Summer Schedule May-Labor Day Sundays at 8:00 a.m. & 10:00 a.m. Eucharist is our principal act of Christian worship in the Episcopal Church. The term is from the Greek, "thanksgiving" and was instituted by Jesus at the Last Supper. Jesus shared the bread and cup of wine at a sacred meal with his disciples. He identified the bread with his body and the wine with his blood of the new covenant. Jesus commanded his disciples to "do this" in remembrance of him (1 Cor 11:23-26; Mk 14:22-25; Mt 26:26-29; Lk 22:14-20). Christ's sacrifice is made present by the Eucharist, and in it we are united to his one self-offering (BCP, p. 859). Each of the services has a special character and expression.

The Vigil Service at 4:30 p.m. on Saturdays

Calling a service a vigil is simply a way to express that it is on the eve of Sunday. Using the same readings as the Sunday liturgies, the vigil service has a contemplative feel, enhanced by a cantor and organ. The first service of the season marks Epiphany with an intergenerational pageant and pizza dinner.

The Early Service at 7:30 a.m. on Sundays

Our first service on Sunday uses the Rite I Eucharistic Prayer from the Book of Common Prayer. This prayer uses traditional language with "thees" and "thous." Don't let the early time keep you away—a warm and friendly welcome awaits you.

The 9:00 a.m. Service in the Church & 9:00 a.m. Waterfront Worship

There are two services on Sundays at 9:00 a.m. In the church we use the Rite II Eucharistic Prayer from the Book of Common Prayer together with a full choir and organ. In the parish hall we use a variety of prayers that have a contemporary feel together with guitars, piano, and violin accompanying hymns ancient and modern, overlooking the waterfront and once a month outside on the dock.

The 11:15 a.m. Service

Our last service on Sunday is by no means the least. It's a mirror image of our 9:00 a.m. service in the church, with full choir and organ. Develop a routine of sleeping late, a slow coffee or early morning exercise routine and come to church at 11:15 a.m., in time for lunch out and about with friends.



Choral Evensong

One of the Anglican tradition's most unique and well-loved services is choral evensong. The service is almost completely sung, with psalm chanting, lessons from Scripture, a setting of the *Magnificat* and *Nunc dimittis*, and an anthem each week. The beauty of worship and music at this time of day, as "our eyes behold the vesper light," is a wonderful way to end the day.

Celtic Evening Prayer

The Celtic Christian tradition dates back to at least the fourth century and finds its roots in the earliest traditions of the Church. At Trinity-by-the-Cove, we celebrate Evening Prayer in the Celtic tradition when we gather outside at twilight. In our Celtic worship, you will find time for silent prayer and reflection with contemplative music that is both lively and introspective.

Tuesday Morning Prayer

Morning Prayer is a simple time of prayer, praise, and fellowship in the Anglican tradition. Join in with the Book of Common Prayer and your coffee or tea each Tuesday morning at 8:15 a.m. via Zoom.

Weekday Eucharist

We offer a 10:30 a.m. Holy Communion service on Wednesdays throughout the year. Each week we commemorate a Major Feast or a Lesser Feast falling during the week with a short homily related to the saint we are commemorating. Our prayers focus on healing, and we offer anointing each week.

St. Francis Day Pet Blessing

We gather on the Front Lawn with our pets for a short liturgy to celebrate and delight in God's creation. All pets of well-behaved humans are blessed at the end of the service.

Lessons & Carols

Lessons & Carols services in our tradition began in 1878, developed slightly later at King's College and is now celebrated around the world and at Trinity-by-the-Cove. During the service, scriptural readings are interspersed with choral presentations and hymns. In Advent, mankind's longing for liberation from sin and death, and our hope and expectation for both the first and second coming of Christ. are recalled. In Epiphany the visitation of the Magi, Baptism of Jesus, first miracle and transfiguration are recalled. Lessons and Carols takes the place of the first 11:15 a.m. service in Advent and the last 11:15 a.m. service in Epiphanytide.

Christmas Eve Services

4:00 p.m. Celebrating Christ coming among us is marked by children gathering for the Blessing of the Créche and Holy Eucharist on the waterfront. For the later services, 7:30 p.m. and 10:00 p.m., we move to the church and celebrate Holy Communion with traditional hymns. The service lasts about an hour. Beautiful hymns and carols help us in our worship and Holy Communion as we celebrate the coming of Christ among us.

Christmas Day

Celebrating Christmas is special no matter what the time. The Christmas Day service has organ music and traditional hymns. It's a great celebration to attend if you're headed to the beach, avoiding the Christmas Eve crowds, or simply love to celebrate the coming of Christ.

Ash Wednesday

Mark the beginning of Lent with ashes on your forehead reminding us of our mortality and need for humility before God. Services of Holy Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes are at 7:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. The evening service will be enhanced by the choir. At 12:00 p.m. is noonday prayer with imposition of ashes.

