Theme: Repentance

The words "repent" or "repentance" appear more than

50 times in the Bible.

Definition: Feel or express sincere regret or remorse about one's

wrongdoing or sin.

Mark 1: 14-15 (NKJ)

After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 15) "The time has come," he said. "The Kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news."

A Thought:

"Change your hearts and lives because the Kingdom of Heaven is near." I wonder....just wondering if John the Baptist had any inkling of the impact of the aforementioned words. And to boot...the prophet Isaiah set the stage way back with the prophetic words...."This is a voice of one who calls out in the desert: prepare the way for the Lord. Make the road straight for Him." And in accordance with God's plan Jesus walked the same streets and neighborhoods as John the Baptist proclaiming 'repent and believe in the good news." He gave Himself for us....He paid the price to free us from evil and to make us pure people. Our love to Him should be exemplified by our repentant attitude and our deeds.
