Therefore go

*Then Jesus came to them and said, “All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. **Therefore go** and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit....” Matthew 28:18-19*

This passage, commonly referred to as the Great Commission, was spoken by Jesus to His disciples shortly before His ascension into heaven. As His final directive to the church, Jesus communicated the importance and urgency of the mission entrusted to all believers.

The instruction to spread the gospel is not isolated to a single moment or just during the Mission Impact Celebration.

Rather, it is found throughout all four gospels and the book of Acts as a repeated command to **go – serve – share – and witness** as believers.

God invites people at every stage of life to participate in sharing the good news of Jesus. Whether young or old, with a variety of experiences and skills, each person plays a vital role in carrying the message, not only to the ends of the earth but also within their own backyard.

There are many ways to participate or remain involved in missions. Volunteer with one of the mission partner's organizations, go on a church mission trip, become part of a prayer team for a specific mission partner, write encouraging notes, serve on a team with Grace Kitchen, or even become a member of the Mission Leadership Team or MIC in 2027.

Jesus reminds us, *“The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.”*

We hope you will respond *“Here I am. Send me!”*

February 7

Faith Promise

“Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.” 2 Cor. 9:7

When participating in Faith Promise, you make a commitment to rely on God's provision by declaring, “In dependence on God, I will endeavor to give \$____.” This act is not an ordinary offering; rather, it represents an extra gift that may only be possible by trusting God to supply what is needed. Through this step of faith, you invite the Lord to work in your life, allowing Him to provide beyond your own capabilities. Faith Promise contributions fully support local and global mission work. Your commitment helps spread the gospel and address needs worldwide.

Faith Promise is scriptural in focus. It is the church's God-given task to make disciples of all nations. Paul teaches in 2 Corinthians 8 and 9, a Faith Promise is an amount:

- ◆ more than one can afford that follows personal commitment (8:2- 5)
- ◆ is an optional test of love (8:8)
- ◆ promised in advance of the giving (9:5)
- ◆ personally purposed (9:7)
- ◆ you give cheerfully (9:7)
- ◆ provided by God (9:8)

We will gather Faith Promise Commitments at our MIC closing Worship Services tomorrow, February 8th. After prayerful consideration as an individual, couple, or family, mark your card with the amount God has placed on your heart to give. You are not asked for your name because what you promise is between you and the Lord.

Remember, Faith Promise is a special offering which you will trust God to provide out of His grace. Don't pray, “*Lord how much should I give, instead pray boldly, Lord how much should I keep?*”

Blessings feed a grateful heart. Anticipate God's provision; and then commit to give it.

February 6

Missional Needs for Lowcountry Church Plant

God has opened a mission field in the growing communities of the Charleston metro region, including Summerville, Nexton, Carnes Crossroads, Ridgeville, and Hanahan—places teeming with new families but lacking spiritual footprints within their living communities. Thousands have come for jobs and prosperity, yet only 3-8 percent attend a church and live in intentional accountability to grow in Christian love and service. Our calling is to meet this need through Spirit-led discipleship in small home gatherings that develop into a multiplying movement of Christ-centered community.

As we launch and expand, we seek partners in prayer, encouragement, and tangible support. Below are our most pressing needs as we begin this work:

- **Prayer Support:** Above all, we need faithful intercessors who will cover this mission in prayer—asking God to open hearts, raise leaders, and move powerfully in this region. We hope to form a prayer network that lifts up our small groups weekly.
- **Financial Partnership:** Start-up funds are needed as we plan a missional training hub, have need of home group materials, future outreach events, discipleship resources, and the basic costs of formation (communication, hospitality, and printed materials). As new groups are launched, support will also help provide a part-time ministry budget for pastoral and leadership development.
- **Resources and Equipment:** We need Bibles and devotional materials for new believers, small group teaching materials, and basic technology (such as a projector, portable sound equipment, banners, and signs) to support future gatherings and outreach events.
- **Mentorship and Ministry Partnership:** We welcome connections with missional pastors, musicians, and lay leaders who can encourage and partner with us as we grow—sharing wisdom, training, or even short-term mission teams to invest in our small group leaders as they come alongside us.

