

Annual reports always seem to interrupt a year. Suddenly Christmas and bells are past and it's time to tell people (who already know what you're going to say) what has happened during the year just over. And everything always seems to be good and pleasant and right. The nights are cold and we nestle near warm fires and skim through words and figures and decide after a short while that all is practically well: the work of the Lord has survived; the New Haven is still running late; children still grow tall and cause concern; bills still arrive regularly, and "our town" is a good town.

But much is different, and so many lives have changed, and so fast. A child who sang the same note over and over suddenly hears the tune for the first time, and that is just about the most special sound there is: a sound of music! A happy Catholic calls the Church office and asks, "Is it really all right for me to sing "Messiah" with your choir at that service mentioned in the paper?" You bet it is, and bring your neighbor!

The week to week work on Sunday anthems: how can praising the Lord be a fresh experience? How much of the outside world should we bring into the Meetinghouse? Drums, jazz, trumpets, the voices of children? Where does tradition end and

new interest begin?

So much is owed our choirs it is difficult not to go overboard on their behalf. They sing in the summer, they sing in the snow; they ring bells and clash cymbals and beat tambourines and sing carols with candles dripping (weeks later: "Do you know I ruined a perfectly good pair of gloves and spent three days in bed after singing those-carols holding a candle outside in the cold Christmas Eve?").

But a baby was born that night!

"I'm afraid we'll have to rehearse the day before Easter. Just an hour or so that Saturday morning." ("He's kidding.")

But a young man died yesterday!

And that man changes our lives. We sing carols, color Easter eggs, laugh and cry and live;

grow different and better.

In May we will be involved with a flood, with "Noye's Fludde," Benjamin Britten's spectacular musical setting of the Chester miracle play of Noah and the Ark. I hope that flood will engulf us all. There is room for everyone in that ark, and we will need everyone to help make Noah's Ark secure and seaworthy.

Rumer Godden has translated a prayer from the French of Carmen Bernos de Gasztold, one of her many "Prayers from the Ark":

it all goes on year after year, but, hopefully, we

The Prayer of the Dog

Lord. I keep watch! If I am not here who will guard their house? Watch over their sheep? Be faithful? No one but You and I understands what faithfulness is. They call me, "Good dog! Nice dog! Words . . . I take their pats and the old bones they throw me and I seem pleased. They really believe they make me happy. I take kicks too when they come my way. None of that matters. I keep watch! Lord. do not let me die until, for them, all danger is driven away. .Amen.

Our music, our lives, are all ahead of us, and we have realized or will soon know that it is not alone the dog or the light in the hall or the prosperous attache case that keeps the danger away: it is the hand of God, and around him there are choirs Richard Vogt Director of Music

Kenneth Patchen, a contemporary American poet, creates "picture-poems", short verses which show and tell quite a bit about life. A recent one runs like this: "The best hope is that one of these days the ground will get disgusted enough just to walk away...leaving people with nothing more to stand on than what they have so bloody well stood for up to now."

That's a lively thought, fit for any person, business, church... or music program. Is our mighty band of blue robes a vital segment of vital worship or would we find only outworn traditions and gimmicky innovations if our terra firms slipped away.

During 1969 I feel we took a few more steps in worthwhile directions. Benjamin Britten's "Noah's Flood" and the Christmastide "Boar's Head and Yule Log Festival" followed our creed for music at First Church: involve as many men, women, and children in the total program as possible, and then make sure there are enough chairs, costumes, recorders, and bells to keep the total operation moving ahead in praise of the Lord. Carl Sandburg wrote that there is only one child in the world and that child's name is all children. Looking at the chancel on Easter, I sometimes think they're all right there.

Britten's Noah's Flood has proved unique in our mission. Its power is clothed in simple language and many people worked together again, overcoming all sorts of animal, vegetable and musical obstacles. The Boar's Head Festival brought many new faces from our congregation into a colorful representation of a medieval English Christmas. Other significant events included the exhibit of contemporary Christian art at

a special Lenten Music Service; Alice Parker's Music Workshop; and the freshness of the Youth Sunday in late October.

We have our dedicated and talented choirs for all seasons. In Porter Remington we have a gifted organist who gives unsparingly of her time. In Seth McCoy we have an exceptional tenor who usually manages to keep the director of music in line with his free advice and subtle needling.

Where I feel we falter is in regular Sunday worship. I believe more music, more worship, should convey the drama and concerns of Jesus' life as they apply to our turbulent times, just as the beautiful carols and hymns tell the story of Christmas and Easter. Ministerauthor Harvey Cox writes that we should not identify 'religious' with what churches do. Many contemporary songs are more significant than many traditional hymns in telling it like it is. There can be both Bach and rock. All of our worship must be more receptive to new ideas. Too often the "church in action" seems like church inaction.

