Providing Time for Fun Interaction

15 minutes

Pray for your group before they arrive. Pray for kids who will visit your group for the first time. Thank God for the kids in your group and the unique ways He has made them! Recall a time God gave you the courage to help someone in need. Thank God for sending the Holy Spirit to guide you. Ask God to help you remind the kids that they don't have to be afraid to help others because God is always with them. Pray that the kids would understand that helping others is not about getting attention, but about sharing God's love with others. Ask God to help the kids recognize when He is leading them to take action.

Opening Activity

Made to Connect

What You Need: Prepared bag with nine Bingo cards inside, "Brave Acts Bingo" Activity Page, and pencils

What You Do:

- Give every kid a "Brave Acts Bingo" Activity Page and a pencil.
- Say, "We're going to play a game that helps us think about all the different ways people can be brave, even when they feel afraid."

Connect Together:

- Pull one Bingo card from the bag and read it aloud.
- If a kid has done that act of bravery before, invite them to mark that square on their board.
- Keep drawing cards until someone gets three in a row (across, up and down, or diagonally).
- Pause and ask:
 - "What does it take to be brave in these situations?"
 - "How do you think God helps you be brave when you're helping someone else?"

What You Say:

"Wow! You've already done so many brave things, big and small. Some of you might not feel brave all the time, and that's totally okay. Even the bravest people get scared sometimes. **[Transition] Let's go to Large Group to hear a story about someone God helped to be brave even when it was risky!**"

Lead your group to the Large Group area.

2. LARGE GROUP

What You Need: TV, Pre-Loaded Video Content

What You Do:

- Introduce/Remind kids about the
 - a. Monthly Theme,
 - b. Monthly Memory Verse
 - c. Today's Bottom Line
- Play 1st and 2nd Worship Songs
- Allow kids to grab a snack
- Play Teaching (Story Lab - Video)

Groups: Creating a Safe Place to Connect

Groups: Creating a Safe Place to Connect 25 minutes

1. Spy Mission Escape

Talk about God | Bible Story Review

Made to Move

What You Need: “Review Questions” Activity Page, “Course Challenges” Activity Page, painter’s tape, and various obstacle course items

What You Do:

- Before you begin, using the “Course Challenges” Activity Page, create a challenge course to represent the spies’ journey. Feel free to add your own ideas.
- Use the painter’s tape to create a start line and a finish line for the challenge course.
- Inform the group that they will move through each challenge in a single line.
- When a kid goes through a challenge first, instruct them to wait for the entire group to pass through that challenge.
- After each challenge, ask one kid a review question:
 - If the kid answers correctly, instruct the group to move forward to the next challenge.
 - If the kid answers incorrectly, instruct the group to freeze for a few seconds before moving to the next challenge.
- Once all the challenges are completed and questions are answered correctly, instruct the kids to stand on the finish line. Declare that the team has reached the “safe zone” (finish line), just like the spies escaping Jericho.

What You Say:

“Rahab showed amazing courage, didn’t she? She hid the spies, even though it was risky. Why do you think she did that? *(Pause for answers. She had heard stories of the one true God and wanted to be a part of His team, His family.)* Rahab trusted God to help her, and God was good—He kept her and her family safe.

“Rahab’s courage didn’t just save her family—it also brought her into God’s family! Did you know that Rahab became part of Jesus’ family line? *(Pause for reactions.)* It made God so happy that Rahab trusted Him and was brave! When you face a tough situation or need to help someone, remember: **[Bottom Line] God can give you courage to help someone in need.**”

Inclusive Pro Tips:

- Consider the needs of your group and adjust the activity accordingly.
- Repeat each question and give time for all kids to process and answer.

2. Courage-In-Action Chain

What You Need: Long strips of cardstock, tape or stapler, markers, and pencils

What You Do:

- Give each kid a strip of cardstock and a pencil.
- Instruct the kids to write a situation where they might need courage to help someone.
 - *Some suggestions might include: seeing a new kid sitting alone at lunch, including someone who is being left out, standing up for someone being teased, assisting a friend who spills their lunch.*
- Set out the markers.
- On the back of the strip of cardstock, instruct the kids to use the markers to write or draw how God can help them have courage in that situation.
- When done, encourage kids to share what they wrote and/or drew.
- End by linking the strips together with tape or a stapler to create a “Courage Chain” as a reminder that God gives us strength to help others.
- Hold on to the chain to use during Prayer and Dismissal.

What You Say:

"Thank you for sharing situations where you feel you need courage to help someone in need. It took a lot of courage, and it probably felt a little risky to share what you wrote and drew. But helping someone in need is exactly what Jesus would do.