Together, we can reach a region that is materially full but spiritually hungry, helping people encounter Jesus Christ and become disciples who make disciples.

Pray: Commit to interceding for the people and mission of Lowcountry Church Plant.

Provide: Partner financially or with materials to equip home groups and outreach.

Participate: Partner through mentorship, training, and relational support as we grow God's Kingdom together.

January 2

Sharing Showers of Blessings

Daniel Whittle, a soldier wounded in the civil war wrote a hymn titled – “There will be Showers of Blessings.” His inspiration came from the prophet Ezekial, “*I will bless my people and their homes around my holy hill. And in the proper season I will send the showers they need. There will be showers of blessing.*” Ezekial 34:26 NLT

In this passage, God promised a time when He would re-gather His people, the nation Israel, and pour out His blessings upon them. Like many of us, Whittle wished for God’s blessings, but knew that people must turn to God and seek Him wholeheartedly to receive them.

Ezekial reminds us that it is God who brings down the showers of blessing. Not a mist. Not small drops. But cascades. God uses other people to bless us, and He also uses us to pour out showers of blessings on others.

St. John’s is in a season of blessings with its Jerusalem and Judea mission partners. Like a parched heart in a dry season looking for drops of love for needed relief, St John’s members are called to praise, pray, give and serve.

Is your soul in a season of sharing and serving? Thank God on all occasions for His blessings. Recall them. Count them. Share them. Blessings are not meant to be locked away but given away. To the degree you have been blessed, so bless others. Be a blessing with your presence, with your energy to serve, with encouraging words. Be a blessing with your financial gifts.

We are called to actively participate in missions by serving and witnessing together in our own backyard within Aiken and throughout South Carolina. This means coming alongside others and sharing God’s love through tangible acts of service, fervent prayer, and needed support. We strengthen relationships and show our faith through action, thereby making meaningful impact close to home.

What showers of blessings have you been given that you need to share with others?

Lowcountry Church Plant

Rev. Daniel Griswold

“Then the master told his servant, ‘Go out to the roads and country lanes and compel them to come in, so that my house will be full.’” Luke 14:23

What is the Lowcountry Church Plant’s Mission?

About ten years ago, I was appointed pastor to three rural churches in Ridgeville, outside Charleston. A leader from Mount Tabor Methodist Church drove me through miles of pine forest and said, “All of this land is going to be people.” He was right. Within a few years, new communities—Nexton, Carnes Crossroads, and Cane Bay—rose from the ground, now home to over 40,000 residents. With major investments like the \$1 billion Volvo plant, rail hubs, and the world’s largest Walmart Distribution Center, the region has transformed into a thriving hub of growth.

As I served these churches, I felt the Holy Spirit’s call: this expanding region is a mission field in need of the Gospel. Yet amid all the planning—stores, offices, and entertainment—no space was made for churches. We are building communities without spiritual foundations, by design. Through prayer and discernment with my wife, Amanda, we embraced God’s vision to begin a new work of the Spirit here.

Drawing from years of ministry experience and early Methodist renewal, we believe the best way to begin is as the early church did—in small, Spirit-filled groups meeting in homes. These gatherings will focus on worship, accountability, and mission, forming disciples who live out the Gospel in their daily lives. Rather than starting with a traditional Sunday service, we will cultivate a “community of communities,” allowing the Holy Spirit to guide us in determining when to gather all together for corporate worship in the future, perhaps in quarterly meetings like Francis Asbury did in the American frontier.

With the primitive church in the book of Acts as our model, we pray to multiply the DNA of our first small group and launch new groups throughout 2026–2027—twelve in total is the current goal for the next two years—each focused on deep, missional worship loving God and serving our neighbors. Our mission is to gather those far from God and help them find life in Jesus Christ. This is fertile ground for the Holy Spirit to move and grow a new revival of God’s holy love.

