113 of the 858 United Methodist Churches or 13% of the churches in SC separated from the denomination on Tuesday June 6. This included the largest UMC in SC. The statewide Annual Conference voted over 1500 to 6 to let these people go in peace and with their property. Those separating this year are in the first wave of separations caused by a fast-paced leftward theological direction in the denomination as evidenced in many areas of Bible-interpretation, including traditional understandings of who Jesus is, the reality of the resurrection, and long-standing doctrines of the church. Sexuality and traditional marriage are also included. It has to be noted, however, that the churches separating welcome all. They are not hate-filled bigots. They, however, clearly want to keep their promises to uphold both the Scripture and the United Methodist Book of Discipline. United Methodist teachings have already been breached in many places in the US, including the Southeast.

For reasons of conscience, this is a disagreement over whether the culture should influence the church more than the church influences the culture. Next year's international governing body is extremely likely to overturn the teaching of the church that currently states that no ministers can be practicing homosexuals or heterosexuals outside of traditional marriage. Many churches are discerning whether they should stay or leave now before the opportunity closes. This is a huge question for local churches because, although other denominations have already gone through this without much repercussions, in the UMC this sends earthquake-size shockwaves because UMC bishops have sole authority to assign ministers. The local UMC churches are connected to other UMCs more tightly than any other denomination except Roman Catholic.

The SC UMC churches "blessed" each other to depart in peace. There was no rancor. Local churches hope to do the same. It takes a 2/3 vote of a congregation to depart, and pay 10% of their property value and liquid assets. For instance, St. John's in Aiken, is in the "Discernment Process," and its costs to separate would be significant. However, St. John's has always been committed to its Methodist roots and to ministry to the community. It is a church that will continue to open its doors to everyone regardless of who they are, and will continue to host the hundreds of groups, concerts, and social programs to aid the community.

Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church to ratify and approve the closure of the below listed churches.

Whereas, the South Carolina Conference has used ¶2549 of *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (2016) to close churches. Many of these churches were closed on an ad- interim basis because of exigent circumstances.

Whereas, the General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in 2019 had before the body changes to *The Book of Discipline* addressing human sexuality. There were no changes made at this Conference to any provision addressing human sexuality.

Whereas, the very clear language of ¶2553 of *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*, adopted by the General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in 2019, allows a church to disaffiliate from the denomination for reasons of conscience regarding a change in the requirements and provisions of *The Book of Discipline* related to the practice of homosexuality, the ordination of self-avowed, practicing homosexuals as resolved and adopted by the 2019 General Conference, or the actions or inactions of the annual conference of that particular local church, related to these issues which followed the 2019 General Conference. Giving these words their ordinary meaning, a local church in South Carolina cannot disaffiliate using ¶2553 of *The Book of Discipline* because of actions or inaction in other annual conferences.

Whereas, Bishop Holston and the South Carolina Conference have not made any statements contrary to *The Book of Discipline* on these issues. The South Carolina Conference has affirmed its commitment to the language and positions set forth in *The Book of Discipline* with consistency.

Whereas, it is clear a number of United Methodist churches in South Carolina find themselves unable to serve the purpose for which they were organized, in that they cannot accept the actions taken in other Conferences of The United Methodist Church and cannot support the possible future actions of future General Conferences as binding on them on the issues of human sexuality. The issues of human sexuality have prevented them in their mission to make disciples for the transformation of the world.

Whereas, the Board of Trustees, with understanding of the difficulties of owning, insuring, and maintaining closed church properties, with prayer, consultation, and reflection, guided by input of the Cabinet and conference leadership, and with the framework of the Agreement format for disaffiliation, developed and refined a Separation Agreement.

Whereas, this Separation Agreement required the local church to participate in a discernment process, and once that was completed allowed for a Church Conference vote on separation from The United Methodist Church.

Whereas, the following churches have followed this process, and by votes of at least 2/3 majority have voted to separate from The United Methodist Church. They have signed a Separation Agreement, and have placed their payments for separation in escrow.

Whereas, these churches are now before this body for approval of their closure, pursuant to the terms of the Separation Agreement.

Whereas, it is the belief of the Board of Trustees that these closures are the best pathway to allow the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church to follow *The Book of Discipline* and to allow these churches desiring to depart to do so with grace.

