ADVENT HYMN DEVOTIONAL

Week 4: Lo! He Comes eith Clouds Descending Words by Charles Wesley

Have you ever noticed how films often dramatically peak *close* to the end of the film, but not quite at the end? Even in an intense action movie, the final few minutes often recede in intensity, allowing for the characters to find respite and reflect, or perhaps say goodbye. Many hymn texts are structured the same way, with their penultimate stanzas being the most dramatic and their final stanzas having more devotional and introspective language. However, *Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending* increases with intensity through its final stanza.

There is no greater cry for a Christian today than "Lord, come quickly" (Rev. 22:20). In some ways, it is an emotional summary of the Lord's Prayer. As much as we pray that the Lord's name would be hallowed, that his kingdom would advance and will be done, that we be fed by the Lamb and be delivered from evil, we acknowledge that this will be eternally consummated only at his second coming, and so we sing, "O come quickly!" In Wesley's hymn, do you sense how the repetition of this supplication intensifies through the end of the hymn? We sing the word "come" five times!

What do we mean when we sing, "O come quickly?" If we look at stanza 3's "O come quickly" as an isolated petition, we might think of it simply in terms of asking for God's deliverance. That might be the prayer in other hymns, but not this one. In this hymn, there's no hint of feeling oppression or desperation. As part of a larger poem, Wesley imparts meaning to this phrase with the text that precedes it; that means we consider stanza 1 and 2 to understand stanza 3. In stanza 1, the vision of Christ's coming prompts our celebration today of how God will fulfill prophecy and eternally reign. In stanza 2, the vision shows that Christ will sit in judgment, that his opponents will receive grim justice, and that his name and holiness will be vindicated.

When we sing "O come quickly," we are asking the Lord to reign, to vindicate his name, and to judge his opponents. There's even a celebratory "Alleluia" interjected to remind you that you that your hymn of praise is about God and his glory, not about your earthly life. And with growing fervor, like the "thousand, thousand saints" that are swelling like a tsunami wave, we sing: "Come. Come. Come. Come. Come!" It is one of my favorite hymns to close the church's Advent season; I can think of nothing to sing more pregnant with hope and excitement before Christmas Eve. — Ryan Kelly

DECLARATION OF FAITH*

We confess that God fulfilled the promise which he had made to the early fathers by the mouth of his holy prophets when he sent his only and eternal Son into the world at the time set by him. The Son took the "form of a servant" and was made in the "likeness of man," truly assuming a real human nature, with all its weaknesses, except for sin; being conceived in the womb of the blessed virgin Mary by the power of the Holy Spirit, without male participation. And he not only assumed human nature as far as the body is concerned but also a real human soul, in order that he might be a real human being. For since the soul had been lost as well as the body he had to assume them both to save them both together.

Therefore we confess, against the heresy of those who deny that Christ assumed human flesh from his mother,

that he "shared the very flesh and blood of children";

that he is "fruit of the loins of David" according to the flesh;

"born of the seed of David" according to the flesh;

"fruit of the womb of the virgin Mary";

"born of a woman";

"the seed of David";

"a shoot from the root of Jesse";

"from the seed of Abraham"— for he "assumed Abraham's seed" and was "made like his brothers except for sin."

In this way he is truly our Immanuel—that is: "God with us."