We have so many advantages. We can meet the challenges of a new decade with new ideas, and our "ground" will not walk away if we stand firm in our faith. Because that faith is founded on the rock of ages.

In closing I would like to thank Ollie Lyon and Russ McLauchlan for their help and counsel as music committee chairmen during the past year. And a special word of appreciation to Pat and Kent Dirlam who have been so helpful.

Any year that singles out a "Love Story" (Erich Segal's successful book and movie) and a "Jesus Christ, Superstar" (provocative rock opera) must have something special going for it, and so it was with 1970. Hopefully our music program also captured the imagination of many hearts in the drama of life and worship. Our voices and instruments got through the year without our majestic natural disaster, Britten's "Noye's Fludde", but I think many were nostalgic for that organized chaos. However in looking back to 1970 in this church, particular memories come to mind.

A concert at Greenwich Library gave us an opportunity to explore new areas of music, and our own age of Aquarius blossomed there on a very snowy Sunday afternoon in February.

When the Tougaloo College Choir joined our choir on Palm Sunday it made those two worship services a festival experience. "Ride On, King Jesus!" became more than a powerful spiritual that day—it seemed the triumphant call of a church caught up in hosannas, palm branches and happy hearts.

Marc Monis is a gifted young guitarist. He has often helped our music along, performing with Bob Caird and Bruce Hansen (guitars also) in special arrangements. During July we organized guitar lessons under Marc's direction, and that little band of pickers and strummers wandered to Binney Park twice each week for alfresco sessions, culminating in their participation at a worship service at the close of the month.

Our live sheep (outdoor creche) escaped their strawy hut one night in late December and we chased them around and finally managed to carry three back inside, and then the two others followed. Sheepherding was not in my original contract! All I could think of was the chorus from Handel's Messiah: "All we like sheep have gone astray." But once again the animals were safe and sound and sheltered, and there was even snow a few times during our brief Christmastide festival. The Candlelight Carol Service, the first of the programs, was a vehicle for the dramatic debuts of the Senior Pastor and the Minister to Youth in their completely forgettable performances as "St. George and the Dragon", a traditional mummers' Christmas play.

Through the year many young children, young people and young-older people made this church alive with voices, bells, recorders, guitars — an endless stream of the sounds of music. The Chancel Choir remained the central strength of our program, and the members' loyalty, often to both worship services, was constant. We also benefit greatly from our organist, Porter Remington, a person whose talent and devotion commands our respect and deserves our gratitude.

The Music Committee oversees the entire program, and the chairman, Car Westbrook, works tirelessly on their behalf. Thanks to Joann Dannecker, the study of recorder has become a way of life for many children and adults.

Finally, although each person's efforts contribute greatly, I must mention Julie and Bill Jenkins, a family who will soon move from Old Greenwich. A large part of the success of our major and minor productions — from banners to music to carpentry to costumes — would not have been achieved without them. We thank them and wish them well.

Music was only a part of 1970 at this church. In 1971 we must work to capture the imagination of more hearts in our total worship program. Although we all have our winters of discontent, somehow we must try to seek glory together.

One of the blessed sights and sounds in winter is Binney Park when the ice freezes, and on crisp late afternoons the tower bells ringing across the snow to the skater's ears and beyond. It's a Breughel-like scene and for me there's both music and worship involved. (Another blessing is an attractive, middle-aged, blonde toll-taker at Greenwich on the turnpike who really and invariably smiles and says "thank you" when you hand over that miserable green ticket, even on the darkest days. I think she may be a saint.) I feel much of our music and worship rises out of the world, weather, people and animals God creates around us; sometimes a starry night, or even those gray weeks which invade us in February and March; often the Meetinghouse, or the joy of being with friends, or perhaps alone somewhere.

In certain ways I feel our music in worship became more significant during 1971. Our congregational "freedom of the individual soul" and "right of private judgment" grant us an ever-widening spectrum of sound and style, although the haven of Bach's "Magnificat" or Handel's "Messiah", or simply a beautiful hymn or carol, is always special and sure.

Many wonderful parents share their children with us, and those young choristers, bellringers and recorder players made the idea of family worship especially significant on Music Sunday, Harvest Sunday, and at Christmastide. The Chancel Choir is ever the central strength of the music program, and Porter Remington remains our excellent organist and constant helper. We also benefit greatly from three other persons: Joann Dannecker, who devotes much time to recorder instruction for both adults and children; Mary Hunt, who cares for the music library together with Joann; and Caralliene Westbrook. Caralliene's devotion to this church, and especially the music program, is continually evidenced by tremendous enthusiasm and hard work. With her departure this year as music committee chairman go my sincere thanks and gratitude.

