We are halfway through the fiscal year with a near-record budget. I am happy to share that six months into 2025, we have met the budget and are operating in the black.

Super Summer 2025 was a resounding success.

The Common Call That Binds Us Together

Hey Northeast family. I pray that you are enjoying the warm weather because in northeast Ohio, we only get a few months of it. I hope you have been able to take a break and refresh for a little bit.

This is also the time when many churches ramp up their outreach efforts with sports camps, back-to-school bashes, and car washes. I'm praying the Lord is blessing your effort as you share the love and gospel of Jesus with your community.

As we seek to connect with our local community, I believe it's also important for us to connect with other churches to encourage one another, especially those who are a part of our local Baptist associations.

I had the privilege of connecting and serving with a group of pastors from the Cleveland Hope Association for the ordination council of the new Senior Pastor Joe Valenti at Cuyahoga Valley Church, Broadview Heights. This moment was truly special and encouraging.

The council was led by CVC founding pastor, Rick Duncan, and he assembled an amazingly diverse group of pastors from the association to serve. These were pastors who served in smaller and larger congregations, pastors who served different ethnic churches, as well as pastors of older established churches, and pastors of church plants. In the midst of all of this diversity, there was unity around the Lord Jesus as we encouraged Pastor Joe.

This moment reminded me of Philippians 1, where the Apostle Paul wrote about "fellowship in the gospel" (1:5). We are in fellowship with one another in the gospel of the Lord Jesus.

On a very foundational level, everyone in the room had one thing in common that superseded any difference we had – our faith in the risen Lord Jesus.

Then, on a vocational level, we have a common call of the Lord to serve his church, no matter the size or location. The Lord has chosen us to serve in the vineyard, reaching people for Jesus, and helping Christians become more like Jesus while leading a local church —a task that is no easy endeavor.

And this common vocational calling had me thinking about Philippians 3:10, which speaks about the "fellowship of his (Jesus') sufferings". As pastors, we will experience hardship and trials as we seek to serve the Lord and his church. But, praise God, the Lord encourages us because Philippians 2:1 tells us we have the "fellowship of the Spirit" to comfort us in Christ during those difficult moments.

SCBO Welcomes New Senior Staff Member

A familiar face is returning to Ohio, bringing his ministry experience to benefit SCBO and Ohio Baptists.

On August 1, Dr. Ryan Strother joined the SCBO team as Director of Convention Support. He previously served as the Executive Director of the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana.

As the pastor of Central Baptist Church, Marion, Ohio, for 12 years, Strother also served SCBO from 2016-2020 in three leadership positions – President, 1st Vice President, and 2nd Vice President.

Since 2009, Strother, his wife, Nikki, and their five children, ages 16-12, have called Ohio home, and he is excited to minister again in the Buckeye State.

"We've lived in Marion since 2009," Strother said. "That's where I started in a lead pastoral role."


Both Ryan and Nikki grew up in Maryland and lived outside of Baltimore before moving to Ohio.

"We were not Midwesterners. We were East Coast people, but when we came here, it didn't take long for us to say 'We are Midwesterners.'"

Returning to ministry in Ohio feels special to Strother and his family.

"Every place you've ever served, there are always memories there. There are always things that you'll cherish. And so in a lot of ways, this is a homecoming for us."

"The Lord's timing is always perfect," said Dr. Jeremy Westbrook, SCBO executive director. "What a joy it is to



welcome back Dr. Ryan Strother to SCBO. His title will be the Director of Convention Support, and he will serve on the Senior Staff, but Ryan has been doing that for years in his previous roles serving Ohio Baptists. Please join me in welcoming back the Strother family."

In his new role, Strother's ministry focus will be on Ohio's pastors and churches.

"I will support anything in the area of pastoral wellness, church support, and church health initiatives," he said.

In addition, he will also work with SCBO Prayer and Association Consultant Steve Hopkins.

"I'll be blessed to work alongside Steve Hopkins still for a little while at least," he said. "I talked to him and I said, 'I hope you still do this for 20 more years.' He didn't commit to that, but I'll work with him on prayer initiatives and associational relationships. I'm really looking forward to jumping in there."

