We have all been mad at God at one time or another. We resist God's call because we think we know how the situation 'should' turn out; however, when the result is the complete opposite, we become disappointed and angry.

Read Jonah 1-4

- I. <u>Jonah's journey the messy road of an honest prophet.</u>
- Jonah thought God should punish the people of Nineveh.
  - 1. Share a time when a situation did not turn out the way you expected.
  - 2. What was your reaction? What was the final result?
- II. Jonah's personal sense of justice was offended.
- God's offer of grace often offends our sense of justice.
  - 3. When was your sense of justice offended by God's offer of grace to someone or some group?
  - 4. Explain why your sense of justice was offended.
  - 5. Be honest: who in your life do you secretly hope does not receive God's offer of grace?
- III. Jonah is not our only example of someone who was disappointed and angry.
- Scripture is full of examples of those who were disappointed and angry about the way God handled a situation.

- 7. What can you learn from these biblical stories about handling disappointment/anger toward God?
