

## Sermon "Preparing Supper" Rev. Barbara Dickason

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of all of our hearts Be acceptable to you, O God, Our Steadfast cornerstone.

"I'm hungry. What's for supper?"

You know, I have heard that question so many times in my life that sometimes I feel like I get indigestion every time I hear it. Growing up, I may have even asked it a few times, although I was usually the child who was so busy playing that I didn't notice it was supper time.

Now growing up in the mountains, both of my parents worked outside the home, so they decided upon their division of labor early on — mom took care of the stuff inside, and dad took care of the stuff outside. So, mom had the cooking, cleaning, laundry, and homework assistance while dad had mechanical and household repairs, as well as mowing the lawn, making hay, making sure we had enough cords of wood for the long cold winters, and taking care of the animals. They shared the gardening, and assigned each of us kids out to whatever we did best. But because I was the youngest, that often meant that I was free to wander and observe, as long as I practiced the piano.

It also meant that as my brothers began leaving to go to college and roles shifted when we moved off the farm, I was often the kid around to hear 'Help me fold these clothes' or 'Hand me the crescent wrench' from dad or 'I'll need you to cook supper because I have a late meeting tonight,' from mom. I will never forget the look on dad's face at the table the night I first prepared supper for just the two of us, when he took the first bite of the stroganoff I prepared, and my own surprise when I realized that I had mis-measured the black pepper. I will always remember the look on his face as he took his second bite, and his third... Let's just say Dad had much more fortitude than I did.

Most often, however, when evening rolled around each night I was to be found on the kitchen stool by the counter, doing whatever odd jobs mom passed my way, telling her about my day as she was preparing supper and dad was finishing up odd jobs around the house or preparing for an evening meeting at church.

Because for our family, supper was always a time set aside for coming together around the table and sharing about our day, learning about life from each others' experiences and thanking God together for the food on our table.

And instead of asking "What's for supper?" By the time I went off to college the question that rested in me was instead, 'What is supper for?' And naturally, at that age of my life's development, I knew what it was for. It was for building a beloved community and for being family around a table together. After all, I was also around when, due to an illness my freshman year, my doctor restricted me from eating anything but the green beans and the salad in the college dining hall after we read through all the labels in their pantry and discussed all the recipes they made with the kitchen manager. And I was around when they began discussing my options, and I mentally reassured them and myself that I would be fine on my own. But, my heart still knew what supper

was for. And, in order to stay in school, I was required to prepare my own breakfast, lunch and supper and then usually, eat alone.

So it when now comes time for me to prepare supper, while I am proficient enough, it is more often performed out of a sense of obligation rather than joy. Out of duty rather than fulfillment. Out of the need for nourishment rather than in anticipation of fellowship.

And so imagine my surprise when, in studying this scripture for today, 'preparing supper' was the sermon title that jumped out to me to be shared.

And then I realized... just as I need to keep working to reframe the 'What's for supper' question into 'What's supper for?', so too, Jesus is trying to help the disciples in our scripture today reframe their plea for more faith which is inherent in the question, 'How much faith is enough?' Into 'What is faith for?'

And our passage this morning, this passage in which Jesus turns from telling the Pharisees parables to instructing his disciples, only includes verses five through ten in many lectionaries. The lectionary starts here, with this question wrapped up as a plea: 'What is faith for?'

And we could start there, in fact, that is where I just started. But only because in Luke's chiastic structure, what is usually most important is in the middle. But that also means that in order to make any sense of this question, we have to go back a both to the last several weeks of scripture and to the first five verses of today's passage that some simply want to leave out.

Now, in the past several weeks in the passages and parables immediately preceding Jesus' teaching to the disciples today, Jesus has been trying to help the pharisees understand that their love of money, the gilding of the synagogues and their use of purple robes is not the devotion that God is seeking. For when they allow the poor to starve, they are serving their own lusts rather than serving God. For while their self-aggrandizement and self-deification feels glorious at the time, it results in a chasm opening between them and the divine that simply can't be crossed. As Jesus put it, "You can't have two masters — you can't serve mammon and God both."

Now, we heard the New Revised Standard Version, updated edition's translation of all ten verses of our passage from Luke 17 this morning, and they have some pretty heavy duty scholarship behind them. But, the scholars also are translating a dead language in which the words are often defined in respect to how they are used in contemporary 1st century texts, and extrapolated from there.

So, I went back to the Greek this morning for those first five verses, to the Mounce interlinear, because for some reason I just kept getting stuck in the phrasing of these verses. And this is what I heard:

"It is impossible for misery and stumbling blocks not to come, but it is a calamity if you help bring them about. It is better that a millstone be hung about your neck and you be scattered into the sea than be the reason that a little one is miserable or stumbles.

"Be attentive! If your sibling misses the mark, help them see the consequences. If they have a change of heart and of practice,

then forgive, placing it all behind you. And if they are in error seven times a day, and each time they work to change their heart and behavior, you must forgive them."

For as Jesus turns to his disciples to teach them in this week's passages, he is reminding them while their choices may be different than the choices the Pharisees must make, they must also choose who they are serving, and they must faithfully serve once they have chosen. As the son of Man, however, Jesus is also acutely aware of humanity's frailty and inconstancy. And so Jesus teaches his disciples how to be both vulnerable enough to ask for help and human enough to offer to help hold each other accountable whenever they slip up. For with the deep compassion, steadfast love, and gifts of healing that that they will inherit from Christ, they will be tested to use their new gifts in ways that don't glorify God, just as Jesus was similarly tested in the wilderness. And lest they fall into eternal self-abnegation, righteous self-justification, or communal shame, they must learn to forgive, and forgive, and forgive, and forgive, and forgive, and forgive.

