

Sermon Guide: Honorary Mentions of Faith

Text: Hebrews 11:32–40

Opening Illustration: The Unsung Heroes

In every great war, there are generals whose names make the history books—but there are also countless unnamed soldiers who fought bravely, sacrificed deeply, and paved the way for victory. Their names are not remembered by most, but their faithfulness mattered just as much as the celebrated leaders. Hebrews 11 closes not with the famous stories we know well, but with a list of names and even unnamed saints—“of whom the world was not worthy.”

These are God’s unsung heroes of faith. Their lives remind us that faith is not reserved for the _____, the _____, or the _____, but for ordinary people who trusted an extraordinary God.

I. They Were Accepted by God Based on Their Faith (v. 32)

- Gideon was **timid** but became **faithful**. (Judges 6:15; 7:20–22)
- Barak was **hesitant** but became **faithful**. (Judges 4:8, 14–15)
- Samson was **impulsive** but became **faithful**. (Judges 16:1, 28–30)
- Jephthah was **rash** but became **faithful**. (Judges 11:30–33)
- David was **fallen** but became **faithful**. (2 Samuel 11; 1 Samuel 17:45–46)
- Samuel was **a family failure** but became **faithful**. (1 Samuel 8:3; 12:23–24)

II. They Were Set Apart by God Based on Their Faith (vv. 33–38)

- Some conquered kingdoms, stopped the mouths of lions, and saw miraculous deliverance.
- Others were mocked, beaten, imprisoned and even killed.

III. They Were Surrendered to God Based on Their Faith (vv. 39–40)