Strother is also looking forward to bringing his experience, skills, and abilities to support the SCBO staff and Dr. Jeremy Westbrook's vision for Ohio.

"I know one of the things he's charged me with is how to provide counseling services to pastors in the state. That's in my wheelhouse. That'll be a fun project to tackle in the first few months – just how do we serve pastors best?"

Strother is in a unique position to understand the needs of pastors in the local church since he grew up in a pastor's home, and his grandfather was also a pastor.

"I'm a third-generation minister, which was not my choice," he recalled. "I wanted to have a real job and be a normal church member."

After a year as a middle school social studies teacher, he realized the Lord was calling him to ministry.

His grandfather, who fought in World War II, served churches into his nineties, and his father is still ministering today in his seventies. "He pastored the same church all of my childhood. He was there until I moved out and married. So I saw longevity. I saw what the fruit of that could be."

These examples influence the goals he has for his ministry at SCBO.

"I want to see pastors in the pulpit longer. I want to see churches actually baptizing, seeing people saved, doing what we're doing on mission, and not becoming so self-focused.

"We celebrate that baptism rates have been up in Ohio; they were up in Indiana last year, too. We're celebrating that for sure. I want to see that number go up. We need to see more churches. We need all of this, and we can work together, and we can see so much of this happen."

In addition, he hopes to help meet the emotional needs of pastors, giving them the freedom to acknowledge the struggles of ministry.

"I just hope no pastor feels alone. There are people with them, and they know there's support. They know that brothers and sisters will lock arms and say, 'No, we're with you in this. Let's keep going."

Super Summer Experiences Record Growth

Another record Super Summer is in the books!

Held at Cedarville University during the last week of June, Super Summer had record involvement with 475 students and staff in attendance.

To accommodate the large number, two worship services were held each night – one for older students and one for younger students. This allowed the Dean Inserra, lead pastor, City Church, Tallahassee, Florida, to tailor his nightly messages to each age group. TakeHeart led worship for both services nightly.

Throughout the week, Inserra spoke on "Permanent Things" that are "Unending." His messages encouraged students to build their houses on the rock of Christ's teaching, to stay anchored to God and his Word, and to live from a place of intimacy with Jesus. He also led our

students in an extended time of prayer each evening.

In addition to evening worship, Super Summer uses biblical truth to develop Christian leaders for kingdom impact.

Students who have just finished seventh grade through their freshman year in college receive training that is specific to their grade level. Some of the top pastors and leaders in the SCBO come together to invest in our student leaders.

At each grade level, students worship together, hear teaching from gifted SCBO pastors, and then discuss the application of the lessons in small groups.

The students choose a total of six elective classes to attend during the week, including topics like Responding to the Call to Ministry, Character Matters, Church Planting, Mental Health and Leadership, and Understanding How You Are Wired to Worship, as well as many others.

The intense week of study and spiritual challenge led to students making a variety of decisions in their walk with the Lord: Twenty-one students made professions of faith; thirty-five students were called to full-time ministry; and seventy-two students were called to missions.

Please pray that each of our Super Summer students would continue to pursue Jesus and the specific kingdom contribution that God has for them.



BRENTWOOD, Tenn — Culture claims to know about Jesus, but many people are in the dark about who He really is. The block party had 180 attendees, and most RHC members were able to have at least one positive gospel conversation. We added a free prayer booth, which went really well and helped our more introverted folks start conversations.



CABA Celebrates Evangelism Opportunities

The Cincinnati Area Baptist Association (CABA) is having a fruitful season with multiple outreach opportunities for sharing the gospel.

Soccer camps: Three international soccer camps kicked off this summer, involving many children who have had no exposure to Bible characters or terms, let alone the gospel message. During soccer camp, students rotated through three stations, including an indoor Bible story and activity session.

Soccer camps took place at Liberty Heights, Liberty Twp; First Baptist Church, South Lebanon; and Beacon of Christ Church, Dent.

Ray Taw, church planter, International Fellowship Church, mobilized 162 Southern Baptist volunteers, including 130 students from Dawson Baptist Church, Birmingham, Alabama. Taw also serves as International Partnership Consultant for CABA.

