MAIN POINT.

The testing of our faith will require **sacrifice.**



CHRIST CONNECTION

Abraham believed the Lord would be faithful to His covenant, so he reasoned that God would even raise his son from the dead, if necessary (**Heb. 11:17-19**). Abraham's faith was a resurrection faith. We share in his covenant and faith when we believe in Jesus, God's one and only Son, who was crucified and raised from the dead for our salvation.

OUR FAITH WILL BE TESTED

GENESIS 22:1-2

1 After these things God tested Abraham and said to him, "Abraham!"

"Here I am," he answered. 2 "Take your son," he said, "your only son Isaac, whom you love, go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains I will tell you about."

OBEDIENCE REQUIRES SACRIFICE

GENESIS 22:3-17a

3 So Abraham got up early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took with him two of his young men and his son Isaac. He split wood for a burnt offering and set out to go to the place God had told him about. 4 On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place in the distance. 5 Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey. The boy and I will go over there to worship; then we'll come back to you." 6 Abraham took the wood for the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac. In his hand he took the fire and the knife, and the two of them walked on together. 7 Then Isaac spoke to his father Abraham and said, "My father." And he replied, "Here I am, my son." Isaac said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for the burnt offering?" 8 Abraham answered, "God himself will provide the lamb for the burnt offering, my son." Then the two of them walked on together. 9 When they arrived at the place that God had told him about, Abraham built the altar there and arranged the wood. He bound his son Isaac and placed him on the altar on top of the wood. 10 Then Abraham reached out and took the knife to slaughter his son. 11 But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" He replied, "Here I am." 12 Then he said, "Do not lay a hand on the boy or do anything to him. For now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your only son from me." 13 Abraham looked up and saw a ram caught in the thicket by its horns. So Abraham went and took the ram and offered it as a burnt offering in place of his son. 14 And Abraham named that place The LORD Will Provide, so today it is said, "It will be provided on the LORD's mountain." 15 Then the angel of the LORD called to Abraham a second time from heaven 16 and said, "By myself I have sworn," this is the LORD's declaration: "Because you have done this thing and have not withheld your only son, 17 I will indeed bless you and make your offspring as numerous as the stars of the sky and the sand on the seashore."

BEFORE YOU TEACH

MAIN POINT.

BIBLICAL COMMENTARY

OUR FAITH WILL BE TESTED

GENESIS 22:1-2

"Enough time has elapsed for Isaac to have grown from a toddler (two to three years old) in 21:8 to an adolescent in chap. 22. Isaac is old enough to endure a climb bearing wood (v. 6) but is still considered a 'boy' (vv. 5,12). Although the author does not concern himself with the extent of Isaac's knowledge and compliance, it is apparent that Isaac must have dutifully conceded to his aged father's wishes."⁹

OBEDIENCE REQUIRES SACRIFICE

GENESIS 22:3

"[Early in the morning] indicates the patriarch's prompt obedience as in the prior divine instruction regarding Ishmael (21:14). The narration's 'took' and 'place God had told him about' (v. 3) correspond to the divine instructions of v. 2, evidencing Abraham's full submission. Unlike his earlier rebuttals to God, substituting Eliezer (15:2) or Ishmael (17:18; 21:11), Abraham is utterly mute; his only words are absolute compliance and a confidence in the Lord's final provision. His testimony to the servants, 'We will come back to you' (v. 5), conveys his reliance on God to make good on his prior promise."¹⁰

GENESIS 22:14

"Although Abraham showed no awareness of it at the time (1 Pet. 1:19–20), God surely had in mind what he would one day carry out through his beloved Son, Jesus Christ. The world would one day better understand the heart of God when they saw him allowing the sacrifice of his own Son. What God would not let an earthly father do, he would do himself."¹¹



CONTEXT

Genesis 22 is difficult when viewed through our Western lens. But we must understand that Abraham lived in a pagan culture of the Ancient Eastern world, where the gods demanded child sacrifice for good crops, good weather, and blessings. But this test would prove that **Yahweh was unlike all other gods** because God would stop Abraham's hand at the last moment, revealing that He Himself would provide the sacrifice. **This test wasn't cruel but rather showed Abraham God's unwavering faithfulness.** A test of faith always reveals more of God's character. So, God never intended for Abraham to kill Isaac. He strictly forbids this practice throughout the Old Testament. It's also important to note that many scholars believe Isaac was in his teens or early twenties. This means Isaac followed his father's faith and complied with his request: he carried the heavy wood up the mountain and willingly laid down on the altar and allowed his father—who was well over one hundred years old—to bind him.¹²

THEOLOGY CONNECTION

faith

Biblical faith is the resting, or **trusting**, in Christ alone for salvation (John 3:16-21). More than being simply a mental agreement of historical facts, genuine faith begins with recognition and confession of the truth of the gospel (1 John 4:13-16), followed by receiving of Christ as Lord and Savior of one's life (John 1:10-13). **Biblical faith is not blind faith**, for it rests on the historical life, death, and resurrection of Christ.

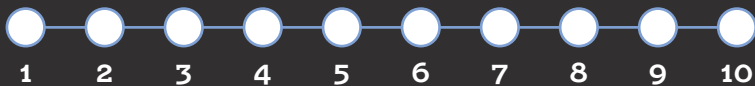

GIVE TO GAIN

SUPPLIES LIST: LIST OF EXCHANGES

Tailor the list to your group. During group time, ask: "What would you trade for . . ." and fill in the blank with items from your list. Only give one item at a time and pause to allow students a moment to consider and share answers.

