The first goal is to approach all scripture with humility and prayer.

This week's Parsha continues with the narrative that began with Abraham's calling and the establishment of Ad-nai's covenant with Abraham. Ad-nai had promised Abraham a son named Isaac and this week's Parsha Toldot, or Generations, begins with these words from Genesis 25:19:

¹⁹ Now these are the genealogies of Isaac, Abraham's son. Abraham fathered Isaac.

As we read through the Bible, beginning with the Torah and concluding with the Brit HaChadashah, we must always remember that one covenant builds upon all previous covenants and one promise builds upon all previous promises. In this case, Isaac's promised birth testified to the surety of Ad-nai's covenants. It was because the Jewish people had written evidence of Ad-nai's promises coming to pass that they could believe in the fullness of the promise of Messiah.

In Pasha Toldot, we are introduced to a concept that exists even today, the birthright. The birthright establishes certain responsibilities and certain benefits to the first born male of the family. In this week's parsha, we find Esau selling his birthright to Jacob for a bowl of soup. It seems that Esau didn't really value his place as the firstborn son, while it seems that Jacob understood just how valuable the inheritance of the firstborn really was. The reason this is so important to understand is because just as Esau was the first born, Yeshua is the firstborn. But, there is a big difference. Whereas Esau and Jacob fought over which one would have the birthright inheritance, Yeshua gave His life so that we could be joint heirs with Him in His inheritance. How cool is that?
