Discussion Questions:

- 4. Pastor Mike stated, "You need the church more than we need you." Do you agree or disagree? Why?
- 5. How has being part of a church community contributed to your spiritual growth? Can you share a specific example?
- 6. Pastor Mike mentioned church hopping as an epidemic. What are your thoughts on this? How can we balance discernment about where God is calling us with commitment to a local church?
- 7. Reflect on the question posed at the end: "If you treated your spouse the way you treat Jesus' bride (the church), how would your marriage be?" What insights does this give you?

Practical Applications:

- 1. Commit to praying for your church and its leaders daily for the next week.
- 2. Identify one area where you can serve or get more involved in your church community.
- 3. If you're not already part of a connect group, make plans to join one or visit one in the coming weeks.
- 4. Set aside time this week to study a passage of Scripture related to the church (e.g., Ephesians 4:1-16, 1 Corinthians 12:12-31).
- 5. Reach out to someone in your church you don't know well and invite them for coffee or a meal to build community.
- 6. Reflect on your attitude towards church attendance. If needed, make a commitment to prioritize regular attendance.
- 7. Think of one way you can contribute to making your church a more welcoming and loving place for newcomers or those on the fringes.