What of our music in the future?

"And David danced before the Lord with all bis might".

That fantastic verse (2 Samuel 6:14) comes to my mind when I think about music and how best to praise the Lord. You get the feeling that David didn't just waltz around some throne looking sort of holy-happy. He became exalted, a furious Nureyev doing what he did best, in praise of the Lord. I pray in 1971 we were sometimes Davids, and in 1972 the same, following more nearly "great David's greater Son."

I know only two people who keep a Christmas tree up and functioning as long as I do - an Episcopal priest and his beautiful young wife over in north Jersey. While most others are getting depressed putting wires and bulbs and pine cones back on high shelves, we are sitting in our individual tree houses, or sometimes together, slowly sipping lemonade and rejoicing in these January evenings when the peace of Christmas can be felt and treasured. It is a special time. The lights and the ornaments, mostly hand-carved animals and folk figures, make the night come alive, and the year just past and the year ahead come easily into mind. The three of us have survived the "What are you, some kind of a nut?" comments from those less committed (!) than we. Last year my good friends' scotch pine outlasted mine, but this year I'm determined to win, and may just celebrate Ground-hog Day on a gold carpet of dead pine needles.

1972 is history, and for music at First Church I feel it was often history-making. Bach's ST. JOHN PASSION - two performances - was a high point. And those 180 hallelujah faces singing MESSIAH at Christmas. The MISSA LUBA and GODSPELL on Music Sunday were really dancing and singing in praise of the Lord; and our part of the October meetings of the Connecticut Conference proved to be a miniature music festival - Schutz, Bach, Vaughan Williams, Hovhaness, GODSPELL again, and many great hymns. Earlier in the year there was a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper; a surprise service in honor of our departing senior pastor, Duke Potter; children coloring Easter eggs; and in December, the sheep came home

to our hand-hammered creche.

No report concerning 1972 would be complete without special words for Porter Remington, our organist, who resigned in October after more than four years of service to First Church. Porter made a beautiful difference in our lives, and her talent and sensitivity remain a special and remembered gift. Jon Hunt filled in as organist during November; and David Johnson, a graduate of the Yale School of Music, was appointed to the permanent position in December.

I would like to thank certain people who worked through the year to make the music program happen more smoothly: Joann Dannecker, who teaches recorder. Mary Hunt, who cares for the music library together with Joann; the Music Committee and its chairman, Bob Caird; and the Reverend Zan Harper for his great care and con-

cern for the music program during his interim pastorate with us.

Most of all, I give thanks for all the children and adults who take part in our music. They are the sounds of worship in this Church. They are the loyal, talented and involved people who sing and play God's praises. May God bless them, everyone. And may God grant us all clear sounds and healthy voices, and Peace in 1973.

1973 heralded the return of Noah and his Ark to First Church with a new menagerie of animals. Hundreds of children and adults celebrated the joy of Britten's "Noye's Fludde" after four years in dry-dock country.

Our music seeks to strengthen the way we worship. "Noah's Flood" has always been a special blessing. We like to explore ideas - electronic music for a worship service brought new sounds and sights into the Meetinghouse, together

with other contemporary anthems through the year.

The Chancel Choir remains the central strength of the music program. During the year we welcomed several new members, but bid special and sad farewells to Joann Dannecker - singer, recorder player and teacher extraordinary - who moved to Indiana; and Arline and Ed Merrell, who moved to New Hampshire, leaving a legacy of devotion and work in the church and choir that spanned many years.

The children's choirs made festival days joyful with their care, delight, imagination and strong voices. Recorders and handbells welcomed worshippers at the tower entrance on Easter Day, and these groups also participated in many other services and special events. Our annual Christmastide performance of Handel's "Messiah" attracted a large community

chorus, together with chamber orchestra and guest soloists.

Our choirs and music committee get involved with pancakes on Shrove Tuesday; coloring Easter eggs; making bennrs; feeding animals during the "Flood'" building the outdoor creche; decorating the Meetinghouse pillars with laurel leaves; making the Advent wreath and creating a Star of David.

Many hearts and minds combine to make First Church a church for all seasons, seasons, but especially we thank Emily Lent, Mary Hunt, Jean Jankovich, Car Westbrook, Martha Braun, Ray Harrington, and Pat Geismar and the music committee, for their great assistance all through the year. To Carolyn Colegrove, who resigned in late October, we express our appreciation for her care and concern for the music program during her years at First Church.

We look forward to new music in praise of the Lord. We will work to

make that music more worthy in His sight.

