

# Celebration of Ministry in 2024 and Annual Meeting

January 26, 2025





Not too long ago, I stumbled upon something called Ignatian indifference. Ignatius was a Spanish priest back in the 1500s who figured out that life doesn't always work out the way we think it will. He created a set of what he called 'spiritual exercises' to help people rise above their circumstances and love Jesus no matter what might be happening around them.

One of these exercises (it's #23, for anyone interested) is what's called a prayer of indifference. Some people call it a prayer of detachment. Whatever you call it, this "means being detached enough from things, people, or experiences to be able either to take them up or to leave them aside, depending on whether they help us to "to praise, reverence, and serve God" (https://www.ignatianspirituality.com/ignatian-indifference/).

It's a whole lot like the apostle Paul when he wrote to the Philippians, "I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want" (4:11-12).

Funny thing is, indifference had been a topic of discussion earlier this year when I met one afternoon on Zoom with a spiritual director.

"How are you feeling about your ministry these days?" she asked.

I thought for a moment. And I thought some more. The only word I could come up with was "indifferent." "Should I be worried?" I asked her. "Indifference sounds bad."

She leaned into her laptop and smiled. "Another word for indifference is peace."

Friends, as I look back at 2024, I am completely indifferent—in the best way, in the *Ignatian* way. There have been times of absolute joy: Junction Kids. The lovely recognition of the 20th anniversary of my installation. The ECO Synod Business Meeting (yes, it was fun). All those baptisms. Karl's concert. There have been some hard times too: Fighting with the elevator company. Four funerals in eight days. Families leaving without explanation. Bill Remick's vigil before Christmas.

Yet, I believe wholeheartedly that I am where God put me to do the work to which He has called me. Through it all.

I imagine that another word for 2024 might just be peace. Or, to borrow the apostle Paul's word, I'm content.

In 2024 we studied Revelation, Acts and Romans using guide books by N.T. Wright. We did not meet on holidays and took a break over the summer. During Advent we held a 4 week study in preparation for Christ's birth by Max Lucado titled, "Because of Bethlehem". This study was on Sundays at the church along with Casa and Zoom.

After the major renovation of the Fellowship Hall and floors downstairs in 2023, this past year was relatively calm. A major project was fixing the doors to the handicap parking lot. We also replaced some exit signs and fixed up the playground. We updated some electrical outlets in the sanctuary and education building. A big thanks to electrician Mike Hight, and Brandon Lease who fixed up the sanctuary wall after the installation of new switches. Our HVAC person Charley Henschel fixed some problems with our water pumps downstairs, so we have much better cooling now in the Cranson Room. We hired Agustin Lopez to finally replace the old toilets in the downstairs bathroom.

## Compassion And Missions Team by Jeanne Brittain

The Compassion and Missions Team projects were Bereavement, Easter Offering, Church Development, Prayer Tree, Intermediate School Support, Operation Christmas Child, Angel Tree, and Christmas Offering.

An Easter Offering of \$2,000 was sent to "The Place" in Colorado Springs. The Place

is a safe place for young adults 15 to 20 year olds who have been living on the streets for a variety of reasons.

Each year we send \$400 for new Church Development. This year we sent it to the Nova Church to help their church grow.

In March the Bereavement Team served dinner for the family of George Creston Mitchell to celebrate his life. In October we served coffee in the Aspen Center at Casa Del Sol celebrating the life of Karen S. Fishkin.

The Prayer Tree warriors has been used a lot in 2024. Our prayers warriors have seen answers to many of them and are still waiting for answers to some of our prayers We thank you Lord.

The Intermediate School teachers used \$417.04 to buy emergency clothing for children in need, supplies the teacher requested. MJ has spent time in the class room helping the teacher by reading to the children or in whatever she needs help with.

We sent 93 shoeboxes to be distributed to Operation Christmas Child. This year La Junta gathered 1,334 boxes. These boxes were collected along with boxes from Fowler to Springfield for a grand total of 4,015. Becci Lease thanks you for your support.

Kristen Elwood set up the Angel Tree (a ministry program of Prison Fellowship) with 18 children gift requests, 2 families from Las Animas, 1 family from Rocky Ford and 2 from La Junta. Each child received 3 gifts. Kristen and Steve Elwood delivered the gifts before Christmas. A big thanks to all who brought the gifts and delivered them.

Our Christmas Offering received \$2168 to build cisterns with the help of Todd and Maria Luke in Mexico.

We are grateful for the generosity of our congregation in supporting all of the projects that our church family takes on.

Bethany Bender, Karen Fishkin, Aaron Saucedo, Liz Saucedo, Lexi Klempan also reaffirmed their faith. We are always grateful to welcome new members to the kingdom of God.

20 Years of Service: This past June, we celebrated MJ's 20th pastoral anniversary here. That's over a thousand sermons and hundreds of communions. There's no way to fully count all the visits and prayers MJ has given in those 20 years, and we are still sincerely grateful!

68 Guests: On July 1, we hosted 68 youth from Oklahoma and all their sponsors as they prepared for the Group Mission Trip to Las Animas. We fed them breakfast Sunday morning, and they doubled our attendance that Sunday morning!

2 Concerts: In keeping with our mission statement to be a gathering place, we offered our community two concerts this fall. In October, our very own, home-grown Karl Ludwig gave a concert as part of the chili supper fundraiser for summer camp tuition and helped raise over \$1,200. Later in November, Tanya Perkins filled our sanctuary with her beautiful voice for a full house.

Fellowship Committee Annual Report by Denise Root

Meals of all kinds were provided by the committee, volunteers from the congregation and potluck meals. We had breakfasts, brunches, lunches, picnics and suppers throughout the year. We tried a few new formats this year. For the Good Friday supper we provided a soup, sandwich and dessert buffet that was available from 6:00 to 7:00 for people to come as they could after work. We asked for volunteers to bring specific dishes for a meal. For example we asked 5

congregation members; 5 of the Fellowship Committee members to bring breakfast casseroles for Easter breakfast. We also had a few traditional potlucks such as the Summer Swim Party and Picnic. Monthly Fellowship times were provided after worship with goodies and drinks, some were specific to events such as honoring graduates, fall ministry kickoff for Sunday School, Youth Groups etc. Approximately half of the Fellowship Times were hosted by volunteers and the remainder were hosted by the Fellowship Committee.

Meals were also provided for the conclusion celebrations of the Junction Kids Midweek ministry for the fall and spring. The VBS families were invited and several attended the summer Swim Party and Picnic on July 28.

Targeted Efforts to meet Ministry Goals: Meeting Jesus: Stay tuned for possible new activities in 2025 specific to this goal Meeting Friends: Specific efforts to target this goal were: becoming involved in more church ministry activities such as meals for Junction Kids celebrations, attempting to provide food options for individuals with specific food needs, like making sure there are gluten free options at each event, labeling foods with common allergies such as nuts and providing sugar free options. Trying new formats for meals that support people's schedules so that they can attend ministry activities and services example: buffet meal prior to Good Friday Service. Outcome: The average attendance at the monthly Fellowship Times increased from 50 in 2023 to 55 2024. New individuals and families volunteered to host or assist with Fellowship Activities. Sharing Hope: Stay tuned for possible new activities in 2025 specific to this goal

Finally, it was our real joy to confirm Abigail Hill and Aaron Saucedo in September. Welcome to the family of faith!




