

MOBILE MEDICAL CLINICS

In the midst of war and devastation, Mission Eurasia's Mobile Medical Clinics are lifelines of healing and hope for the people of Ukraine who have little or no access to care. Each refurbished vehicle, equipped with exam rooms, medical supplies, and staffed by compassionate professionals, can treat up to 50 patients a day while also providing emotional and spiritual support through our young leaders and trauma counsellors. These clinics not only heal bodies but also bring comfort to wounded hearts by sharing God's Word and the message of hope.



GOSPEL OF MARK EDITION FOR UKRAINIAN MILITARY PERSONNEL

The Gospel of Mark booklets were developed by the Ukrainian Armed Forces Military Chaplain Training Center as a targeted evangelistic resource. They feature messages, prayers, testimonies, contact information, and a distribution plan, all designed to share the hope of Jesus Christ with service members. Three specialized editions address the specific needs of new recruits, women in the military, and sergeants/officers. Distribution is led by military chaplains (more than 200 full-time chaplains at battalion and brigade levels), handed out with humanitarian aid via the Ukraine for Christ FOUR VICTORY project and the Christian Medical Association, and provided to every cohort of chaplains and chaplain assistants trained at the Chaplain Training Center. **A Word for Those Who Bear Responsibility
How the Gospel of Mark Supports
Ukrainian Officers**



Some of you may remember that Denis served as the Mission Eurasia International Director in Ukraine before the war, bringing invaluable experience as a Church minister, missiologist, and military serviceman. Teaches at the Military Chaplain Training Center of the Military Institute of the Taras Shevchenko National University of Kyiv.

Chaplain Viktor, a Protestant pastor serving with the Ukrainian Armed Forces for two years, combines prayer with quiet, life-changing conversations. On visits to officers' tents, where tactical decisions and heavy responsibilities are carried, he handed each officer a compact military edition of the Gospel of Mark, with an introduction, prayers, and reflection pages. Initially received with polite reserve, the booklet later prompted Major Ihor to confess he had never read the Bible. However, he found Mark's concise, direct message, especially Mark 10:45, about serving rather than being served, profoundly resonant with officer ethics. Since then, several officers have begun reading the Gospel before deployments, after meetings, or during night shifts. Chaplain Viktor recognizes not all will outwardly respond, but he trusts the Word quietly takes root in weary hearts, helping even those in command hear a deeper, guiding voice.



In Zaporizhzhia, just 30 km from the front, life and hope continue: the Reimer Center and Future Clubs ran a workshop where about twenty children made scented candles and wooden holders—lavender and wood scents, laughter, and the quiet focus of hands at work turned simple crafts into symbols of warmth and hope. Leaders noted how creating calms the mind and “the darker it is around, the more you want to turn on the light.” The Center also launched a new season of “Schools Without Walls,” gathering about twenty young people to explore vocation as a posture of the heart and to learn from Joseph’s story that God’s plans, though hard, are ultimately good; through prayer, sharing, and teaching the Reimer Center is nurturing a new generation of leaders ready to serve.

Supporting Ukraine’s Fight Against Hunger and Sharing the Gospel



In 2025, thanks to generous donations, we shipped two containers of over a million servings of food into Zaporizhzhia, Ukraine, in partnership with Ontario Christian Gleaners. Roman, our on-the-ground contact, reports that with 70% food insecurity in the region due to ongoing conflict, the need is urgent. These supplies are providing vital relief on the front lines, while our “Schools Without Walls” students are sharing the Gospel alongside the aid, offering hope in the midst of hardship. The first container arrived in August, and a second is expected before November, with additional shipments planned from Gleaners in Manitoba and British Columbia. Please pray that God’s blessing continues on this effort, so that both physical needs and spiritual hope are met through these acts of service. *“The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.” — Psalm 23:1*
