Have you ever gotten into trouble and looked up at Ad-nai and said, "How could you let this happen to me?" When we do this, we are trying to blame Ad-nai for our bad choices and the situations that we have gotten ourselves into.

In Parsha Ha'Azinu, we are reminded in Deuteronomy 32:4-5:

4 The Rock—blameless is His work. Indeed, all His ways are just. God of faithfulness without iniquity, righteous and upright is He. 5 Did it corrupt Him? No! The blemish is His children's— a generation crooked and twisted.

We should never blame our perfect Ad-nai for the actions of a corrupt, crooked, or twisted human - especially if that human is us.
