The Imitation of Christ by Thomas A. Kempis

In the mid-15th century, a relatively unknown monastic cleric, at the urging of others around him, published a four-book compilation of his devotional thoughts about what it meant to follow Christ and live in a Christian monastic community. It was published anonymously, while focusing on withdrawing from ego and worldly acclaim and truly following Christ in your heart.

The book was an instant hit. Thomas More, Ignatius of Loyola, and Thomas Merton—respected 15th through 17th centuries historical figures with different vocation and spheres of influence—admired Kempis' book. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, carried it with him at all times.

Is this book for us? The book challenges us to remember that at the end of our lives, what matters is not our human accomplishments, but did we chase after Christ in our hearts. I hope that you will join us in October and November for our study! The books are \$5 and available from the church office. The reading plan is set up to be read usually one chapter per day, similar to a devotional.

October 13: We will discuss the book and read Book 1, chapters 1-4 together. (There is nothing to read ahead of time.)

October 20: Book 1, Chapters 5-11 November 10: Book 2, Chapters 1-6
October 27: Book 1, Chapters 12-18 November 3: Book 1, Chapters 19-25 November 24: Book 4, Chapters 1-18

(We will not being discussing Book 3 during our study)



Dear Friends,

This morning, I read an interview from a popular Christian author. This author has sold many books, mostly to more progressive Christian women. In fairness, I have not read a single book by the author. Yet that is not why I read the interview. I read the interview, because the author revealed she has not been part of a church for years and will likely never attend church again. She laid out her reasons, which I could have guessed before I read the article. The author declared that she still believes and follows Jesus, but she does not want anything to do with the church.

I do not know the author personally. I also do not disagree that churches can be very imperfect, sometimes even hurtful institutions. Churches are full of imperfect people who do not always embody the faith we are called to live. Yet I found myself heartbroken for this author, for this reason: if she thinks she can follow Jesus outside of the church, she does not know Jesus.

The church is not an unintended side effect of Jesus' teaching. The church was always plan A. Jesus chose his disciples to found the church (hence why he changed Simon's name to Peter, since he was the rock on which Jesus would build the church). Jesus described the church as his bride. He gave his life for his church. To say you follow Jesus but you want nothing to do with the church misses the entire point of Jesus' ministry.

We are not perfect at Faith Global Methodist Church. I am not a perfect pastor. We make mistakes. We have likely unintentionally hurt people. We have not lived into our faith. We are still being perfected by Christ. Sometimes, we are hypocrites. (Side note: When someone says they don't go to church because it is full of hypocrites, my favorite response is: "Wrong. We have plenty of space for more hypocrites to meet Jesus.") I don't support the church because it is perfect. I support the church because it is the bride of Christ.

In the next few years, things will inevitably change, simply because the world around us is changing. As we try to develop a new vision and new ministries, not all of them may be "our" things. They may not be directed at us or "feed" us. We may be tempted to withdraw from some of the things happening, because they are not our preference or working for us. That is missing the point. We are not part of the church because it is perfect or suited for us. We are the church because we are called by Jesus to be the church.

Hope in the Midst of Tragedy

As I write this on Friday September 12, the weight of events of the past few weeks are very present in my thoughts. Violence seems to dominate every news cycle—another school shooting, a subway murder, and a shocking assassination. Yesterday many gathered around the country to honor those lost in the attacks on September 11, 2001. At my workplace, a colleague shared an old photo of a young man, a family member, who lost his life at the Pentagon that day. In moments like these, I believe God welcomes our questions. When we choose to trust in Him and in His word, and when we take time to look for signs of His presence—even in the darkest circumstances—we can find hope.

Genesis 50: 20 reminds us: "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives." Joseph spoke these words to his brothers, assuring them that God had transformed their harmful actions into a means of salvation for many. This can be our prayer too - that God would use these painful events to bring about good in our lives, our communities, our nation, and our world.

I recently heard an interview with two members of Congress - politicians from opposite sides of the aisle who disagree on many issues. But (Isn't it beautiful how God often works in the "but" moments?) they shared that they are also good friends. Each week, they gather with other men and women in Congress to pray. What a praise and powerful reminder that even in places of division, God is at work, drawing people together in prayer.

As we continue to navigate difficult news and uncertain times, may we hold fast to the truth that God is near. He is not distant from our pain. He is present, working through even the darkest moments to bring light, healing, and hope.

