Pastor's Reflections for October 2025



Grace and peace to you from Christ our Lord and from the Saints of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. We are happy to receive 5 new members into the church family at the end of September. They are a welcome addition, and we hope to continue reaching out and welcoming more people into the team here at Prince of Peace. The congregation continues to grow as we reach out in excitement to make a difference in the world with God's love and grace leading the way.

We use the words like team, family, and community to describe the church to which we belong because we share a bond with each other that is deeper than acquaintance or friendship. As we join to become church together we make commitments to love and care for one another in our pursuit of living as Jesus' disciples. In the gospel of John the 13th chapter verse 35; Jesus reminds his disciples that the outside world will know that we are his disciples by the way that we love, one for another. The importance of love in the separation of what makes us different, shapes everything that we do in our living out of our faith. To be Christ like is to lead first with love, this applies when responding to persecution, as well as how to handle positions of power. This also applies to how to handle situations when we have wronged another, just as much as when we ourselves have been wronged by someone else. The primacy of having Christ like love, should be the most important virtue of evaluating our actions and discourse.

We acknowledge that as people we are not perfect, or indeed even close to being known by our love in the places where we are Church. For this we confess our failure to God, who is merciful and ask for guidance from the Holy Spirit to help us Love first and be right less. In so doing how do we express our thoughts and feelings with each other in a way that represents love first, without diminishing the passion of our genuine thoughts and beliefs. The importance of respecting each other becomes vital in keeping our debates and disagreements Loving first but also not dismissing our neighbor's zeal. When we respect our neighbor, we acknowledge their worth and intent, even when we oppose their idea. This means taking time to respectfully listen, acknowledge that the individual as adequately considered the pros and cons, and confidently raising your own position without denigrating the other. In this way we meet our neighbors with humility accepting that we do not know everything about them or what new insights they have to share. It is not easy to transition to this style of debate and conversation. We have been raised if an national environment which promotes the competition of ideas, where only one can be the best. This drive is good in that it challenges us to think critically however it also encourages us to accept loses to readily. Often there is no best answer to a question that has many dimensions. This then can put us in a position trying to judge what portion is most important instead of widening our conversation to encompass the entirety of the subject. This removes the need to determine who is right or best, as the goal is to understand rather than judge. As we move in the world around lead by the love of Christ how can we endeavor to understand with each other more than we judge with each other.

I can't believe it's the end of summer already! As fall approaches with cooler weather and cotton candy sunsets we have lots of things going on here at Prince of Peace!

Our **August mission** for Lutheran Social Services generated \$834.97 as well as two separate checks made out specifically to LSS. Thank you to all who contributed and to the LSS representatives who visited on August 3 after our service! These people do so much for so many, it is a privilege to contribute to their efforts.

The **Summer mission** for America's Youth was a huge success with over 150 children given school supplies and several boxes of additional supplies to help with their after school programs. Thank you to all who helped America's Youth continue changing the trajectory of young lives!

Our **September mission** for Nassau County Coalition for the Homeless continues in conjunction with our Back to School Sunday celebration "Life is Better Together". A list of needed items and a jug for monetary donations are in the narthex. The Coalition provides many needed services for people who have no place to live here on Amelia Island and in Nassau county. This is a charitable organization funded only by donations and is staffed by volunteers. Along with food and clothing the Coalition also helps with job hunting, housing, and procurement of legal documents such as birth certificates. A speaker from the Coalition is scheduled for Sunday September 28th. He will discuss some of the ways our support can assist neighbors in need, and answer questions. Life truly is "better together", especially when we are able to help each other. September is a busy month! On September 14 there was a legacy Giving Seminar following worship in the fellowship hall.

On September 20 from 5-8pm Thrivent is hosting a "Midnight Masquerade" event in the fellowship hall to benefit Lutheran Social Services of Florida.

NEW BIBLE STUDY STARTING

October 7th

On Tuesday afternoons, starting October 7th at 3:30 PM, we will be doing an in person adult Bible Study. We are trying a new location: Holy Grounds Coffee Shop, located at 960185 Gateway Blvd Suite 105 in Fernandina Beach. This a convenient location for participants who live on Amelia Island, as well as those who have to come "over the bridge"! The coffee shop faces Amelia Island Parkway and is located behind the Speedway Gas Station.

Participants are welcome to purchase a coffee, tea or lemonade and join us at tables at the back of the shop. The shop owners are willing to host community groups and have agreed to set up a space for us.

John Harris will be leading this study on the book of Ruth, which like much of the Bible, is a story of migration. Biblical migration stories include: Abraham to the promised land, Jacob to Egypt, Moses leading the people back to the promised land, Jesus and the Holy Family to Egypt and back to Judea, and finally, Jesus turning His face to Jerusalem.

