

"I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:3-6)

My dear family in Christ,

As I prepare to retire my heart is heavy in the knowledge that I must leave the congregational family I have loved and served for nearly half of my life. Despite the disappointments that have led me to believe the time is right for my retirement, the words of the apostle Paul reflect my own feelings. I joyfully thank God in all my remembrance of you because of the partnership we have shared in the gospel. I also trust that you will continue this partnership with your next pastor and give him the same love, encouragement and support that you have given to me from the first day until now.

I am not worried about those who may be glad to see me go. Perhaps my departure will give them reason to return. I am, however, concerned about those of you who feel that life at St. John's will not be the same without old Pastor Umbarger around. I wish to use this opportunity to remind you that I am only an easily replaceable under shepherd. Your true Shepherd always has been and always will be Jesus Christ. It will always be He who baptizes you, absolves you, feeds you with His body and blood and speaks His Word into your heart.

The Apostle Paul offers some great insight for you as you go through this time of transition. He writes:

...one says, "I follow Paul," and another, "I follow Apollos,"... What, after all, is Apollos? And what is Paul? Only servants, through whom you came to believe—as the Lord has assigned to each his task...For we are co-workers in God's service; you are God's field, God's building. (I Cor. 3:4-5, 9) If you are only at St. John's because you are following a man or would consider leaving because of the loss of that man, then I have failed in my ministry. I had always intended to proclaim only Christ and Him crucified. For a while I planted. Your next pastor, my co-worker in God's service, will water but it will always be Christ who grants growth and prepares for the harvest. As Paul, again, writes, "[Christ] is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything he might have the supremacy. (Colossians 1:18) I urge you to keep the St. John's family together. Love and serve one another. And let your faithfulness and dedication to Christ and His Church remain steadfast.

I will miss all of you so much, and though no longer able to serve as your pastor, I pray that our friendship in Christ will continue. Finally, farewell. Do not be anxious about your future because the Lord will certainly provide. As was Paul with the saints at Philippi, I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.

# Meet Our Vacancy Pastor

Friends in Christ,

Some of you already know me. Others of you don't. A few of you have known me for a long time. I'm from Milan, baptized at Zion, Taylor Ridge, and nurtured in the Faith at St. Matthew. I attended public schools, graduating from Rock Island High School in 1974. But we can still be friends. Before I went off to school, I met my wife, Sara, who is a 1976 graduate of Orion High School.

We were married in 1978, and she worked while I went to school. I graduated from Concordia Teachers College (now Concordia University Chicago) with a B.A. in Education in 1981. From there, we moved to Ft. Wayne, and I graduated from Concordia Theological Seminary in 1985. My vicarage was at Trinity, Kalispell, MT, and my first Call was assigned to Zion, Burnett, WI.

Then I served as the Sole Pastor at churches in Missouri and Kansas, and in 2001 moved to Colorado Springs to work at Shepherd of the Springs Lutheran Church and School, where I served as Associate Pastor and wore several hats at their high school. In 2004 I put on several hats at our own Christ Lutheran High School in Davenport and Rock Island. The school closed in 2010.

I wrote a book, and for the next three years did pulpit supply, filled vacancies, and did a *Let's Talk About Preaching* workshop for pastors. In the spring of 2013, I was installed at Immanuel in Grand Mound (5 miles west of DeWitt on the Lincoln Highway). At the end of June last year I went to Emeritus status, took my pension, and didn't do anything for a year. Now I'm doing things.

One of the things I'm doing is being your Vacancy Pastor, starting in August. I will be leading Adult Bible Class and Divine Service on Sunday morning. It looks like you will be served on Saturday by other Circuit Pastors on a rotating basis. I'm also planning on beginning work on an advanced degree in September, and several other projects that I want to or think should happen.

Along the way we had three children; Kate is married to Dave, and they live mostly in Austin, TX, Justin lives in Davenport, and Laura and husband Ben live in Farmington, MI (Detroit) with Harper, our almost four-year old granddaughter. Ava is our other granddaughter. We also have many other relatives in the area, including my brother David, who is Pastor at Trinity, Coal Valley.

Pastor Hagen is also Emeritus, and he has agreed to take care of shut-in and hospital visits during this vacancy. Between the two of us, we will do our best to fill in the blanks. It's been a while since this congregation has been vacant, and you should be aware that we do our best to prioritize those blanks, but there are things a full-time pastor does that are put on hold during a vacancy.

I have known Pastor Umbarger for many years. He has served you well for these many years. I always told my people at Grand Mound that I'm a placeholder who will one day be replaced by another Shepherd. When that happens, God sends that next Shepherd in His time, and He already knows who that man will be. We pray that He would let us know who that is and do so quickly!

# Notes from the Balcony


#### August

# Jesus' transforming presence

"But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, 'Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.' Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost'" (Luke 19:8-10 NIV).

Who knew, all those kids sitting in Sunday school were getting a lesson in stewardship! Generations of children have very often heard lessons based on the familiar account of Zacchaeus. The diminutive tax collector's curiosity surrounding the person and ministry of Jesus is what the Holy Spirit used to set him on a collision course for a total stewardship transformation. This transformation, according to the text of Luke 19, is not just about this life. This stewardship transformation is about eternity as well!

Remember the story: Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Do not think of friendly neighborhood IRS agents. This was more like a toll booth operator, but the governing authorities did not set the toll. They would contract men to staff roadside booths and tax the commerce that was passing along the road. This was an enterprise full of greed and graft. The tax collectors would take as much as they could and only pass on a portion to the government. The rest did not go into the community chest either! It went into the pocket of the tax collector. This is why the people had such disdain for *Jewish* tax collectors. They were seen as both crooks and traitors. They were crooks in that they extorted their compatriots and others in the toll process. But worse, they were seen as traitors because their efforts supported the occupying Roman authorities. That is the real reason that the people would not make way so that short Zacchaeus could see Jesus.

For this reason, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. He had heard all the stories. He wanted to see this Jesus with his own eyes. Mercy is on display. This hated crook and traitor gets a direct audience with Jesus — at Jesus' own request! Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus' house. This is where the transformation is about to take place!

Notice how Jesus does it. He does not preach a three-week sermon series, nor does He ask Zacchaeus to make a pledge. There is nothing programmatic about Jesus' approach. But Zacchaeus is completely transformed! The transforming force is the very presence of Jesus! Direct time with Jesus takes a crooked, selfish, criminal and makes him the most faithful steward.

This new life of stewardship is marked by the promises made. First, he gives half of his ill-gotten gains to the poor. These are people whom he would not have defrauded at all! Yet, after spending time with Jesus, they are His first concern. Only after this does he double the requirement of the Levitical law on fraud. And what does Jesus say is the result? Salvation!

Doing the acts of stewardship does not save. Rather, the faith in Jesus that is created by the Holy Spirit is what saves! This is critical for us to confess. Failed stewardship can and will cut you off from God. The only antidote for failed stewardship is the presence of Jesus.

We do not need to run ahead and climb a tree for this presence of Jesus. He makes Himself available to us every week in the Divine Service. He speaks His Word of invitation to us in the pages of Holy Scripture. This, and this alone, transforms us from sinner to saint, from owner to steward of all that belongs to the Lord. Do you want to become a more faithful steward? Spend more time with Jesus. Make the Divine Service a weekly priority. Feast on Christ's body and blood weekly! This is the great gift that brings salvation from God's House to yours!