January 4

By fostering these deep connections, the church seeks to encourage and sustain those who are making a positive impact through community ministry efforts.

This year, Mission Impact Celebration 2026 will focus on supporting mission partners within the areas of Jerusalem, Samaria, and Judea – specifically the work of mission partners located in Aiken and South Carolina.

Pray for everyone at St. John’s Methodist Church to receive the Holy Spirit, be empowered as witnesses for Jesus, and serve generously. Also pray that members find opportunities to live out their faith, support missions, and share the Good News in and throughout our community.

The Importance of Prayer in Missions

“Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful.” Colossians 4:2

John Wesley recognized the role of prayer by stating, “God does nothing on earth save in answer to believing prayer.” This highlights how necessary prayer truly is. Prayer is not only needed—it is powerful!

God accomplishes His work in the world through the prayers of His people. Our prayers become how God shapes circumstances and brings transformation. As we devote ourselves to prayer, we participate in God’s mission and witness His activity in the world.

Prayerfully consider their joys as well as their struggles, offering thanksgiving for the evidence of God’s work through their service.

As you pray, seek God’s direction on how you might become more involved and make meaningful connections with others. Ask how you might support and encourage mission partners and those impacted by their work in deeper ways.

Consider participating in service activities on Saturday, February 7th – working with Stand at the Crossroads, using your hands with the Jack Meeks Wheelchair Ramp ministry, joining with others on the Prayer Bus, or serving at ACTS with your family are just a few opportunities. We also ask everyone to write a thank you note or a note of encouragement for mission partners—to be delivered on Sunday February 8th while visiting their booths!

Ask God to reveal opportunities for you to participate in His work and to strengthen your commitment to serving others selflessly in the days ahead.

Joseph's Coat Ministry

"For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." Ephesians 2:10

Joseph's Coat is a yarn ministry founded at St. John's in May 2011. A group of ladies (some are church members, and some are not) meet twice a month to knit and crochet items for those in need.

Joseph's Coat was founded on the principle of Isaiah 49:13 – *"Shout for joy, you heavens; rejoice, you earth; burst into song, you mountains! For the Lord comforts His people and will have compassion on them."*

Over the past fourteen years, Joseph's Coat has provided items for over twenty-five groups and agencies. One major project is providing a blanket and knitted pillow to every recipient of the Jack Meeks Wheelchair Ramp Ministry. We have also provided blankets to hospices.

On one occasion, our blanket was delivered to a patient experiencing significant anxiety and distress. After the blanket was placed over the individual, he appeared visibly calmer and at peace.

On a joyful note, we provide a blanket every May to each kindergarten graduate of the St. John's SEED program. We have given 124 kindergarten blankets so far. In keeping with the Bible story of Joseph's coat of many colors, our items are created in every color imaginable.

At ACTS, our purpose is to partner with churches, organizations, and individuals to provide assistance to our neighbors in need, in the name of Jesus Christ. Since 1986, we have been helping households in Aiken County move from need toward their God-given potential through care for everyday necessities: food, clothing, utilities, medical supplies and prescriptions, transportation, and household furnishings.

We serve seniors, low-income families, people facing unexpected crises, and those who simply need a helping hand to stand firm. Many in our community face challenges of poverty, illness, utility or housing emergencies, or lack access to basic resources; at the same time, we rejoice in the many blessings God provides.

We have a brigade of gracious donors, faithful volunteers, stories of regained stability, of neighbors helped, and of hope restored. Malachi 3:10 reminds me of the foundation ACTS was built upon—churches pooling resources (“the storehouse”) to ensure neighbors have what they need. God responds to generosity with overflowing provision, something we here at ACTS witness daily. The work is not always easy, but each life touched, each need met, is a testimony to God’s compassion flowing through us.