Let us always look to see how God is moving, and as Paul said, "pray continually" - for our pastor and church, our community, nation, the world, and for one another.



"Grab & Go" Operation Fresh Express Monday, October 20, 2025

Faith Church volunteers will be directing traffic, handing out boxes of food, and monitoring inside the church building by the restrooms. This is a drive-thru event in our church parking lot. The clients remain in their vehicles as the volunteer workers place the boxes of food in their cars.



<u>Parking attendants should arrive by 2 p.m.</u> because many of the clients arrive early in order to get in line. All other volunteers should arrive by 3 p.m. and park on the grass to the left of Dollman Way. Dress for the weather; it is held outdoors rain or shine.

Collecting Socks for the Needy in October

Faith Church has the opportunity to help the homeless by donating socks for men, women, and children. You may be surprised to learn that **socks are the least donated clothing item and yet the most in demand for the needy.** Homeless people often will receive items of food, but very rarely do they receive socks.

There's a lot of different ways that you can hand out socks. Consider carrying a couple of pairs in your purse, in your briefcase, or in your glove box for when you're at a red light or at an exit ramp where there's a homeless person. Take that awkward moment and turn it into something beautiful by handing the homeless person some socks.

"What kind of socks?" With cold weather approaching, heavy winter socks are excellent; for example, hunting socks. Crew socks are also perfect. Don't worry about the color, but don't buy no-shows, tube, or ankle socks.



Throughout the month of October, Faith Church will be accepting donations of socks that will be donated to local agencies.

Homelessness, unfortunately, covers all ages.

Some facts about socks & feet:

- In cold enough conditions, frostbite can occur in 30 minutes or less. Warm, well-fitting socks can prevent this for many people.
- Moisture-wicking socks are especially important for those facing the summer heat and humidity. They can help prevent infections and blisters.
- Bacteria and fungi thrive in warm, moist environments. Clean, dry socks can go a long way to avoiding foot infections.
- Clean, well-fitting socks can be just as important as medication or insulin for those that deal with diabetes.

- 1 non-breakable jar of jelly or jam
- 1 box of instant hot chocolate
- ◆ 1 box of muffin or coffee cake mix
- 1 non-breakable Christmas ornament
- 1 Christmas card that is signed by you



Promises, Promises—

Remember that Dionne Warwick hit song, "Promises, Promises"? She assertively sang, "I'm all through with promises..." Hal David wrote the lyrics about breaking free from a bad relationship and misguided promises and then moving on to better, healthier things.

How many of us have had promises made by a boss for a promotion and a raise that never happened? Are we still waiting for the landlord to fix the plumbing like he said he would? We get skeptical, and ask ourselves if those promises were deceitfully made. In a relationship that doesn't last, placing trust in the wrong person leads to hurt, as Dionne's heartfelt song tells us.

Conversely, how many of us have given our word of honor and failed to keep it? Even though our pledges have no deceit and are sincerely made, stuff happens and we don't follow through. Bottom line – promises are broken. I daresay no one has been exempt from the pain of an unkept promise, and everyone has caused disappointment by not keeping one. I suppose it's natural for us to be skeptical when it comes to all this promising stuff because, well, it's human nature to be wary of human nature.

It's an entirely different story when we consider God's promises, however, because God is *super*natural. God's promises are never empty, let alone deceitful. He is holy and perfect. His never-changing character reliably guarantees He will be true to His word. We can have the utmost trust, confidence, and faith that what He says, goes.

Depending who's counting, there are between 1,500 to over 4,000 promises of God recorded in the Bible. When we read Scripture, we learn about the pledges our Heavenly Father has made to comfort, heal, restore, take care of, and bless His children. His word is true.

A hurtful situation of broken promises and betrayal can leave us feeling despised and rejected. Jesus can relate. Knowing that He understands can make His commitment to never leave us more meaningful. We gain a deeper experience of comfort as we feel His presence.

Out of the thousands of biblical promises, John reminds us of an especially precious guarantee: If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness....And this is what he promised us—eternal life. 1 John 1: 9, 2: 25

We who believe in the saving work of our Lord have the assurance of all of His promises, and that gives us confidence in **Sharing Christ's Love Through Faith**. When we tell others that Jesus waits to take the pain of their disappointing situations and broken lives and wants to make all things new, their trust in His kind of promises "can lead to joy...and hope...and love. Yes, love!"




