ABLE is a program under the Ladies Ministry Division of the UPCI.

ABLE provides support to individuals and families impacted by disability, while also offering training for pastors, leaders, and congregations.

Purpose of ABLE Ministry


ABLE's goal is to raise awareness about disabilities and people with special needs within the church, the community, and the world. The ultimate desire is that churches will understand the need to incorporate people of all abilities into their congregations.





Why It Matters

- An estimated 1 in 4 adults in the US are living with a disability
- People with special needs are one of the largest under-reached people groups in the world for the Gospel
- An estimated **85% of churches do not have a special needs ministry** for individuals and families living with disability
- Almost 1/3 of families surveyed who are part of the faith communities said they left their church because their child was not welcomed
- African-American/Black children are often underdiagnosis or misdiagnosis, receive delayed disagnosis & have limited advocacy and support
- Many Black families turn to faith-based communities for support and guidance on disability-related challenges





THE CHURCH SHOULD...

Be ABLE - Accept, Believe, Love, and Embrace those with disabilities Have a disability ministry

 The ministry should be led by someone passionate about reaching the disabled community

Conduct a Church Accessibility Audit

- Physical Accessibility: Ensure buildings and facilities are accessible to people with diverse physical needs
- Programmatic Accessibility: Assess worship services,
 Bible studies, and other programs to identify and remove barriers
- Communication Accessibility: Use tools like captioning, ASL interpretation, and braille materials to support diverse needs





THE CHURCH SHOULD...

Provide whole church training on being disability friendly at least bi-annually

- Can be provided by an ABLE representative or someone familiar with disability resources
- Training for those working with kids should occur more frequently


Be intentional about incorporating those with disabilities to serve in ministry
Understand that people with disabilities can and do get saved

Provide accommodations wherever possible (ex. sensory rooms, headsets, etc.)




Buddybreak.org
