## THE NEED FOR HERMENEUTICS

## **Primary Need**

"Upon the correct interpretation of the Bible, rests our doctrine of salvation, of sanctification, of eschatology, and of Christian living. It is our solemn responsibility to know what God has said with reference to each of these. This can be done only if we have carefully, thoroughly, and systematically formulated that system of biblical interpretation which will yield most readily the native meaning of the Bible" (Ramm, 2).

#### MEANING

**Definition:** That which the author wished to convey to the original audience by using appropriate signs.

# Where is meaning found? Who controls it?

"A valid interpretation must be consistent with the historical-cultural context" (Duvall and Hays 99).

A text cannot mean what it could not have meant to its original audience in their original historical and cultural setting.

## Three Key rules of Interpretation

- 1. The text means what the author \_\_\_\_\_ it to mean (authorial intent)
- 2. The text means what it \_\_\_\_\_ (read it normally)
- 3. The text \_\_\_\_\_ mean what it could not have \_\_\_\_ meant (contexts)

#### At Issue: Communication

Single Meaning or multiple meaning?

Option 1: meaning is controlled by the author (authorial intent). There is one meaning.

Option 2: Meaning is controlled by the reader (reader response). There are many meanings.
