Digital Discipleship for Your Children Addiction to Distraction

To prepare our children for a life that will likely involve vast amounts of time on the internet, we have to warn them about what is addictive and destructive. **No one begins a practice and hopes to end up enslaved by it.** The nature of addiction is a voluntary surrender to more and more mastery by a pleasure some habit. Therefore, we have to point out the danger before they walk into it.

On the internet, that addiction is the pleasure of novelty. The web offers a non-stop array of links to click, messages to check, apps to open, likes and comments to view. **The architecture of the web is built upon our love of the new and the alluring.** Films such as *The Social Dilemma* have well-documented how much of this was designed by those familiar with brain chemistry and psychology. The addiction to social media and to the web in general is no accident. It is a design feature that enriches some as it enslaves others.

In the meantime, not only does an addiction to continual checking of our phones or apps grow, but something is lost. **That loss is the brain's ability to focus without distraction.** The habit of needing the dopamine hit for checking email or WhatsApp or some other notification literally trains our brains to want that "relief" after just minutes of concentration. We think we are just "multi-tasking", but we are actually addicted to distraction.

That means we do less real reading, and more skimming. We do less intensive study, and more superficial scanning. We become more drawn to the visual than the textual, less tolerant of dense text and extended argument. We struggle to do deep work.

In short, we become worse and worse at something the Bible requires: meditation and imagination.

Meditation is the ability to pursue one thought and consider it from all points of view, gaining insights and applications. Imagination is the ability to see more than just visual images, but to see beyond and behind life, seeing the meaning of things and how they are connected. Imagination is not dealing with fanciful and unreal things, but with true reality. True reality is not found in the mere visual. "*For we walk by faith, not by sight*". Christian imagination enables us to experience hoped-for things as substantial, and things not seen as if they are evidential-present (Hebrews 11:1).

Biblical imagination actually prioritizes words over images. It focuses on the meaning of words, particularly God's Words. It considers carefully God's analogies in Scripture, to understand the nature of reality. Immersed in those realities, it can see life as it really is.

By contrast, a person saturated with the eye-candy of the Internet is blunting his imagination. He seldom has to focus, concentrate, or think deeply on meaning, because he is always stuffed with the sugary fast-food of videos and images from the web.

Philosophers and psychologists tell us that those pleasures that are most immediate are always the most addictive. The immediacy of the internet's visual offerings completely overwhelm a child's senses. Cultivating meaningful imagination by reading literature, learning poems, listening and playing music, will seem to them by contrast like chewing steak that is too tough.

If you allow your child's diet to be all the sugar of Disney, Facebook, X, TikTok, Instagram, etc., you will have a hard time getting them to eat the meat of God's Word. Addiction to distraction destroys imagination. ❖

Exiting the Highway to Porn

Brother in Christ, do you ever feel there's a switch in your brain that gets turned on, and once that happens, it's only a matter of time before you find yourself back in the gutter of pornography? Does porn feel inevitable? Sister in Christ, do you experience triggers, such as suggestive posts on social media, that lead you onto a highway to porn with only one exit: "Give In to Temptation"?

Many people fall into the belief that once desire has been awakened, the only way to silence that nagging voice is to give it what it wants. They believe the porn interstate has one way off, and that's to give in.

But before you reach "Giving In," you've flown past earlier exits that don't involve sinning. The sooner you get off this highway, the stronger you'll become next time you make a wrong turn back onto it.

Use Strategic Speed Bumps to Slow Down

While many people feel they "fall into" porn, there were dozens of decision points along the way that led to that destination. Slowing down is critical to seeing those earlier exit ramps. To do this, we need to place speed bumps on the highway to porn.

Speed bumps include anything that makes pornography difficult to access. If porn is right in your pocket on your phone, you're flying down the highway at 150 mph. No wonder you missed all the other exits! Speed bumps force you to slow down. These may include filters and accountability software on all internet-enabled devices, removing all social media, or perhaps getting rid of a smart phone altogether. It sounds painful to limit your access to many good things, but I hear testimony after testimony of the peace and freedom many people experience when they couldn't look at porn due to lack of access.

The reason these measures are speed bumps and not brick walls is because there's ultimately no guaranteed way to restrict access to someone who truly wants to find pornography. People will go to great lengths and spend incredible

amounts of time and money just to get their next fix. Where there is a will, there typically is a way.

