<u>Life of Saint Margaret Queen of Scotland</u> by Bishop of St. Andrews, Turgot. (Hardpress: Miami, 2000?). [ISBN 9781407751504] This is one of those scanned and re-printed books which generally irritate me. It has the effect of reading a photo-copied book. But it's cheap.

The Life and Wisdom of Margaret of Scotland written and compiled by Lavinia Byrne. I like this better than the one above.
