#### Introduction

Hebrews 13 provides practical counsel for Christian living. In verses 5–6, God warns us against two destructive loves: the love of money and the love of human approval. Both are overcome only by the confidence that God is ever-present: "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

#### **Hebrews 13:5-6**

<sup>5</sup> Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." <sup>6</sup> So we can confidently say,

"The Lord is my helper;

I will not fear;

what can man do to me?"

# I. WHAT NOT TO LOVE - MONEY

<sup>5</sup> Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

#### A. The Context

The original recipients suffered economic loss for following Christ (Heb. 10:34). Financial anxiety was real, painful, and present—just as it is for many believers today.

Hebrews 10:34 For you had compassion on those in prison, and you joyfully accepted the plundering of your property, since you knew that you yourselves had a better possession and an abiding one.

#### **B. The Command**

"Keep your life free from the love of money."

### C. The Danger

- 1. It opens the door to temptation.
- 2. It becomes a snare that grows destructive desires.
- 3. It can even produce apostasy ("wandered from the faith").

# E. Theological Foundation

Everything we possess is God's (1 Chron. 29:11–12; Ps. 24:1; Hag. 2:8). We are stewards, not owners.

# F. Historical Illustration (J.C. Penney)

The successful businessman collapsed financially during the Great Depression and nearly lost his life to anxiety. In a hospital chapel he heard the hymn "God Will Take Care of You," and God restored his hope—showing him that money was never the ultimate security.

# II. WHAT NOT TO LOVE - PRAISE OF MEN (vs. 6)

<sup>6</sup> So we can confidently say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me?"

#### A. The Real Issue: Fear of Man

Biblical "fear" includes craving approval, needing affirmation, seeking validation, and being controlled by others (Welch, *When People Are Big and God Is Small*).

Case Study #1 - Matthew 6:1-4 (You care too much about what people see.)

Case Study #2 - Galatians 2:11-14 (You care too much about what people think.)

Case Study #3 – Acts 5:1-11 (You care too much about what people say.)

#### **B.** The Text's Declaration

- tharrountas = courageous confidence
- The believer can boldly say, "The Lord is my helper."
- This removes the need for human approval.

# C. Scriptural Support

- Psalm 118:6 "The Lord is on my side..."
  <sup>6</sup> The Lord is on my side; I will not fear.
  What can man do to me?
- Psalm 56:4, 11
  In God, whose word I praise, in God I trust; I shall not be afraid. What can flesh do to me?
  - <sup>11</sup> in God I trust; I shall not be afraid. What can man do to me?

### D. The Snare of Approval

- Peer pressure
- Overcommitment
- Needing affirmation
- · Fear of embarrassment
- Comparison and jealousy
- People-pleasing ("What will they think?")

## E. Historical Illustration (George Whitefield)

Though wildly popular, Whitefield insisted that his name not be honored. He requested to be buried in a simple grave beneath the pulpit, saying: "Let the name of Whitefield perish, but Christ be glorified."

### III. WHY WE CAN RESIST BOTH LOVES

The Promise: "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

- This phrase contains a five-fold negative in Greek—intensifying God's unbreakable commitment.
- God is saying: "I will NEVER, NEVER, NEVER leave you."

# A. God's Presence Replaces the Love of Money

If God is with us, we already have what we need (Matt. 6:25–34). Security is not found in possession—but in presence.

### B. God's Presence Replaces the Fear of Man

When God is your helper, people cannot define you or control you. "What can man do to me?" becomes not a boast—but a confession of trust.

# IV. Application: Where do we go from here?

## A. Confront Your Relationship to Money.

- 1. Ask yourself where you run for security—your bank account or your Savior?
- 2. **Practice intentional contentment** by thanking God daily for specific provisions.
- 3. Measure generosity, not possession, as a sign of spiritual health.
- 4. **Refuse hidden forms of covetousness**—comparison, envy, lifestyle obsession.

### B. Examine Your Relationship to the Praise of People.

- 1. Evaluate whose opinion shapes your decisions—God's or others'.
- 2. **Confess ways you seek validation** through applause, social media, appearance, or performance.
- 3. Practice unseen obedience—acts of faithfulness known only to God.
- 4. **Grow your fear of the Lord** by meditating on His promises: *"The Lord is my helper; I will not fear."*

### C. Anchor Yourself in God's Presence.

- 1. Replace fear with faith in the God who never forsakes His people.
- 2. **Rest your identity** not on what you earn or who approves of you, but on what Christ has done.
- 3. Remember that contentment is not having more—but needing less because God is enough.

## V. CONCLUSION

Two enslaving loves—money and the praise of man—are conquered by One liberating truth: **God Himself is with us.** If God is our Helper, Provider, and Companion, we are free to live with confidence, courage, and contentment.