Epworth Children’s Home Ministry Team

“Therefore, as God’s chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience.”
Colossians 3:12

Epworth serves more than 1,800 children and families in South Carolina each year through a variety of programs, all with an overriding goal of protecting children from neglect and abuse.

Epworth’s work requires licensed counselors, teachers, social workers, clergy, house parents, nurses, and other professionals. Working with children and families who are hurting and facing complicated problems requires a loving spirit but also stamina. Burnout is common among caring professions, so Epworth, like other charities, sometimes faces high turnover for certain staff positions.

Epworth’s Board of Trustees also plays a vital role by helping leadership staff make tough decisions about how to plan, evaluate, and allocate limited resources. The Board meets quarterly and is comprised of ministers, business and community leaders, and citizens.

Finally, Epworth’s work depends heavily on churches, volunteers, and donors. Volunteers help staff maintain facilities, grounds, resource closets, and more. Donors help provide one-third of the operating expenses required for Epworth’s basic missions. Churches shower Epworth children with Christmas gifts and often respond with extraordinary compassion and generosity when Epworth staff are searching for urgent help for families.

Epworth Children's Home

Founded by South Carolina Methodists in 1896, Epworth has cared for hundreds of children yearly for more than a century.

Today, Epworth still cares for children through its residential program. But it also serves approximately 1,800 children and families statewide through a range of other innovative programs. In the Midlands region alone, which includes Aiken, Epworth's ministry includes:

- A supportive Independent Living Center for young adults, 18-23, who have aged out of the foster care system but still need a helping hand.
- A Family Care Center that gives single moms in recovery from drugs or alcohol a supportive path to reunification with their children.
- A community counseling center offering faith-informed mental health care.
- One of the state's largest and most respected foster care recruitment, licensing and support services and a Kinship Care program serving grandparents and others raising children not their own.
- Early intervention pre-school/ in-home services for children, 1-3, with developmental delays.
- Family preservation services that help struggling, loving families access the help they need to avoid involvement with the child welfare system.

Circle of Parents, which are groups where parents share ideas, experiences, and encouragement with each other.

In these ways, Epworth fulfills its mission to serve children, youth, and families through caring, safe, Christian communities, where hurts are healed, hope is nurtured, and faith in God, self, and others is developed.

South Carolina churches continue to bless Epworth by volunteering, donating funds, and taking part in *Christmas with Epworth*. Epworth staff witness their graciousness, generosity, and Christian spirit every single day.

At Life Choices, we understand that choosing parenting is a crucial decision that comes with both joys and challenges. That's why we provide a range of services designed to help clients feel informed, prepared, and supported. Programs provide clients with knowledge and resources for confident parenting through classes, prenatal care, delivery, infant care, and child development. Programs are delivered by staff and volunteers within an encouraging and non-judgmental environment.

Life Choices also provides practical resources, such as diapers, clothing, and baby gear, to help ease the transition to help families succeed. Our shelves continually need items such as wipes and diapers. We are grateful when the community helps meet these needs!

Stand at the Crossroads Ministries

Stand at the Crossroads Ministries (SATCM) is a Christian-based residence program created to help, encourage and give support to women coming out of brokenness or homelessness who are committed to learning to live healthy, productive lifestyles and work to find employment, save, and then move out into their own place. Our mission is to show them God's love and how to have a relationship with Him.

The following components form the foundation of our approach:

Regular Meetings - The ladies meet with us on a consistent basis. We pray with them and for them, offering spiritual support and encouragement as they navigate their journey.

Employment Assistance - We guide and assist the ladies in finding meaningful employment opportunities to help achieve financial stability.

Financial Preparation - Participants work with Security Federal to develop budgeting skills, improve their credit scores, and establish savings. This guidance is crucial as they prepare to move out and live independently.

Spiritual Growth and Community - The ladies are encouraged to attend church services each Sunday and participate in our weekly Bible Study.