Often in life, you have to give up something to get something else you want. And in obeying God, we might be called to sacrifice good things for the sake of His name and His people. But each time God calls us to give, we will gain something much better: a deeper faith and relationship with Him.

CULTURAL CONNECTION

Do you have common sense? Do you know someone who doesn't? What even is it? Well, common sense is sort of like having a good read on a situation. Maybe it's even having a gut instinct and just knowing what to do in certain circumstances. In other words, it's having good judgment. Do common sense and faith go hand in hand? Sometimes, but not always. This is where we tend to make mistakes in our decisions. A situation comes into our lives that just doesn't make sense: our parents divorce; we lose a loved one; we grow up in difficult circumstances. In these situations, common sense may tell us God isn't with us. Logic may even lead us to make a decision that makes sense according to all worldly standards, but faith sometimes doesn't make sense. Sometimes God asks us to do something that actually makes zero sense or seems impossible. And that is when we must have faith: belief that God is good and trustworthy against all odds.

DISCUSSION

MAIN POINT.

The testing of our faith will require **sacrifice**.

OUR FAITH WILL BE TESTED

READ GENESIS 22:1-2

WHEN HAVE YOU HAD TO DO SOMETHING YOU DIDN'T WANT TO DO? HOW DID IT FEEL?

You might have a responsibility to do something you really don't enjoy. Chores, working when your friends don't have to, or giving up your free weekend can all feel like a burden or a sacrifice. **Making a sacrifice is difficult; it requires us to lay down our own desires.** Our culture feeds us the idea that we should live for ourselves—that we shouldn't do anything we don't feel like doing. But sometimes sacrifice is the better way.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT FOR US TO KNOW THIS WAS A TEST?

Knowing this was a test frames how we understand this gut-wrenching event. It helps us see that God never intended for Isaac to die at the hands of his father. **It helps us see that this command was more about revealing what was in Abraham's heart—his complete faith in God to do what He said He would do.** If we misunderstand this event, then we could walk away with a false idea that God is cruel or inhumane, and both of these ideas are untrue.

WHY DOES GOD TEST OUR FAITH? WHEN HAS YOUR FAITH BEEN TESTED?

Our faith will be tested so that we can grow spiritually and learn how to endure (James 1:2-4). Peter reminds us that faith, like gold, is refined in fire (1 Pet. 1:7). **All of the flaws, our imperfections, rise to the surface, purifying our hearts in a way that can't happen without trials. Testing produces a genuine faith in us that won't be rattled by our circumstances.** **How? By showing us that God is faithful.** We get to see that when we hinge our lives on God's promises and trust in Him for salvation, He won't fail us. The testing can feel cruel. It can feel like God is demanding too much of us, but this is only because we're viewing the situation through a limited, worldly lens. When we view sacrifice with a kingdom perspective, our eyes open to the bigger purpose: God is refining us and helping us learn to depend on Him. When God tests our faith, we can trust Him. He is good, and His purpose is always for our good.

OBEDIENCE REQUIRES SACRIFICE

READ GENESIS 22:3-17a



FOCUS ON VERSES 5-8. WHAT DO THEY SHOW ABOUT ABRAHAM'S TRUST IN GOD? HOW DOES OUR FAITH INFLUENCE OUR OBEDIENCE?

Abraham rose early the next morning to leave for the journey to sacrifice his son. His obedience was immediate. He didn't linger; he didn't discuss it with friends; he didn't sit and doubt what God said. He went. **These verses show us that Abraham had complete faith God would fulfill His promise for Isaac.** Abraham could obey because he trusted God would provide the sacrifice; he reasoned God could raise Isaac from death if that's what it took (Heb. 11:19).

WHAT DOES THIS STORY TEACH US ABOUT SURRENDERING EVEN WHEN IT'S PAINFUL?

Surrender is difficult because we fear that God won't come through if we give Him the thing that means so much to us. **When we hesitate to sacrifice what we love for God, it reveals that we don't believe He's enough for us or that He's better than anything else.** But the Lord will provide. He wants all of you, even when it's difficult. Only when you give Him all of your heart and life will you finally see that He is all you need.



HOW DOES THIS STORY FORESHADOW WHAT GOD WOULD LATER DO FOR US WITH HIS OWN SON?

Share context about Isaac's age. Isaac is a type of Christ-figure. Abraham was willing to give his son; the son willingly carried the wood and laid himself on the altar. **What God stopped from happening on that day is what He allowed on the cross.** God the Father permitted His Son, Jesus, to die in our place as our sacrifice. And Jesus submitted to His Father's will and surrendered His own life so that we could have eternal life. God did indeed provide a Lamb for us, and in this, Mount Moriah foreshadowed Calvary.

WRAP-UP

HOW IS IT LOVING OF GOD TO TEST OUR FAITH? HOW CAN YOU GROW CLOSER TO HIM IN THE TESTING?

Share context about Abraham's pagan culture and what this test taught him about God. God tests us because He loves us and wants to reveal more of His character to us. He wants our faith to be authentic, not robotic. He doesn't want you to simply have the faith that was handed down to you by your parents. Why? Because when your faith is tested, it's proven to be your own. And when you possess your own deep faith in God, then you'll be equipped to stand against all kinds of storms that may come into your life. **God tests you because He wants you to be able to stand. He wants you to be able to face sickness, death, heartache, persecution, and loss with full assurance of His faithfulness.** And that type of trust is built in the testing. Trials help to reinforce God's character and remind us that He alone is constant. He will test you to strengthen your faith in Him.