The Book of Ruth certainly continues this theme as Ruth migrates to Israel with Naomi and becomes a part of Jesus' earthly genealogy! And, of course, our own secular history in the early 21st century revolves around questions of migration, as immigration has made many a stranger in a strange land. Over the course of 4 weeks, we will look at these four questions in terms of Ruth's faith and our own faith journeys: where does loss push us, where does loyalty pull us, where does risk take us, and finally, where does hope lead us. Many provocative questions in such a short book! For those of you who wish to purchase the Study Guide, not mandatory, it is available for purchase at Augsburg Fortress Press for \$5.74. It takes about 2 weeks for delivery!

ROOTED IN GOD'S GRACE: WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO AT PRINCE OF PEACE! 2025 STEWARDSHIP DRIVE TO FOCUS ON OUR TIME AND TALENTS!

"Then the father said to him, 'You are always with me, and all that is mine is yours."" (Luke 15:31)

To all my sisters and brothers in Christ at Prince of Peace:

Thank you for all that you do to keep our Ministry active here at Prince of Peace, both in keeping the Congregation going and in reaching out to our neighbors outside of our doors. But, as you know, in the daily distractions of our lives and the cares of the world, and in a perspective of scarcity that pervades our culture, we sometimes forget the overwhelming grace that the father shows the older son in the parable of the Prodigal. You are always with me, and all that is mine is yours.

God makes this promise to each one of us and in God's economy there is enough for everyone. God's abundance flows over us in the waters of baptism, we see it every week embodied in the bread and wine of Christ's table where everyone is welcome, and we see it in our own lives with the gifts and talents that God provides for us to share with our neighbors in a world in sore need of grace, mercy, and compassion.

Over the four Sundays in October, we will invite four members of our Congregation, in a brief Temple Talk, to tell us why they do what they do for our Congregation. What drives them to use their time and talents to come in early on a Sunday morning to teach our children, or to fix the plumbing in the Ladies Room, to cook a meal for a perfect stranger, or to lead our choir in a hymn of praise. Each of their stories, I suspect, will be illustrations of how God uses their hands to tell of His grace and abundance. I don't know how many people have noticed but Pastor Ben has put on our sign on Atlantic Ave. that "Love Abides Here." It certainly does! We offer an alternative vision for the world: instead of isolation, there is community, rather than uncertainty, there is the rootedness of God's grace, rather than scarcity, there is abundance.

Sometime in early October, you will receive a mailing from Prince of Peace. The mailing will contain three items. You will receive the 3rd quarter statement of your contributions; a time, talents, and treasure pledge card; and finally, a notice for our annual meeting on Nov. 9th following the Sunday service. When you receive the pledge card, prayerfully consider the abundance that God has given you in time, talents, and treasure and give as generously as you can. As surely as love abides here at Prince of Peace, let us abide in God's graciousness, sharing with us the abundance of God's creation, and let us share in kind the gifts God has given us for building up God's presence in and for the world.

On All Saints Sunday, Nov. 2nd, as we honor the memory of the Prince of Peace Saints that have gone before us, and the time, talents, and treasure that was part of their legacy to us, I believe it is fitting that we, the future Saints, present our pledges for 2026 during our Offertory time.

HOW DOES OUR ENDOWMENT WORK?

Creating an endowment is more than a financial decision—it's a reflection of our commitment to being a mission-centered church. It allows us to support benevolent giving not for just today, but for generations to come. So how does it work? Let's break it down.

Our endowment is governed by documents generated by the Endowment Board, with a top-level controlling document approved by both the Church Council and the congregation. These documents outline the responsibilities of the Endowment Board which oversees both the operational framework and the investment strategy.

Whether gifts are made immediately or later as part of a legacy, they follow a clear process.

Example: A contribution of \$1,000 is received. Since this meets the minimum required by Thrivent Charitable Impact & Investing, the funds are invested and apportioned according to a risk strategy defined by the Endowment Board. Any contributions less than \$1,000 are collected in a separate bank account until the minimum of \$1,000 is achieved for investing.

Once invested, the contribution becomes part of the fund principal—it doesn't disappear!

Contributions remain in the fund and continue as working capital subject to market performance. Here's how it supports ongoing generosity:

- •Grants begin either on the 4th year of endowment inception or if the endowment balance reaches \$70,000.
- •Only a portion of the <u>annual earnings</u> is eligible for withdrawal to support grants.
- •For instance, if the \$1,000 earns \$100 in a given year, a portion of that \$100 will be included in grants.
- •Grant allowances begin at 50% of annual gains for the first 10 years of the life of the endowment fund and increase to 90% thereafter. In this example, \$50 would be included in a grant issuance.
- •The remainder of earnings (the other \$50) is reinvested, allowing the principal to grow further along with new contributions over time—even as grants are annually awarded.

Grant issuances are paused only in years when the investment experiences a net loss. In all other years, the Endowment Board declares gains for distribution, working closely with the Outreach Committee to ensure alignment with our mission. This structure ensures that every gift—large or small—has the potential to grow and serve others for years to come. It's a beautiful way for Prince of Peace to turn generosity into a lasting impact that changes lives for the better.