But the fatal flaw I hear from so many is that because speed bumps don't guarantee success, they don't even try them. This is a lie from the depths of hell. Any distance you can create between yourself and access to sin is to your advantage. It gives time for the Holy Spirit to work in your heart and turn you from sin. Putting speed bumps up also shows you're sober minded about what's at stake in the battle against sin. Scripture explicitly commands us not to make any provision for the flesh (Rom 13:14). Your willingness to limit your access to porn shows you take sin seriously.

Earlier Exits Off the Highway to Porn

Believe it or not, this highway is chock-full of exits that don't involve sinning. Once you slow down, you'll see they're everywhere! What are some of these earlier exits?

Switch locations. Pornography prefers privacy. An obvious exit is to leave your private room and find a place with other people. If you're the only person at home, go for a walk or study at the library. For those who work remotely, take your work to a café, remove all curtains and blinds from your home office, and maybe take the door off.

Reach out for help. Don't expect one person to be everything you need when it comes to reinforcements. As soon as tempting thoughts enter your mind, out yourself. Text six friends and then systematically call each one until one of them picks up. Fight the lie that says you're annoying them. The sooner you bring those tempting thoughts into the light, the less power they have over you. James wasn't lying when he promised, "*Resist the devil, and he will flee from you*" (James 4:7).

Access truth. The most obvious decision here is to open your Bible and flood your mind with truth. But there's a plethora of creative ways to do this if you're hesitant to pick up your Bible in those moments. Always have an audio Bible on-hand and fill your airwaves with God's precious promises. Turn on Christian music or listen to a sermon or Christian podcast. Perhaps you have "Fighter Verses" in your wallet or posted on your wall—these are specific verses you've found particularly strategic when you're tempted to sin.

Reach up to God. According to Heb 4:16, we're called to enter God's throne room of grace in time of need to receive mercy and find grace to help. You know temptation to look at porn is not just any old "time of need," this is DEFCON 1—imminent nuclear war! You also know your resources to fight this temptation are limited and ineffective on their own. You need divine help. Grace is not only God's gift of forgiveness, it's also his power that he freely gives you in Christ to battle temptation. But you need to come to him for it. You need to get on your knees and pray for his help. Pray to God for eyes to see him in his glory, so the things of the

earth will grow strangely dim. Ask God to make you sober-minded to the devastating consequences of pornography. Ask him to meet you in your trials that so often underlie the temptation to escape them.

Find someone to serve. Pornography is the epitome of selfishness. It's exploiting someone else for your own pleasure. A powerful weapon against selfishness is to proactively find ways to serve. Serving others is much more fulfilling and doesn't leave you with guilt and shame. Looking at pornography in the morning can ruin your whole day, sometimes your whole week. But serving someone else in the morning can brighten your day and become the highlight of your week. This doesn't have to be extravagant. It can be as simple and powerful as praying for people in need, calling a friend who struggles with loneliness, or doing the leftover dishes in the sink.

Brother, sister, you can always get off the highway to porn, even when you feel you've gone too far. Remember, *"God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it"* (1 Cor 10:13). As you grow in sanctification, you may still find yourself back on that highway—but the early exit signs will become much clearer. The more you take those early exits, you'll find yourself less frequently on the highway at all, instead opting for the scenic route of God's glory, beauty, and grace. ❖

Why You Should Read the Bible Regularly

What you read impacts you. Think about how you feel when you read your news feed. Reading the Bible on a regular and consistent basis has several benefits.

First, the Bible shows us God's character and provides us God's revelation of himself to his people. In each section of the Bible, we see God's holy, unchanging, faithful, gracious and loving character.

Second, 2 Timothy 3:16–17 when discussing the topic of Scripture says that it is "profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction and for training in righteousness." The next verse goes on to say that this leads to the completeness and equipping "for every good work" (ESV).

Third, regularly reading God's word reorients our thinking so that we can grow in maturity, which is part of the Christian calling (Ephesians 4:14–16; Romans 12:1–2). Have you ever met a mature Christian who did not regularly read the Bible? These three things are really just the beginning, this list could include dozens of reasons why you should read the Bible on a regular basis.