CABA Block Party Trailers: Since the 2024-2025 CABA financial year began last fall, the association's five block party trailers have been in use frequently. One hundred thirty-four reservations have been made for the year, 83 events for CABA churches and 51 events for non-CABA churches.

According to evangelism reports, seeds of faith were planted in the lives of 19,501 people, and there were 6,658 evangelism encounters and 15 professions of faith.

Global Hunger Relief – It's About More Than Food

According to a recent national study, one in seven Americans relies on food pantries for resources to feed themselves and their families. That number seems to be growing every year.

That's why Send Relief, a collaboration between NAMB and IMB, established Global Hunger Relief and the Global Hunger Fund. The money in this fund comes from local Southern Baptist churches through the Cooperative Program, as well as from those who give directly to the fund.

Your giving to the Global Hunger Fund makes a big difference. Last year, 174,188 food packages were distributed, 2.5 million hot meals were served, and 18,137 individuals found salvation in Christ.

In 2025, Ohio qualified for \$20,000 from the fund. These dollars are currently divided between eight church pantries in Ohio to help meet food needs.

However, the heart of the Global Hunger Fund is about more than feeding people. It's about feeding souls with the eternal, life-giving hope found in Jesus Christ.

In the first six months of 2025, Ohio's eight agencies have given food to 51,200 individuals. These distributions include hot meals, sack lunches, and grocery-filled bags.

Meeting physical needs is a biblical directive, but the food is also a means to open a door to the gospel.

Central Community Mission, Akron, is one of the eight feeding centers. The church has struggled this year – their pastor passed away, two elderly church members passed away, and two feeding ministry volunteers passed away.

However, even during its losses, the church stayed on mission, serving 3,100 people through compassion ministry and seeing one person come to faith in Christ.

A ministry like this doesn't happen without a team. Three hundred volunteers from these agencies have had 2,516 gospel conversations and seen 39 professions of faith in the past six months. What an amazing opportunity for members of the local church to feed their local communities and also share Christ.

You and your church can get involved in feeding your community. The first way is to give to the Global Hunger Fund weekly, through your church or as a one-time gift on Global Hunger Day, Sunday, August 24.

The other is to let the Global Hunger Fund help your church feed your community. One of the eight Ohio agencies is no longer receiving funds, so that means SCBO is looking for a feeding ministry in Ohio that could use additional funding for the second half of 2025.

Partnerships Bring "Muddy Bear" to Ohio DR

Partnerships are key to the work of Ohio Disaster Relief.

In December 2023, Rumford, Maine, experienced terrible flooding. Much of the town, including the fire station, was damaged by floodwaters.

A 12-person Ohio DR team led by Josh Wright, Urbancrest Baptist Church, deployed to Rumford. The team was supposed to do both flood and chainsaw recovery, but little did they know that God had other plans.

Upon arrival, the entire team was needed for flood recovery, and one of the homes affected belonged to John and Nancy. Their home and shop, which housed their business, were under several feet of water.

The Ohio team got to work and finished the flood recovery in about two days. It then took months for John and Nance to get back to normal.

John and Nancy are carvers who make animal carvings from tree trunks using a chainsaw. To help them get their business going again, the members of the flood recovery team commissioned a carving of a bear for Ohio DR. The team paid for it out of their own pockets and chose the name, "Muddy Bear."

Eighteen months later, on July 8, 2025, Muddy Bear arrived in Ohio. Why did it take so long to receive the carving?

The carving process takes time. First, a rough carving is cut, and then the item has to dry for six months. Once it dries, the fine carving of the details is completed, and the carving is stained.



While Ohio DR waited for Muddy Bear, something else happened. John joined New England Disaster Relief and deployed on a chainsaw team.

This is a great example of partnership. Ohio DR deployed to Maine through a partnership with New England Disaster Relief. The Ohio DR team partnered with John and Nancy through the commissioning of Muddy Bear, helping them restart their business, and finally, John joined New England DR and deployed to help others affected by disaster.

Partnerships are key to the work of Ohio Disaster Relief.
