## Session 03



CENTRAL TRUTH | We are called to praise Jesus, the Savior.

The Christmas season is packed with all kinds of traditions that we look forward to: spending time with family and friends, ugly sweater contests, Christmas parties, giving and receiving gifts, delicious food, and much more. In this week's passage, we'll see Joseph and Mary participate in a Jewish tradition that involved presenting the baby Jesus to the Lord at the temple. There, the family will encounter two Spirit-filled individuals who worship and celebrate the infant Messiah. Like them, we are called to praise Jesus, the Savior—His arrival is at the heart of Christmas!

### **LUKE 2:25-32**

<sup>25</sup> There was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, looking forward to Israel's consolation, and the Holy Spirit was on him. <sup>26</sup> It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he saw the Lord's Messiah. <sup>27</sup> Guided by the Spirit, he entered the temple. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform

for him what was customary under the law, <sup>28</sup> Simeon took him up in his arms, praised God, and said, <sup>29</sup> Now, Master, you can dismiss your servant in peace, as you promised. <sup>30</sup> For my eyes have seen your salvation. <sup>31</sup> You have prepared it in the presence of all peoples — <sup>32</sup> a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory to your people Israel.

### **LUKE 2:33-35**

<sup>33</sup> His father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. <sup>34</sup> Then Simeon blessed them and told his mother Mary, "Indeed, this child is destined to cause the fall


and rise of many in Israel and to be a sign that will be opposed —  $^{35}$  and a sword will pierce your own soul — that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."

## **LUKE 2:36-38**

<sup>36</sup> There was also a prophetess, Anna, a daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well along in years, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, <sup>37</sup> and was a widow for eighty-four years. She

did not leave the temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayers. <sup>38</sup> At that very moment, she came up and began to thank God and to speak about him to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

# **ISAIAH 40:1-5**



# **♀ READ & RESPOND**

In Isaiah 40, God is bringing comfort and hope to the exiled Israelites. They haven't earned His forgiveness—God is graciously declaring that their time of discipline is complete. The imagery of road-building suggests that God will remove all obstacles that hinder His presence and His plan for the coming Savior. God's deep love and willingness to comfort His people here ultimately points to the One who will restore all things through His death and resurrection.

# **LUKE 2:25-32**

# **♥ READ & RESPOND**

Simeon was "righteous and devout," and he was waiting for "Israel's consolation"—the Messiah, Jesus! The Holy Spirit was with him and had even told him he wouldn't die until he saw the Messiah. Simeon had been patient and trusted God's promise. Then, one day, Mary and Joseph brought baby Jesus to the temple for dedication. The Holy Spirit guided Simeon right to them! Simeon took Jesus in his arms and praised God with incredible joy. Jesus was coming to bring God's truth and salvation to everyone in the world, no matter their background.

# **LUKE 2:33-35**

# Daily READING

## READ & RESPOND

Simeon then turned to Mary and spoke a tough prophecy: Jesus wouldn't be easily accepted. Some people would reject Him, leading to their "falling" spiritually. Others would believe in Him, leading to their "rising" into new life and salvation. Jesus forces a decision; you can't be neutral about Him. Jesus would also be a "sign"—a clear signal of God's presence and plan—but He would face intense opposition. Finally, Simeon tells Mary that she would face deep sorrow: She would witness the rejection, suffering, and ultimately the crucifixion of her own son. Following Jesus isn't always easy or comfortable. It involves making choices and often facing opposition. But it also reveals what's truly in our hearts.

 → How does this passage challenge your understanding of what it means to follow Jesus?

# **LUKE 2:36-38**

# **♀ READ & RESPOND**

Anna was a devoted follower of God. She was old and had been widowed most of her life, and she never left the temple, worshiping day and night through fasting and prayer. She lived a life centered on God, spending her days seeking His presence, listening, and pouring out her heart to Him. It wasn't about flashy moments, but consistent, quiet faithfulness. Because of this persistent devotion, when Mary and Joseph brought baby Jesus to the temple, Anna was spiritually alert enough to recognize Him. Her long life of faithfulness culminated in this incredible moment of meeting Jesus and sharing the good news.

# **JOHN 1:10-13**

# Daily READING

# PREAD & RESPOND

When Jesus came to the world, many people didn't recognize Him, especially the religious leadership. They studied the ancient Scriptures and prophecies and should have known what to look for, but they still didn't recognize Him. Some did—their hearts were opened and prepared for Him. But many others rejected Him; they missed Him. They had been waiting for Him for centuries, and basically said, "No thanks." But here's the good news for the rest of us: We still have an open invitation to be adopted into His family, not because we earned it—but because of Jesus Himself. We must simply believe in Him.

- ← Why do you think the Jewish leaders didn't recognize who Jesus was?
- God invites us all to be adopted into His family. How does this change your perspective of other believers and how to treat them?
- → What is one practical way you can intentionally "see" Jesus or live out your belonging to God's family this week?
