Every Friday evening, fathers all over the world place their hands upon the heads of their sons and say, "May you be like Ephraim and Manasseh." This week in our Parsha, we find out why. Israel, when blessing his grandchildren whom he had just adopted to become his sons, spoke these words over them:

Genesis 48:20 Then he blessed them that day saying, "In you shall Israel bless by saying: 'May God make you like Ephraim, and like Manasseh. '"Thus he put Ephraim before Manasseh.

These words have been spoken over sons ever since that day. Of course, daughters are blessed by the words, "May you be like Sarah, Rebekah, Rachel, and Leah. You see, these are not just words, but inherited promises...inherited by you.