"Rahab showed incredible courage when she helped the spies. Even though she wasn't a member of God's family, she trusted the one true God and chose to take a huge risk to help them. She showed that she wanted to be on God's team!

"We can show people that we are on God's team too by loving them the way Jesus did! Jesus always helped people who needed help. Like if you're with a group of kids who are making fun of someone, you can be brave and say something kind to defend them. Jesus would be kind too! Or maybe, if you see someone who's alone, you can invite them to play and make them feel welcome. Jesus would make them feel welcome too!

"And you aren't on your own when you're kind like Jesus! When you decided to follow Jesus, God moved inside of you through His Holy Spirit. He is closer than close! And as you go throughout your day, you'll feel a nudge from Him to help and do something. And He will give you the strength and courage to do it! So just do what you feel Him nudging you to do. Jesus' very Spirit will lead you to be kind like He is!"

[Bottom Line] "God can give you courage to help someone in need."

[Make It Personal] *(Share about a time when you were brave and you did something to help someone. What did you do? Maybe it was holding the door for them, assisting with groceries, shoveling snow, or mowing a neighbor's lawn. How did they respond when you helped? How do you think the person you helped felt? We show people God's love when we're kind like He is!)*

3. Pray and Dismiss

Pray to God | Prayer Activity

Made to Reflect

What You Need: Chain from “Courage-in-Action” Chain Activity

What You Do:

- Invite the kids to sit in a circle.
- Place the paper chain in the center.
- Encourage the kids to think of what they drew or wrote on their strip of paper.
- Give them a few seconds to silently ask God to give them the courage to help those in need based on what they drew or wrote.
- Close in group prayer.

What You Say:

“Dear God, thank You for always being with us through Your Holy Spirit. Give us the courage to be kind like You are. Help us in the situations we’ve shared in this chain. Teach us to listen to Your Spirit so we can be courageous and kind as we go throughout our day. We love You, and we pray these things in Jesus’ name. Amen.”

As adults arrive to pick up, encourage the kids to show them the Courage-In-Action Chain and share today’s **[Bottom Line] God can give you courage to help someone in need.**”

Inclusive Pro Tips:

- Consider the needs of your group and adjust the activity accordingly.
- Be mindful of kids who may not want to pray out loud. Assure them that God hears every prayer, even the ones that aren’t spoken aloud!
- Provide adaptive seating and offer fidget tools to all kids.

Brave Acts Bingo

Helped a friend when they were sad.	Tried something new even though it was scary.	Helped a friend when they need a hand.
Sat or invited someone who was sitting by themselves at lunch.	Helped a sibling or friend who is scared to try something new.	Helped get a bug out of your car.
Took a big bite of a new food.	Walked into a dark room by yourself.	Asked a question when you didn't understand something.

1. Who did God choose to lead His people after Moses died? (Joshua)
2. What did God tell Joshua to be as he led His people? (strong and very brave)
3. Where did Joshua send the two spies? (Jericho)
4. Who helped the spies hide in Jericho? (Rahab)
5. Where did Rahab hide the spies? (on her roof under some flax)
6. What did Rahab ask the spies to do in return for her help? (to spare her and her family when God's people took over Jericho)
7. What did the spies tell Rahab to do so she and her family would be saved? (tie a red rope in her window and stay inside her house)
8. How did God's people conquer Jericho? (They followed God's instructions. They marched around the city for seven days, then shouted, and the walls fell down.)
9. What happened to Rahab and her family after Jericho was conquered? (They were saved, just as the spies had promised.)
10. What does this story teach us about courage? (God gives us courage to help others, just like Rahab helped the spies.)

1. Crawl Under Tables (Hiding Under Flax)
 - Kids must crawl under tables or chairs, pretending to hide like the spies did under Rahab's flax on the roof.
2. Sneak Through a "City Wall" Maze
 - Set up chairs, or cones, as a maze representing Jericho's city walls. Kids must navigate through quietly without knocking anything over.
3. Balance Walk (Crossing the Jordan River)
 - Place a triple wide piece of tape on the ground as a "river." Kids must carefully walk across without stepping off.
4. Jump Over "City Gates" (Escaping from Jericho)
 - Use pool noodles or a low hurdle for kids to jump over, symbolizing the spies escaping the closed city gates.
5. Army March (Marching Around Jericho)
 - Have kids march in a circle around an obstacle seven times before moving to the next challenge, just like God's people did around Jericho.
6. Climb Through a Tunnel (Being Lowered by the Red Rope)
 - Use a play tunnel or create one with chairs and blankets and instruct the kids to climb through it, symbolizing Rahab lowering the spies down the city wall.