And in thinking about how hard it is to actually forgive, day in and day out, moment by moment and memory by memory, the disciples cry out, "Increase our faith!"

But Jesus knows that while this sounds like a plea for more faith, it is really a plea wrapped in doubt, a disguised question: When, O Lord, will we ever be faithful enough to forgive like that?

And Jesus uses a metaphor to demonstrate that even when someone feels like their faithfulness may be simple and small,

they already have enough faith for God to use them to create miracles.

And then Jesus concludes this section with a story about a master and the master's slave, which poses all sorts of crazy contemporary problems for us if we were to actually read it literally in our current context. Nevertheless, it is in this story that Luke pulls together all of the past several weeks of teachings to the Pharisees and Jesus' instruction to the disciples: by explaining what faithfulness is for. And yes, behind this short story are all sorts of assumptions and understandings about the world and how it works that were held in Jesus' time, so let's do a quick review.

When God created humanity, God called God's creation 'good'. God rested, then walked in the garden with them, and built covenants with them, and promised to steadfastly love and care for them, but in humanity's fickleness and their propensity to grumble, some either forget their creator or went looking for someone or something else to make them happy. Throughout their journey together, God has fed them, clothed them, freed them from injustice, led them through perilous wilderness experiences, and promised to steadfastly love them intimately... not like those other gods of other nations whose inattention and capriciousness leave their people to either fend for themselves or even worse, be used as pawns in the games the gods played. No, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, of Elijah, Elisha, Samuel, David, and Solomon, of Rahab, Tamar, Deborah and the midwives who refused the Pharoah's orders to kill babies in Egypt thus allowing Moses to be born... that God, who created and loves all that is and ever will be ... the God has built a covenant between God'self and humanity. And foundational to Jesus'

teaching here is the reminder to his disciples that ultimately, there is nothing greater than God's original blessing for all of humanity, for all who choose first to glorify God. Jesus is reminding them, and us all, that God's blessing is more than enough.

And so, when we turn back to this parable, we must hold two things in tension: that while Jesus loves everyone just as God steadfastly loves us all and is actively working to transform the lives of God's beloved people by offering healing, working for justice and teaching equity throughout Luke's narration of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, in this parable specifically, Jesus lifts up an every day truism of their time in order to illustrate to his disciples that just as it is a slave's daily work to obey, it is their daily work to forgive. And this is where we arrive at the heart of these ten verses. For as Jesus teaches, faith is necessary for forgiveness.

Jesus' disciples begged him to increase their faith. But just as the slave had what was needed to perform their duties, so do we as disciples, also, for it is not the quantity or display of our faith that matters: it is that we practice it by offering forgiveness. Again, and again, and again, and again... And whenever we fail to faithfully practice the spiritual discipline of forgiveness, that is when we, in our own turn, will also stumble. For both faith and forgiveness are part and parcel of God's blessing of shalom, God's blessing of wholistic well-being as the beloved community.

For just as we prepare supper so that we might all eat at the communal table together, Jesus is preparing us to faithfully forgive and forgive and forgive, so that we might be the beloved community together.

### We Share God's Love

## **Story of Connection**

As we practice the spiritual discipline of joy, one of the essential components of our practice is: how we choose to connect. So this morning, as we celebrate World Communion Sunday, I would like to share two stories from the many resources and stories that have been offered to us by Global Ministries, a joint ministry initiative of the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ that we help support, for this celebration of World Communion Sunday.

In March, Margaret Kofron, a Global Missions intern with the Middle East and Europe, finished up three months with Mediterranean Hope, an organization dedicated to providing migrant families with essential services and instruction in Italian

while fostering connection and understanding in a diverse region of Italy. She tells wonderful stories of learning Italian with migrant families and reaching out into the community to keep building bridges. She was headed next to the Forum for Development, Culture, and Dialogue in Beirut to learn about working for a non-profit in the middle East. Let's give thanks for her willingness to go and the ways in which she is able to share God's love and compassion with those who are vulnerable.

Alex Maldonado-Lizardi and Xiomara Cintron-Garcia serve with the Christian Centre for Justice, Peace and Nonviolent Action (Justapaz), Bogota, Colombia. They tell a story of their Amazon community in which the neighborhood's priest, Father Campo Elias de la Cruz goes into the jungle to celebrate mass, teaching from Luke's Sermon on the Plain about how our actions should be driven by love. Following in the footsteps of a predecessor who was working for justice for the entire Amazonian community, Father Campo tells this story to and for that same community in the place where his predecessor was assassinated about 15 years before:

"You decided not to plant coca and chose other seeds. The day we run out of seeds, we will die. The day we run out of water, we will die. The presence of God is in the Amazon....And while the multinationals are draining the life out of the territory, it is important to look with God's eyes at what is happening to the world. The rich, the companies, the corporations... will have money but no food, no seed. This is how we must stubbornly

believe in the dream of Jesus of Navareth. Our biggest tree is to believe, to promote harmony, food, and seed. To live the cosmic Eucharist."<sup>3</sup>

We give thanks for the ways that we have been invited to partner with faithful disciples all around the world. For, whether in Europe or Africa, Australia or Asia, the Pacific Rim or Latin America, Global Ministries has ministry partners and staff around the world working to help create lasting peace, opportunities for restoration and justice, feeding the hungry, caring for God's creation and reaching out with the love of God by living within and accompanying communities around the world. There are many more stories where these came from at the UCC's Global Ministries website, where you can connect with many amazing people and ministries that our churches support whenever we truly choose to live out of Christ's blessing and hope that we be a united and uniting people of God.
