

<u>Loving Our Neighbors At the Border - Report from Mission Trip to Harlingen, TX</u>

Our mission team of Pam Dunbar, Toni Adams, Joey Clifton, and Brad Stewart departed from OKC on Tuesday, Oct. 21 and returned to OKC Sunday, Oct. 26. We trav-

eled to Harlingen, Tx to minister with Elket Rodriguez. FBCOKC is an encourager church for Elket who is the Global Migration Advocate for CBF Global Missions. His mission is to welcome, protect, and empower migrants at the U.S. – Mexico border. We were also privileged to work with Caly Fernandez who is the Executive Director of a non-profit called The House of Love and Justice. Elket and Caly asked if we would be able to bring hygiene kits and hats for the migrants when we came. And through the generosity of our FBCOKC church family and Wings OK, we were able to deliver 500 hygiene kits and over 100 hats!

A lot of their mission work takes place near Harlingen in small border communities called the Colonias. In Edinburg, a Colonias community 40 minutes from Harlingen, we helped install insulation and dry wall on the home of an elderly couple named Lorena and Jose. They live in a tiny trailer house and learned recently that their granddaughters living in Iowa needed to come live with them because of a family crisis. So Elket, Caly, and the rest of their team began building an addition to the home to create space for the granddaughters to stay.

In addition to acts of service like working Jose and Lorena's home, our team was also given an education on what is happening at the border and how Elket and Caly are ministering to the needs of those communities. We visited the Alice Wilson Hope Park in Brownsville and got to see the border wall. As we talked with Elket about the scope of his mission and the desperate needs of the people he serves, I (Brad) asked him how he doesn't get overwhelmed by all of it. Here's a paraphrase of his response:

ut trying to do it all and to act as some type of was burned out spiritually, physically, and emod's grace reminded me that I can't carry all that

I can't help everyone and I can't fix everything. I started out trying to do it all and to act as some type of savior. But I quickly realized that I'm incapable of that. I was burned out spiritually, physically, and emotionally. And it was only when I reached that point that God's grace reminded me that I can't carry all that weight. Only Jesus can. And all I can do is love and be fully present to the person standing right in front of me. If I can love one person, one family, at a time, and to see in them the image of God. If I can do that, it's enough.

Our mission team has plans to share more about trip in the weeks to come. Stay tuned for an opportunity to hear more about what God is doing through the mission and ministry of Elket and his friends!

What are the Colonias?

The Colonias is a community along the U.S.-Mexico border that typically was created with the illegal subdividing of property without basic infrastructure. The homes in a colonia may lack running water, sewer systems, and often don't have paved streets or drainage. When there is rain, flooding is a problem. There are no basic services like garbage pick-up. Accessing emergency services is a challenge because there are no official street addresses. An estimated 500,000 people live in thousands of colonias along the Texas-Mexico border. Largely established between the 1950s and 1980s, state laws have been passed to try to

Serving Opportunities



What is CareForOKC?

CareForOKC is our church's community ministry. It's located on the Ground Floor of FBCOKC and serves clients on Monday afternoons from 4-6pm. We have a food pantry which is like a tiny grocery store. Canned vegetables, meats, produce, milk, eggs, pastas, bread, desserts, and a lot more. Clients get to shop for groceries. We also have a clothes closet that has clothes for women, men, and children. If you've never been to CareForOKC, we'd love for you to come down and take a tour. We serve over 75 families every single week.

Who does CareForOKC serve?

CareForOKC serves the working poor, those experiencing homelessness, immigrants and refugees new to Oklahoma City, folks who may have lost their jobs or are in another life transition, victims of domestic violence, the disabled, and many more.

How does CareForOKC provide this service to the community?

We have an incredible lay team of volunteers that serve clients on Monday nights. Volunteers check in clients, assist them in the food pantry and clothes closet, and help people get their food/clothes loaded into their vehicles. In addition to Monday afternoons, we have drivers who pick up food donated from Wal-Mart and bring it to CareForOKC, we have other volunteers who come up during the week and restock the food pantry shelves or process clothes in the closet.

Where Does the Food Come From at CareForOKC?

CareForOKC has partnerships with a local Wal-Mart where we pick up donated food twice a week and deliver it to the church. We also have a partnership with the Regional Foodbank of Oklahoma that enables us to buy bulk food items at a discounted cost. Occasionally, we will receive free items from the foodbank in addition to the goods we buy. In addition to Wal-Mart and the Regional Foodbank, we receive food and monetary donations from our FBCOKC church family and the community.

How is CareForOKC responding to the end of SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) as a result of the government shutdown?

CareForOKC has the volunteers and resources to feed up to 75 families per week. Nearly every single week, we have to turn away clients. But the number of those not receiving help has continued to grow in the last month. Last week, we had to turn away 42 individuals/families that were still in line after we had given out our 75 tickets for the week.

Over half a million Oklahomans receive SNAP benefits. The majority of recipients are families with children, while a significant portion also include families with disabled or older adults.

Here is what CareForOKC is doing to respond to this crisis. In addition to our regular Monday food distribution serving 75 families, we will give 50 cards for individuals/families to return on Thursday mornings to receive a box of food. \$500 will provide 50 boxes of food for 50 families. Through the generosity of our church family, we already have three weeks funded! Praise be to God! Here's what we're needing in the way of volunteers:



- We need 2-4 people to shop for groceries
- We need 3-4 volunteers who will help us divide up the bulk meat and pack it
- Small groups will pack boxes on Wednesday nights. We already have groups for the first two weeks!
- We need 2 volunteers to help us distribute the boxes on Thursday mornings.

To provide this additional food distribution, our biggest need right now is financial donations to CareForOKC. Those resources enable us to purchase extra food for the 50 boxes each week.
