

LESSON SNAPSHOT

BOTTOM LINE:

Like Ruth, Big Heroes are loyal.

OBJECTIVE:

Kids will learn the importance of being loyal to others.

KEY PASSAGE:

Ruth 1. Ruth's Loyalty to Naomi.

MEMORY VERSE:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us." - Hebrews 12:1 (NIV)

SUMMARY:

Naomi had so little. Her husband and both of her sons had died. She had no money or means to provide for herself. She had no power or clout. And she was in a strange land. But Naomi did have one thing – the loyalty and devotion of her daughter-in-law Ruth. And it was that because of Ruth that Naomi's life was changed for the better. When we are loyal to our family and friends, we can be heroes like Ruth.

Dear God,

Thank you for heroes that show us what it means to be loyal. Help us to be loyal to our friends and our family.

MEMORY VERSE

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us." - Hebrews 12:1 (NIV)

"A huge cloud of witnesses is all around us. So let us throw off everything that stands in our way. Let us throw off any sin that holds on to us so tightly. Let us keep on running the race marked out for us." - Hebrews 12:1 (NIrV)

LARGE GROUP:

Divide the room into girls and boys. Have the girls and boys read the verse aloud together, alternating every other word, so girls say the first word, boys say the second word, girls the third, etc.

SMALL GROUP:

Have the kids sit in a circle, then walk around them "Duck, Duck, Goose" style. Kids say the next word in the memory verse as you tap them on the head. (K-2nd)

Have the kids practice saying their memory verse, then see who can say it backwards. (3rd-5th)



SKIT

DAMSEL IN DISTRESS: LOYALTY

ITEMS NEEDED:

Black outfit (for the villain)

Rope

CHARACTER BREAKDOWN: 2M, 1F

CHARACTERS:

Damsel

Villain

Potential Hero

Our Damsel is on the railroad tracks tied up with rope. The Villain stands over her.

VILLAIN: I've got you now, Damsel.

DAMSEL: Until me at once, cruel villain.

VILLAIN: Alright fair Damsel, I will.

DAMSEL: You will?

VILLAIN: Yes. As soon as you give me the information that I want to know. Tell me where the sheriff is planning to-.

DAMSEL: You can stop right there. I'm not going to tell you anything.

VILLAIN: But I will free you right now if you just tell on your friends.

DAMSEL: Never! The sheriff and his deputies are my friends. They are brave men who I would do anything for. They have my friendship and my loyalty.



VILLAIN: Even if that loyalty means that you go "SPLAT"?

DAMSEL: Even then.

VILLAIN: Suit yourself. I think I need more rope. I need to get it from my bag. I'll be right

back.

Villain exits.

DAMSEL: Help! Help! Save me! I need a hero!

Potential Hero comes into view.

DAMSEL: Oh, my hero, thank goodness you're here.

PH: Oh my goodness. What has happened to you?

DAMSEL: This dastardly villain has taken me and tied me to the railroad tracks.

PH: How cruel. Why would anyone do such a thing?

DAMSEL: He is bent on taking over the town. In order to do that he has to stop the sheriff and his deputies.

PH: And where do you come in?

DAMSEL: Those lawmen are my friends. The villain has taken me in the hopes that I will tell him how he can capture the sheriff and his men.

PH: Why don't you just tell the Villain what he wants to know.

DAMSEL: No. I would never do that.

PH: Why not?

DAMSEL: Because I believe in loyalty.

PH: Loyalty? Is that when you're a king or something?

DAMSEL: You're thinking of royalty. Loyalty means being committed to a person through thick and thin. Loyalty is standing by a person if when times are tough and the going gets rough.



PH: That sounds like a pretty nice quality to have.

DAMSEL: It's a great virtue. All the big heroes have loyalty.

PH: Uh oh.

DAMSEL: What "uh oh"?

PH: I guess I can't be your hero, then. I don't have much loyalty. My friend Jack asked me to help him fix his barn today and I said I didn't want to. That's why I came out here – to get away from Jack.

DAMSEL: But it's not too late to turn things around. After you help me get free, you can still go to Jack. You can tell him you're sorry, and then help him build that barn. You can still be a loyal man. You can still be a hero.

PH: You really think so?

DAMSEL: I really do.

PH: You're so great. Thank you. (yelling off) You hear that, Jack? Your loyal friend is on his way.

Potential Hero rushes off.

DAMSEL: Wait! You forgot the part where you until me. Oh, poo. (beat) Help! I need a hero!



OBJECT LESSON OR KIDS SERMON

ITEMS NEEDED:

Doggie bowl

Do you know what this is? Who or what would one of these belong to?

This is a food bowl for a pet. It could be for a cat or a dog, I suppose. But this one is meant to be used by a dog.