Housing and Transitional Support - We provide housing for the ladies, offering seven apartments and a house for four single women. Each living area is inspected often to ensure it is properly maintained, creating a safe and comfortable environment conducive to healing and growth.

Thrift Store Support - Our store serves as an opportunity for the ladies to work off their housing fee until they secure employment elsewhere. It also plays a role in furnishing apartments and helping ladies in need of clothing.

The challenge is to know how God wants us to serve each lady with their special needs and personalities. The joy is when we see our ladies move out on their own and being all God created them to be - blessing the world around them.

Epiphany Ministry of SC

Epiphany's mission statement is: To show Christ's love to incarcerated and at-risk youth. We believe that no life is beyond redemption, and no heart is too far for God's grace to reach. Through Christ-centered mentorship, weekend outreach ministries, and ongoing support, we bring hope, healing, and a future to incarcerated youth.

Epiphany works with the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) and other facilities serving at-risk youth in the places most forgotten—juvenile detention centers—and offer the transforming message of Jesus to teens longing for purpose, forgiveness, and love. The Covid pandemic resulted in staff changes and facility closures, which disrupted several relationships. Efforts are currently underway to re-establish those connections.

It is a tremendous blessing to watch young people realize their worth, know that unconditional love is real, and forgiveness is possible.

Salkehatchie Summer Service

For many summers, youth and adults from St. John's have served the Lord as part of the Salkehatchie Summer Service – weeklong camps within Aiken and South Carolina. St. John's has played an important role by serving as the campsite for the Sand River camp, providing essential sleeping space and meals for the workers during their week of service in our community. In addition to hosting, the youth from St. John's have actively participated in several Salkehatchie projects within the Aiken area. The church family has continually supported the Salkehatchie Summer Service, both through financial contributions and steadfast prayers, ensuring the ongoing success and impact of these outreach efforts.

The Thrift Store has one full-time and one part-time worker that receive items and care for donations while managing the store and overseeing SATCM ladies who help before getting jobs.

A dedicated team visits every Wednesday to perform maintenance, projects, and repairs. This group has contributed consistently to the ministry, with several members supporting our work for over 26 years since its inception. Their ongoing efforts provide significant value to both our organization and its members.

Board of Directors includes Debbie Lamb, Frank Heckendorf, Linda Anderson, Diane Addis, Roger Ward, Bob Ferguson, and Ken Brooks. All male members serve on our dedicated Wednesday Team.

Ministry Partners are churches and individuals, businesses and organizations in the Aiken area. A few churches such as St. John's, support us financially every month and volunteer during the year to perform special projects.

Kairos Prison Ministry

St. John’s Methodist Church directly supports the ministry of Kairos at two correctional institutions: “McCormick” and “Trenton”. Our mission is to share the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ.

Our strategy is to meet in the prison once a month to promote the fellowship and growth of the body of Christ in the prison environment. Twice a year, we conduct a four-day “Weekend” where we introduce new participants to Jesus Christ and encourage them to participate in the Christian community inside the institution. The Weekend is our opportunity love these men as Jesus loved, to give of ourselves, as Jesus gives of Himself so that these men may experience the Kingdom of God.

How do we do this?

With the support of the Church!

Homemade cookies and delicious meals are an expression of the Agape love of the church for those who are incarcerated. Expressions of Christian love on posters and notecards provide messages of hope. Inside of this environment where the world of prison is temporarily silenced, we present the gospel message of Jesus Christ’s unconditional love and forgiveness.

- Pray for the doors of our prisons in South Carolina to continue to welcome and cooperate with Kairos.
- Pray more volunteers will join in this opportunity to love others in Jesus’ name.

Jack Meeks Wheelchair Ramp Ministry

“And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ.” Colossians 3:23-24

St. John’s men have an established history of constructing wheelchair ramps for individuals in need within our community. As awareness of this initiative grew, community service agencies and individuals began contacting the church when needs were identified.