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter, commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and Jesus' Passion on the cross. Palm Sunday is the first day of Holy Week. The liturgy of the palms is the entrance rite for the service as branches of palm are blessed and the entrance hymn "All glory, laud, and honor" is sung by all. The service changes focus from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem to the solemnity of the Passion leading us into Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday

It comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, "new commandment," from John 13:34. The Prayer Book liturgy for Maundy Thursday provides for celebration of the eucharist and a ceremony of the washing of feet which follows the Gospel and homily. Following this, the altar is stripped and all decorative furnishings are removed from the church.

Holy Day Worship

Good Friday

The church commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus on a day of fasting and special acts of discipline and self-denial. The service includes John's account of the Passion gospel, a solemn form of intercession known as the solemn collects, devotions before the cross (commonly known as the Veneration of the Cross). The Eucharist is not celebrated on Good Friday; Holy Communion is administered from the Reserved Sacrament.

Easter Vigil

The liturgy is the first celebration of Easter in *The Book of Common Prayer*. It is also known as the Great Vigil of Easter. The service begins in growing darkness as the sun sets on Holy Saturday and consists of four parts: The Service of Light (kindling of new fire, lighting the Paschal candle, the Exsultet); The Service of Lessons (readings from the Hebrew Scriptures interspersed with psalms, canticles, and prayers); Christian Initiation (Holy Baptism) or the Renewal of Baptismal Vows; and the Eucharist. Through this liturgy, *The Book of Common Prayer* recovers an ancient practice of keeping the Easter feast. Easter reminds us strongly of baptismal practice in the early church linking the meanings of Christ's dying and rising to the understanding of baptism.

Sunrise Easter Day Service

The service begins on the church waterfront in darkness. The sun begins to glow in the east as we celebrate Easter Day and sing our first alleluias as the fast of Lent ends with celebration of resurrection to eternal life. With the beauty of nature around us, we celebrate God's work to save us.

Easter Day Services

The Eucharists on Easter Day celebrate the first and greatest of the Church's festivals. In our Easter communion, the risen Lord comes to us once more to nourish us with the life he gave us in baptism—a life that cannot be taken away or destroyed even by death. The early service in the church at 7:30 a.m. has organ and hymns. The 9:00 a.m. & 11:15 a.m. services in the church have full choir and organ. There is also a Waterfront Worship, Rite III contemporary service on the waterfront. An Easter Egg hunt after the 9 a.m. liturgies is a great celebration.

Assisting in the Children's Atria

Children's Sunday Morning Formation

Formation for children (age 3 to 5th grade) takes place on Sundays during the school year from 10:10 until 11:10 a.m. The program is divided into three levels which correspond to the developmental stages of the children: the Good Shepherd Atrium (ages 3-5), the True Vine Atrium (ages 6-8), and the Living Bread Atrium (ages 9-10). The material is designed to guide the spiritual development of each child.

Youth Sunday Formation

EYC stands for "Episcopal Youth Community," and is the middle and high school youth program at Trinity-by-the-Cove. Recognizing the importance of developing the head, heart, and hands of our youth, we have structured our program around formation, fellowship, and service. Weekly Sunday formation is reinforced through regular opportunities for fellowship and service to the church and community.

Sunday Nursery

All children are encouraged to attend worship with their families. We offer My Church Bags, which are activity bags for young children, to be used during the liturgies. There is also a nursery/toddler room during the 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. services for children 8 months to five years old, if you would prefer. Nursery care is also available for infants and children age five and under on request for other parish functions.

Mom's Morning Out (MMO) Program

MMO is an opportunity for parents to leave their young children (1 to 5 years old) with our nursery staff on Tuesdays from 9:00 a.m.-noon (September to May), giving them free time to run errands, exercise, or just have a much-needed break. Parents should pack a lunch. Pickup is at 12:00 p.m. To register, please contact Julia Cizek.

Faith Seeking Journey

The Faith Seeking Journey on Sundays at 10:10 a.m.

The FSJ is perfect, not only for those oreparing for Baptism and Confirmation but also for anyone who wants to take their faith journey to the next level and get more involved at Trinity. Ideally, everyone would go through the class at some point in their time at Trinity.

The Faith Seeking Journey (FSJ)

Inquiry

The focus of the Inquiry Period is the story of the People of God through the centuries beginning with the story of the People of God from Abraham to John the Baptist, the story of Jesus and the story of the Apostles. The story of the People of God becomes the story of the Church, as the community of faith, living in response to the event of revelation that is the resurrection of Jesus and the out pouring of the Holy Spirit.

Formation

The Formation Period focuses on how the Liturgy allows us to gather each week to hear God speak to us in Bible readings, sermons, and the prayers of His people. No pre-requisites or commitments are necessary to participate. Just come with an open mind and bring any questions and hopes God has given you.

Enlightenment

The Enlightenment Period focuses on the third resource we have for living our life in Christ: a life of prayer. Our tradition has a spiritual heritage, and *The Book of Common Prayer* includes many services, prayers, and resources for developing a rich prayer life. These resources are explored and used to develop a Rule of Life that can be tailored to the personal needs and temperament of every Episcopalian.