Special Agent 007 is sure to be perplexed if the CIA ever gets 'round to bugging a Music Committee meeting. What could he report about an attractive, intelligent group of people who meet regularly to talk, laugh, disagree and discuss (among other things) pancakes, sheep, sword dancers, monks' robes, laurel leaves, mince pies - and music. It is a special group, and their enthusiasm and support made many events in 1974 possible and successful.

On a Sunday in March we welcomed the Greenwich High School Jazz Ensemble which joined our choirs and instrumental groups in a varied service of music in praise of the Lord. In June we transported much of that service to St. John's Episcopal Church in Winsted, Connecticut, for the festival dedication of their new pipe organ. More than 100 children and adults contributed to the joyful chaos of choirs and instrumentalists on the move that day.

At Christmastime 175 choristers from the community joined together with orchestra and soloists in our annual performance of Handel's MESSIAH. Six days later THE BOAR'S HEAD AND YULE LOG FESTIVAL filled the Meetinghouse with merry mummers, jugglers, bagpipes, brass, recorders, bells and caroling

choristers at two overflow performances.

The Chancel Choir remains the central strength of the music program and many parents share their children to make our younger choirs and instrumental groups lively and accounted for at festival worship services and special events. We welcomed many outstanding soloists through the year. On the third Sunday in Advent we were especially privileged to greet Peter Pears, the distinguished English tenor, as guest soloist.

Many hearts and hands work to make the music program function, but especially we thank Mary Hunt, Jean Jankovich, Martha Braun, Barbara Gallagher, Car-Westbrook and Ray Harrington for their great assistance. We are also blessed with a Music Committee that loves to get together and work, and Pat Geismar has chaired that happy band with dedication and enthusiasm.

We give thanks for all the children and adults who make music at First Church. They are the sounds of worship - the loyal, talented and involved people who sing and play God's praises. May God bless them, everyone.

And may God grant us all clear sounds and healthy voices in 1975.

On December 21, 1975, Chuck Livingston anchored a Christmas tree to the roof of my yellow Rabbit. It was a sturdy remnant of the Congregators' outdoor sale. Chuck said it was a tree that David Holmes had rejected (too short), but my dog Pushkin was particularly happy about this lush bit of Connecticut greenery transformed into festive New York indoor plumbing. Christmas was coming, and 1975 neared a close with special memories crowding into mind.

Shrove Tuesday pancakes made way for our Lenten program of MUSIC, DANCE AND DRAMA. The Choirs, together with guest soloists and instrumentalists, performed works of Bach, Mendelssohn and Daniel Pinkham, and Beth Geismar proved a moving interpreter of Samuel Barber's "Adaglo for Strings" in dance. The Greenwich High School Percussion Ensemble joined us for MUSIC SUNDAY, and the drums made a rousing finale to that festival service in "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." On December 14, the third Sunday in Advent, we welcomed The Treble Choir from Eastern Junior High School in carols from Britten's "Ceremony of Carols." That afternoon more than two hundred singers and instrumentalists took part in our annual performance of Handel's MESSIAN (Part 1) before a capacity congregation.

CHRISTMAS REVELS followed six days later, and the chancel became a fairyland of little gingerbread houses and Christmas lights, thanks to Aletha Carlton. The choirs and instrumental groups celebrated Christ's birth in music, food, poetry, dance and drama. Brandy, a beautiful St. Bernard, and Santa Claus, an overstuffed Tom Stiers, were star attractions, both loping

down the center alsle.

James Fund and I got together a MANGER SERVICE for families on Christmas Eve and that time was special for us and hopefully all who were present. It was filled with stories and conversation about Christmas, and traditional carols which David Johnson accompanied on his newly-built harpsichord. Afterward we walked to Binney Park in the snow for the community carol sing, and later that evening David played an organ recital in prejude to the Christmas

Eve Candlelight Service.

Music at First Church depends on many children and adults. The Chancel Choir is the joyful, hard-working center of it all, but many others help make things happen. The Music Committee, chaired by Arthur Delmhorst, is organized and able. Its members performed myriad tasks through the year, and two past (not old) committee members - Phyllis Freeman and Pat Gelsmar - wound the laurel leaves in the Heetinghouse during the "Hessiah" dress rehearsal. We are most grateful to David Johnson, our organist, for his work with the music program throughout the year. We also thank Hartha Braun, Sue Taylor, Carallene Westbrook, Hary Hunt, Jean Jankovich, Ray Harrington and Lloyd Cooke for their help and kindness; and John Neikirk, who organizes jugglers and St. Bernards.

We stand at the threshold of our nation's bicentennial. We must live and sing the joy and thanksgiving of this great event. May it renew a right spirit within us.