In the 1990s, the ministry became an important part of Jackie Meeks’ life due to the needs of a family friend. Meeks introduced the need to the Adult Council and established a wheelchair ramp ministry through our church for the local community. Whenever a request came to the church, a home visit was assigned to assess viability and determine if installing a ramp was feasible. If deemed viable, the preferences of the homeowners were considered, including any site preparation that might be required. In cases of rental property, permission is secured from the property owner.

The men involved in this ministry act as God’s messengers throughout Aiken County. They evaluate the situations, plan solutions, and collaborate closely with those in need, with the aim of providing individuals with a sense of independence and dignity.

In 2007, the Master Carpenter called Jack Meeks home. The ministry was subsequently renamed “The Jack Meeks Memorial Ramp Ministry.” The work has continued uninterrupted.

In 2010, members of Joseph’s Coat Ministry joined the initiative, providing a lap robe for each recipient. Today, both men and women of St. John’s remain committed to sharing Christ’s love with residents of Aiken County.

While donations are welcomed, there is no charge for any completed ramp as materials and labor are provided at no cost.

- For safety and protection for the servants building the ramps
- For provision of financial support and resources to meet growing needs
- For new volunteers to maintain the ministry for years ahead

January 14

Aiken Habitat for Humanity Team

Aiken Habitat has an amazing staff and volunteers! We could not operate without each person that is a part of our organization. I have seven employees that play a vital role in this organization and I, Arie Murphy as the leader, could not accomplish what is needed without each one of them.

I can’t say enough about our volunteers and donors! This organization would not exist without each person’s participation. If we lived in a perfect world we would need approximately 700 volunteers to put in a total of 3870 volunteer hours. These numbers are based on work days in each category listed below.

In our ReStore, we would need enough volunteers to work 300 hours per week either driving our trucks, accepting, sorting, and pricing our donations, or being a cashier.

The members of our board of directors dedicate 132 hours annually to their governing responsibilities, making decisions and supporting the staff. Committee members provide 187 hours per year serving on individual committees.

It takes approximately sixteen weeks to complete a house, and we would need enough volunteers to work 2890 hours within that time frame.

However, we do not live in a perfect world but are blessed to have the volunteers we have and are able to accomplish what is needed for this organization.

Specific prayers are requested for:

- Donations continue to flow in with items for our ReStore as well as monetary gifts.
- In 2026, we will begin a new Home Repair Program in Aiken County, and ask that God bless this, and it be a successful endeavor.
- As some of our volunteers age, God will provide new faces to our organization, and we can partner with area churches to complete a “Faith Build.”

In all the work and service at Aiken Habitat, we give thanks to God for the support, and the gifts St. John’s Methodist Church provides to our ministry.

Helping Hands

Helping Hands, Inc. was established as a nonprofit organization on April 11, 1973. The agency was created in direct response to the urgent needs of abused, abandoned, and neglected children within the community. Its first facility was situated on York Street in Aiken, South Carolina.

Since its founding, Helping Hands has remained dedicated to ensuring the safety, health, and well-being of vulnerable children. Today, the agency provides 24-hour care for up to 58 boys and girls, ranging in age from birth to 21 years old. In addition to residential services, Helping Hands actively engages in community education programs designed to reduce risk-taking behaviors among youth and adolescents.

Helping Hands is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life and well-being of children, youth, and families in need. This is achieved through a comprehensive range of residential and community-based services, designed to support improvements in health, foster independent living skills, promote positive educational outcomes, and strengthen resilience through:

- Residential programs that provide safe, supportive environments - structured to address the unique needs of each youth, ensuring their health and safety while promoting personal growth and development.
- Life skills instruction aimed at helping children and youth develop the abilities necessary for independent living.
- Community-based programs designed to reduce risk-taking behaviors among youth and adolescents. These initiatives educate participants about making healthy choices and encourage resilience, supporting positive outcomes within the community.

