- Reread Psalm 24
- What clues do we have in this psalm that the writer has corporate worship in mind?
- Explain in your own words what the phrase “King of glory” means.

Applying the Truth Personally

- What are three ways Psalm 24:1–2 impacts my life?
- Based on verses 3 and 4, what is one thing that I can do to properly prepare myself for worship each week?
- Given that only someone with “clean hands and a pure heart” (v. 4) can stand before a holy God in worship, where should my focus lie in my own worship? What secondary elements of worship consume too much of my attention?

Applying the Truth Congregationally

- How can we echo the joy of verses 7–10 in our corporate worship more each week?
- The Jews came to sing Ps 24 weekly. How can we learn to value the regular singing of songs more?

Digging Deeper

- How does the repetitive use of the Hebrew word “lift up” in vv. 4, 5 (NASB “receive”), 7 (twice), and 9 (twice) strengthen this psalm’s point?
- How does Paul’s quotation of Psalm 24:1 in 1 Corinthians 10:26 support his argument in that chapter?