I love dogs. Does anyone else love dogs? What makes a dog so great?

Give the kids an opportunity to answer.

Dogs have a lot of great qualities. They're energetic. They're affectionate. They're hap py. One of the things that dogs are known for is being loyal. They love their owners and stick by them no matter what.

If you're having a good day, your dog is right there to share your joy. If you've had a terrible day, the dog is still right beside you. Whether you're rich, poor, or somewhere in between, your dog doesn't care. He is loyal through thick and thin.

That's an admirable thing: loyalty. It something we appreciate in our pets and some thing we admire in other people. And it's a quality that we should seek to possess.

Loyalty: it's the stuff of heroes.



LARGE GROUP GAME

KNOCK OUT

ITEMS NEEDED:

Trash can Tennis balls

INSTRUCTIONS:

Choose three to five kids to play. Have an adult be the leader (try to find a good basket-ball player for this one) and the kids will be followers.

The adult begins by standing somewhere on the stage and shooting a tennis ball into the trash can. Each kid follows with a shot from the same location. When a kid misses, they are out.

After each kid has shot, the adult picks another spot and shots again, with kids following as before.

If the adult misses the shot on any turn, then the kids have to miss the shot too. The goal here isn't to always make the basket, but to follow what the leader did. If a kid doesn't match the adult's outcome, he is out.

The last kid following the adult wins!

VARIATION:

For younger kids, allow them two or three attempts to make the shot.

WHAT'S THE POINT?

Ruth was loyal to Naomi, willing to follow her anywhere no matter what the outcome.



LARGE GROUP LESSON

BOTTOM LINE:

Like Ruth, Big Heroes are loyal.

OBJECTIVE:

Kids will learn the importance of being loyal to others.

KEY PASSAGE:

Ruth 1. Ruth's Loyalty to Naomi.

INTRO

We all have heroes. People that we admire, look up to, want to be like. People who have done amazing things and possess amazing qualities. Those qualities are what we call virtues. Virtues like obedience, humility, and commitment.

Heroes also need to be loyal. No one is going to put his confidence in someone who is there for you one minute and then gone the next. None of us wants friends who run away whenever things get difficult. We want to know that someone is loyal – that they will be there for you through thick and thin.

Naomi was an old woman who didn't have much. Her husband and both of her sons had died. She had no money or means to provide for herself. She had no power or clout. And she was in a strange land.

But Naomi did have one thing – the loyalty and devotion of her daughter-in-law Ruth.

READ Ruth 1.

MAIN POINT

No matter what Naomi did or how much she argued with Ruth, Ruth wasn't going anywhere. Even though Naomi had nothing, Ruth was completely loyal to Naomi.

LARGE GROUP LESSON

As we read on in the story of Ruth, when the two women returned to Israel, Ruth would go into the fields and pick up the grain that had been left behind by the farmers. It was with this grain that Ruth was able to feed herself and Naomi. Naomi was too old to do this work herself – there's no telling how Naomi would have survived if Ruth hadn't been loyal to her mother-in-law.

Eventually Ruth married a man named Boaz. But even then, she remained faithful to Naomi. Ruth and Boaz treated Naomi as if she were their own mother. And when they had a son, named Obed, Naomi held the baby in her arms and cared for it like it was her own grandchild.

Naomi lived out her days happy and contented. And she owed it all to the loyalty of her daughter-in-law, Ruth.

DRIVE IT HOME

Are you a loyal person? When the going gets tough, do you stick around and help, or do you hit the road?

You have friends. And like every person on the planet, your friends are going to go through hard times. The kind of person/friend/hero you are will be determined by what you do when those hard times come.

Your friends need your support and loyalty. If you know someone who is having a hard time understanding math, offer to help her study. (Unless you're bad at math too; then maybe you could both find another person to help.) If you have a friend who seems to be having a rough time in his home life, invite him to hang out at your place when he can. If your friend seems down, invite him to talk to you about their problems. If they need more help than you can give, you can still promise to be there with them every step of the way.

That's what loyalty is. Being there every step of the way. When people see that we are loyal they will be drawn to us. People want to know that someone has their back and will never let them down.

We all want to be loyal people. And with God's help, we can be those people. Ask God for the strength and courage to be loyal. Ask him to bring people into your life who will be loyal when you face problems in your life. And turn to him continually, because God is loyal to us. If we follow him, and the example of heroes like Ruth, we can be loyal people.

CLOSE WITH A SIMPLE PRAYER

Dear God, Thank you for heroes that show us what it means to be loyal. Help us to be loyal to our friends and our families.

What you need to know:


Who do you know that is going through a difficult season? Take some time this week to reconnect with them. Offer to help them in any way that you can. Reassure them of your loyalty to them.