Created 4 Impact exists to be a transformative force in the lives of those experiencing homelessness, those in recovery, and individuals reentering society from incarceration. We meet immediate needs by providing safe, stable housing through our Bridge Housing program. Beyond shelter, we offer life-skills training, biblical counseling, and Christ-centered community to help people break free from cycles of poverty, addiction, and despair.

The road is not easy. Many who come to us carry heavy burdens of trauma, broken relationships, or financial hardship. Our challenge is to help them not only survive but to truly heal and thrive.

Yet, the greatest joy we experience is watching lives change - seeing someone move from hopelessness to hope, from isolation to belonging, and from bondage to freedom in Christ.

We believe every person is created with purpose, and through God's grace, lives once written off can be redeemed and restored.

The Bridge 2 Home

"The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me.'" Matthew 25:40

The mission of The Bridge 2 Home (The Bridge) is to provide a safe and loving home for girls who have experienced child sex trafficking, where they can find healing and growth and can experience the love of a perfect Heavenly Father who pursues them.

It is so good to know that we are being prayed for and to be reminded that we are not alone.

Our vision is to have a place where children can be protected and safely exit trafficking. It is important that all levels of the organization are trauma-informed, and victim centered. It is our vision to have several campuses and provide safety and security to children and young adults. Our vision is to see trafficked victims become survivors and leaders and transfer the knowledge and healing to other victims, through trauma-informed/victim centered best practices.

The 2023 SC Human Trafficking Task Force Annual Report identified 236 victims of human trafficking. For the children that manage to escape, there are few resources to assist them. Bridge 2 Home in Aiken is a refuge that offers a safe home as girls heal. It is difficult when we receive a girl to create a bond with her. She is guarded and does not trust easily. She often runs away from home. We ask for prayers for her safety and our patience.

Overflow Foundation

Overflow Foundation exists in memory of Phillip Lee Jr, to promote mental wellness in the community, Pouring Hope into Life (#PHIL) by leading individuals to take next steps towards greater resilience, independence, and recovery.

Overflow Foundation was founded in 2019 by a mother who was grieving the loss of her oldest son. Following a dual diagnosis of substance use disorder and bipolar disorder, her son succumbed to severe depression and died by suicide on September 6, 2018.

Noting the rise in suicide rates by the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) and the National Council for Behavioral Health, Overflow Foundation desires to join the fight against suicide by infusing hope into the lives of individuals and families who have been affected by suicide, mental illness, and substance use disorders.

Clubhouse Community of Hope is a part of the Overflow Foundation work. It is a community-based service dedicated to supporting and empowering people living with mental illness, known as Clubhouse members. Based on the Clubhouse Model of psychosocial rehabilitation, the clubhouse offers a collaborative, restorative environment where Clubhouse members can come and participate in a day program, accessing opportunities for employment, socialization, education, skill development, housing and improved overall wellness.

Salkehatchie Marlboro-Flowers Summer Service

Our mission for Salkehatchie Marlboro-Flowers Summer Service is to inspire youth to be disciples of Jesus Christ. The camp was started by our beloved Neil Flowers, who was a member of St John's UMC Aiken. We have served in the Marlboro County area for over 30 years.

Each summer, we gather youth and adult volunteers to provide help to our South Carolina neighbors who live in dilapidated homes. We encourage the volunteers to help make the homes safe, warm, and dry while bringing hope, faith, and love to families in despair. Our camp usually has 60-75 volunteers, which we house and feed for 7 days.

We depend on donations (monetary, time and materials) to complete the repairs needed on the homes. We will normally repair 5 to 7 homes per summer.

We encounter difficulties in securing sufficient donations and recruiting volunteers who are available to work for a week in warm conditions to repair houses. The people of Marlboro County go out of their way to make us feel welcome.

One of the biggest blessings received from this mission is knowing that you have left a family in better shape than when you came. You also establish incredible relationships with the families, the people living in town and other volunteers. You make friends for life!