Therefore, be it resolved, that pursuant to the authority granted to the Board of Trustees and to this body under ¶2549.3(b) of *The Book of Discipline*, as confirmed by the District Superintendents of the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, the Cabinet and Bishop Holston, and authorized by vote of this body, be it here approved that the Separation Agreements duly executed by the following churches shall govern the disposition of the property of the below listed churches. The recorded deeds shall be valid to transfer the title to the real property and this document shall be approved by this body as binding on the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Be it here approved that the following United Methodist churches will be closed effective June 30, 2023.

AFFIRMATION OF THE LGBTQIA+ DELEGATES' CALL TO CENTER JUSTICE AND EMPOWERMENT FOR ALL PEOPLE IN THE UMC.

A resolution submitted to the 2023 South Carolina Annual Conference.

Whereas, in a groundswell response to the passage of harmful legislation at the 2019 Special Session of General Conference, Annual Conferences elected <u>LGBTQIA+</u> clergy and lay persons to be General and Jurisdictional Delegates in record numbers, for the first time empowering LGBTQIA+ delegates to speak and act from our diverse experiences, and

Whereas, the 2019 Special Session of the United Methodist General Conference 1 passed the Traditional Plan, which increased penalties for United Methodists clergy who 2 are LGBTQIA+ and for clergy who support the LGBTQIA+ community through officiating 3 their weddings, and

Whereas, in an attempt to address the divide within The United Methodist Church, an abeyance or moratorium was proposed to the General Conference, referenced below, by the authors of the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation, and

Whereas, we understand our call and responsibility as United Methodists to do good,

do no harm, and stay in love with God, and

Whereas, we call straight and cisgender allies to do good by using their voice and vote to support, empower, and amplify the voices of the LGBTQIA+ community in The United Methodist Church, and

Whereas, 46 LGBTQIA+ General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates from across all five jurisdictions wrote the original resolution which was historically adopted at all five jurisdictional conferences in November 2022.

Therefore be it resolved that the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United

1. Calls attention to the LGBTQIA+ delegates' call to justice and empowerment for the LGBTQIA+ community throughout the South Carolina Annual Conference, within and beyond our local churches, districts, departments, centers, and committees;

2. Encourages the consideration of a spirit of the abeyance or moratorium as proposed to the General Conference, as referenced above, in order to foster conversation, authenticity, and deeper relationships with one another in Christ until changes can be

made in The United Methodist Book of Discipline;

- 3. Encourages the Episcopal leadership, cabinet, and extended cabinet of our Annual Conference to guide us into a period of discernment on matters of human sexuality and develop a resource or list of resources for facilitating ongoing conversation that is scripturally, relationally, and scientifically relevant; implementing an ongoing process of reconciliation through grace-filled conversations on human sexuality aimed at hearing stories of faith and resilience from the margins, educating one 30 another and beginning to heal the harm caused by the church to precious human lives and children of God; seeking to engage in welcoming ministry with our LGBTQIA+ siblings; and, fostering a safe environment for all of this to take place. we encourage either not pursuing, holding in abeyance, or resolving in a timely fashion through a process of just resolution any complaints against clergy regarding their sexual orientation or the officiating of weddings of LGBTQIA+ persons;
- 4. Aspires to become a United Methodist Church in which LGBTQIA+ people will be protected, affirmed, and empowered throughout our life, mission, and ministry together.

This moratorium 55 on all new and pending complaint proceedings concerning human sexuality provisions applies 56 not only to charges that are explicitly based on ¶2702.1b, but also to any charge that the 57 same alleged underlying conduct constitutes a chargeable offense under any other provi- 58 sion of the Discipline, including (without limitation) 'immorality' under ¶ 2702.1a; 59 'disobedience to the order and discipline of The United Methodist Church' under 60 ¶2702.1d; and 'dissemination of doctrines contrary to the established standards of doc- 61 trine of The United Methodist Church' under ¶2702.1e. This moratorium is inclusive of 62

charges related to the following paragraphs: ¶161, ¶304.3, ¶310.2, ¶341.6, ¶613.19, ¶806.9, and ¶2702.1b. This moratorium does not apply to charges under any of these provisions in which the underlying alleged actions address a different subject matter, including but not limited to sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and sexual harassment. This moratorium shall remain in effect until the close of the first General Conference of The United Methodist Church after other denominations separate. Any complaints pertaining to this paragraph filed during this period shall be held in abeyance, and no time limits shall commence until the above-referenced General Conference has concluded."
