- 1. As a kid, did you ever get caught red-handed doing something but still denied it?
- 2. What's a hiding place you used as a kid when you were in trouble?
- 3. What's a moment when honesty cost you something but brought freedom?

Discuss



Main Scriptures: Genesis 3:7-13

1. In Genesis 3:8-9, God asks Adam, "Where are you?" Why do you think God asked that, even though he already knew?

Leaders Note: God didn't ask the question because He lacked knowledge. He already knew exactly where Adam was hiding. The question was **for Adam's sake, not God's**. By asking "Where are you?", God was inviting Adam to:

- Acknowledge his condition Adam was hiding because of fear, shame, and guilt.
- Admit his separation sin had broken fellowship, and Adam needed to face that truth.
- **Start restoration** God's question wasn't condemnation, but an invitation back into relationship.
- 2. Adam and Eve tried to cover themselves with fig leaves (v. 7). What are "fig leaves" people use today to cover up shame or sin?
- 3. Pastor Jeff said, "God's power won't work in me without my honesty about me." Where do you find it hardest to be honest with God?
- 4. In Genesis 3:10, Adam says, "I was afraid because I was naked, so I hid." What fears keep us hiding from God today?
- 5. Pastor Jeff said, "Sometimes we admit how we are, but not what we've done." What's the difference between those two confessions?
- 6. Psalm 51 shows David admitting his sin fully to God. How does his prayer model the right way to respond when we're "caught"?

- 7. In Genesis 3:12-13, Adam blames Eve and Eve blames the serpent. Why is it easier to shift blame than accept it?
- 8. Looking back at this story, what would true honesty before God have looked like for Adam and Eve? What would it look like for you right now?

- 2. Read Psalm 51 once a day this week as a prayer of honesty and restoration.