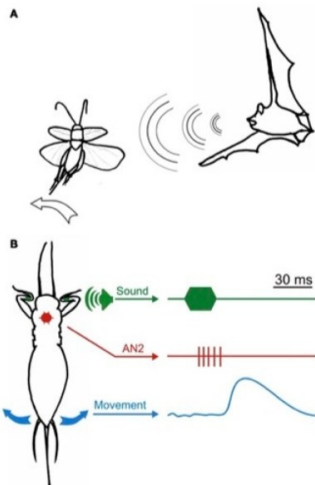

Proclaiming Evidence for Truth

THIS WEEK'S CREATION MOMENT

The Never-Fail Bat Alarm



"Plead my cause and redeem me; revive me according to Your word." - Psalm 119:154

The swiftly moving bat cuts almost invisibly through the darkness, silent to all but those who can hear its ultrasonic radar. What chance does a poor night-flying cricket have?

Let's treat this problem as if you were the Creator, faced with the problem of giving your night-flying cricket a chance against its predator. You could give the cricket the ability to hear the bat's radar, but that alone won't help the cricket if he can't get to safety.

The solution our true Creator has invented to help the cricket preserve its life is another example of His engineering excellence. He has built the cricket with a single-celled bat detector that is wired into the cricket's nervous system. The detector is triggered by the frequency that bats use for navigation. When triggered, the cell fires off up to 500 impulses per second. These impulses automatically cause the cricket to steer away from the source of the ultrasound. The most impressive engineering fact about this bat detector is that it only works if the cricket is in flight and therefore vulnerable to bats. When crickets are safe from bats—resting, hiding, eating, or preening—the cell doesn't fire any warning at all!

The precise elegance that the Creator has designed into the cricket for its protection is a witness to His wisdom in caring for all He has created. Learn more about that wisdom in the Bible.

As we begin the new year, I'm excited to share that I was recently granted a five-year business visa to return to South Asia! This has been a significant answer to prayer, and I'm deeply thankful for the many of you who have faithfully prayed alongside me through this process. This visa provides greater legitimacy for my work and opens the door for deeper relationships within the communities where we operate, and I'm looking ahead with gratitude and expectation for how God will continue to guide this work over the upcoming year and season. **Monday, January 26th, I will start my journey back to my home in Asia.**

Securing a new living and working space carries significant potential for spiritual growth and for building deeper, more intentional relationships within the community. I am excited about the opportunity to establish a space where I can invite others in for meals, host cultural workshops, welcome guests through our own accommodations, and provide a place where local believers can gather to encourage and build one another up.

Please join me in praying that the Lord will lead me to the right space in His perfect timing, and that He will provide a positive and supportive relationship with a new landlord one that will not hinder the work He has placed on my heart for this space. I would also appreciate prayer that God will connect me with new financial partners to help cover the increased costs during this season, particularly higher rent and local staff salaries, until the company grows to a point where it can sustainably support these expenses.

At present, I am seeking to raise \$1,350 per month for local staff salaries and \$450 per month for fixed office costs. I am also excited about the possibility of purchasing our own business vehicles and the opportunities this would create to personally drive our clients on trips both locally within our home cities and on longer journeys to other cities and neighboring states. Having our own vehicles is an essential need, as it gives us the freedom to engage in meaningful, unhurried conversations with our guests about the places we visit and the people we meet, and allows flexibility to stop along the way as needed without being tied to the schedules of local taxi or bus drivers. It also gives us the privacy and freedom to have deeper spiritual conversations with guests when we have those opportunities depending on who our guests might be.

In addition, owning our vehicles would allow us to generate income by driving ourselves rather than paying outside vendors. This income would directly contribute toward meeting the annual revenue requirements set by the government for sustaining my business visa long term. The estimated cost to purchase **two seven-seater vehicles is \$50,000 USD**, which would allow us to have one vehicle in each of the primary locations where we operate.

Thank you so much for praying with me for God's provision for these needs and for His wisdom in how we steward these resources to make Him known among those we work alongside and invest in through relationships. I am deeply grateful for your continued prayers, both for me personally and for the work God is leading me into in the coming year. It is an encouragement to have so many of you faithfully partnering with me in this work.

I'm thankful for how God is continuing to guide and direct my work and for new inquiries for bookings for the travel company over the next few months.

Please pray for upcoming bookings to go well and for our business to truly be a blessing to the locals that we partner with and our clients.