Initiation

The final stage of the Faith Seeking Journey focuses on the sacraments of the Church as signs and channels of our life in Christ. We celebrate the mystery of our life in Christ in the sacraments of the Church, which we celebrate in the rites of Baptism, Eucharist, Confirmation, Healing, Reconciliation, Holy Orders and Marriage. "Living the Good News" will show how each of these sacraments can be a resource for living our life in Christ, by pointing to different aspects of God's call to us to serve Him in our life in the world.

Fr. Steve Zimmerman, our assisting priest and author of the Faith Seeking Journey catechumenate, facilitates the series.

Sunday Adult Forums

Narnia for Grown-Ups

C. S. Lewis' fantasy children series, The Chronicles of Narnia, sparked a cottage industry with their global popularity. "Narnia for Grownups" will be a light-hearted seven-week course exploring and playing with theological themes and subtle insights throughout C. S. Lewis classic stories. We will hop and amble through each of the seven books, beginning with The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe and ending with the Apocalyptic The Last Battle. Grown-up "students" are encouraged to read each book the week before, but may still attend class if they haven't. Be a kid again, even if it is just to play hooky.

Nicaea at 1700: Exploring the Nicene Creed

This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea (AD 325), which gave us among other things the Nicene Creed which we profess every Sunday. After briefly exploring the historical importance of the Creed and Council, we will examine its continued relevance through a discussion of what it all means! You may even find, after we're through, that you are reciting the Creed on Sunday mornings with a deeper appreciation and understanding of the faith we confess.

Heaven: The Heart's Deepest Longing

What do you want? Really want? Using the human heart as our guide and Peter Kreeft's book of Heaven as our map, we will examine the psychological, philosophical, and theological dimensions of this search for total joy and for the ultimate reality that grounds it. Along the way we'll explore the heart's restlessness, why heaven is not boring (!), the nature of our ultimate hope, and what difference heaven makes to Monday morning.

Lenten Meditations on Scripture through Art

Join art historian and fellow parishioner Jim Pagliaro along with Fr. Nicholas as we explore some artistic depictions of the passion and death of Jesus Christ during the season of Lent. We will lead meditations on Scriptural passages through visual renditions by some of Europe's greatest artists, including Giotto, Hans Holbein the Elder, Tintoretto, Titian, Cimabue, and more.

Working without a conductor, they rehearse and perform as chamber musicians, each contributing to the entirety of the artistic process. Their program, titled "Land that I Love" commemorates the upcoming 250th anniversary of the United States by honoring our diverse American heritage with captivating music by composers carrying their own migration stories.

Christmas Carol Concerts

Trinity-by-the-Cove's professional choir presents their annual performance of Christmas carols. Enhanced by instrumentalists from the Naples Philharmonic Orchestra at Artis Naples, this program is sure to feature something for everyone, with familiar favorites such as "What child is this" and "Ding! Dong! merrily on high", present day carols by John Rutter and Bob Chilcott, and the inimitable carol arrangements of Sir David Willocks.

Echoing Air

Echoing Air is a period instrument ensemble from Indianapolis that specializes in the music of Henry Purcell and the English Baroque. Led by countertenor Steven Rickards, the performance will feature wonderful vocal music accompanied by recorders and continuo.

Ensemble Altera

One of the newest but one already "a leading ensemble on the American choral scene" (Scherzo Magazine) Ensemble Altera makes their first ever tour to Florida. Their debut recording was described by the German Record Critics' Award as, "no recent recording debut in this field has been as spectacular". Run, don't walk to Trinity for this concert!

Anglican Luminaries

After some brief biographical comments we will open it up for a discussion of selected extracts from their writings.

Christmas in Scripture and Tradition

In this Advent series let's stop and focus first on the Scriptural foundations, looking carefully at the Nativity narratives in Luke and Matthew, then adding from non-canonical gospels that became a consistent part of our understanding. - The Vatican Basilica, traditional site of Peter's martyrdom
- The Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls
- St. Paul's Within the Walls, also known as the American Church in Rome
- The Pantheon, a Roman temple turned church, still active after 1,400 years
- Santa Pudenziana, built atop the earliest Christian house-church in Rome
- A Christian catacomb, and remarkable sacred art, including Caravaggio's Martyrdom of St. Peter
- The Roman Forum, Colosseum, and the treasures of the Capitoline Museums

All while enjoying time together in worship, fellowship, and the joy of Roman cuisine and hospitality.

Optional Extensions for a More Experiences

Naples (April 20 - 25)

Begin your journey in our namesake city. Explore Pompeii and Villa Poppaea (Nero's wife's palace), and visit the Cathedral of the Assumption, a holy site layered with Roman and early Christian roots. Enjoy southern Italy's distinctive culture and cuisine before traveling to Rome with fellow pilgrims.



Florence (May 5 - 10)



After Rome, continue on to Florence, stopping in Assisi to remember the life of St. Francis. In Florence, we'll immerse ourselves in the sacred art and architecture of the Renaissance—Michelangelo's David, Brunelleschi's Dome, and the masterpieces of the Uffizi Gallery.


