ADVENT HYMN DEVOTIONAL

Week 2: It Came upon the Midnight Clear

Words by Edmund Sears

It Came upon the Midnight Clear starts like an old fairy tale. Just shy of saying "Once upon a time, long ago," it practically says, "It came to pass, at midnight, long ago..." Paired with its lilting, circular melody and accompanying chromaticism, it is a sweet hymn. But despite Edmund Sears' hazy, charming callback to millennia past with "once upon a time" language, he masterfully shifts focus midway to the present realities of a painful world with only four words separated by a parenthetical statement: "And ye...look now!" It is as if Sears knew you might be paying only half attention to the text. He asks you to consider one of two perspectives:

If you are weary, barely singing because of your exhaustion, or perhaps numbing your distress with thoughtless singing—he calls you to face your reality. "You, pay attention," he says. "Don't look for fleeting, earthly peace this holiday season. Look at your life, right now in worship as you sing, and confess, 'My life's load is crushing me. I am bent low. My progress is slow. Every step I take is painful.' There is hope for you. The hope is so close you don't realize—the prophets foretold your deliverance would come, and Christ's kingdom is speeding toward you. Hope in that!" That's a remarkable message, a punch to one's solar plexus.

But can Sears land a double-punch? You see, you might not see yourself in this hymn's text. It's easy to sing it and think, "I remember a time I felt like that," or "I know someone who is distressed," or "I know there are people 'out there' to whom this applies." And while we might sing it honestly, we believe it applies to others.

But Sears doesn't let you off that easily. By putting these words in your mouth—"And ye...look now"—the author forces you into the role of the messenger. "Angel" means messenger; they are harbingers for the Lord. The author thus puts you in the position to spread the Lord's message, given by him to the angels, given now to you to tell. He says, "You think this hymn is about someone else? No, it is about you—you are called to spread this peace." Sing this with authority! If you sing it but don't mean it, or don't understand it, or don't believe you ought to, then you bear false witness to your neighbor. How dare we say to someone, "You, I have good news to tell you" without any love or truth to give? Yet how glorious it is to have and know the truth, to experience the peace and rest in Jesus—and to have the privilege to share that with another?!

When you sing this hymn, let your voice and heart connect. Sing it with the utter confidence that you believe every word of it and have the richest of treasures—the gospel of eternal life—to bring to your neighbor who is struggling along the road, bent low, and crushed. If you can, look someone in the eye and bring wings full of peace to them. — Ryan Kelly
