### From Pastor's Pen:

### **Honoring The Saints**

The Lutherans seem to know what to do with Reformation Sunday. Talk about Jesus, work in Martin Luther, gloss some of the more major errors that led to what happened and tell me again just what are those "theses" and why were there ninety-five of them. That's Reformation Sunday, generally observed and celebrated on the Sunday before October 31, Reformation Day.

Reformation Day, not so much. Zion Lutheran Church, Pittsburg, Kansas had a great tradition of making October 31 a child-friendly event. The youngsters dressed up in costumes and came to church, where they played games like "Pin the Theses on the Church Door" and the like. At the end of the evening the children would go through a line and the adults put treats into their bags.

All Saints Day is November 1, which is a Saturday this year. A week after Reformation Sunday, we celebrate All Saints, and maybe that makes some of the Lutherans uncomfortable. It sounds "catholic." What? Pretty soon we'll be crossing ourselves! It's a day appointed on the Church's calendar to remember and honor "saints," and to thank God for their lives here and in eternity.

The term "saints" or "holy people" occurs often in the Bible, and the term is generally synonymous with "Christian." We are all saints, but not all Christians are the same, and some saints are notable, and are in fact noted by giving them "feast" or "festival" days. A listing of those days can be found in page xi (that's a Roman Numeral) in the front of Lutheran Service Book.

You will recognize most of the names in that listing. If you flip the page over to xii, you will find a listing of Christians who have days appointed for their "commemoration." You will recognize many of those names as well, and many of them are from the Bible. But a lot of them are people of whom you may or may not have heard, but who are important historical Christian figures.

The LCMS Commission on Worship publishes a periodical, and one of the articles in one of them is titled "Honoring The Saints." It's not a new thing to honor Christians who have entered the Church Triumphant; "In the early Church martyrs of a local congregation were remembered on the day of their death. The date of martyrdom was the day of their 'birthday' into heaven."

It is noteworthy that we don't know the date of birth of many of those people in the hymnal, but we do know the death date of most of them. Usually, that date is the one in the hymnal, and you can find that information on the Internet as well. The Lutherans did not get rid of, but in fact were very adamant that we keep, the tradition of honoring those exemplary and noteworthy Christians.

Our confession approves giving honor to the saints This honor is threefold. The first is thanksgiving: we should thank God for showing examples of His mercy revealing His will to save men, and giving teachers and other gifts to the church...The second honor is the strengthening of our faith: when we see Peter forgiven after his denial, we are encouraged to believe that grace does indeed about more than sin...The third honor is imitation, first of their faith and then of their other virtues. (Apology of the Augsburg Confession, 21:6)

This thing we know as The Church did not just appear out of nowhere yesterday. It has been around for a long time, and we can learn from those who have gone before us, from Adam and Eve, from Abraham and Sarah, from Prophets and Apostles down to our own time. And those saints you know, who are no longer with us, because we honor them too.

# Notes from the Balcony

The end is near. The end of the church year, that is. 2025 may have until December 31 to conclude, but the church year closes a month earlier on November 29, the day before Advent begins. Traditionally, our church takes the time at the end of the church year to reflectup on and prepare for the time at the end of the End. It is a good idea to be ready.

Let's use a little hymn challenge to learn about three of the *End Times* from our hymnal. See if you can match the hymn to the description. Your choices are:

The Bridegroom Soon Will Call Us, LSB 514 Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers, LSB 515 Wake, Awake, for Night Is Flying, LSB 516

(Answers are on page 8 of The Informer.)

This hymn and its tune were written by the German Lutheran pastor, poet, and composer, Philipp Nicolai (1556-1608). A brave and zealous defender of orthodox Lutheran doctrine, he compared the Calvinists to the heretics Arius and Nestorius and wrote his doctoral dissertation on *The Two Chief Antichrists: Muhammad and the Roman Pontiff.* While serving as a pastor in Unna, in Westphalia, an epidemic struck that killed 1,400 of its 2,500 citizens. There were days when Nicolai buried more than thirty people. During this trying time he wrote the book, *Mirror of the Joys of Eternal Life.* This hymn appeared in the appendix of that book. The parable of the wise and foolish virgins and references to Revelations are the basis of this hymn. The bridegroom for whom the virgins are waiting with either prepared or unprepared oil lamps is the heavenly Bridegroom who will appear "all-glorious" and "victorious" to take His people into the wedding hall to the sound of "hymns of praise and joy."

This hymn was a favorite of one of our members last year. Written by German pietist music director and cantor at the Lutheran cathedral in Bremen, Laurentius Laurenti (1660-1722), this four-stanza hymn originally had ten. Endeavoring to remain true to Biblical texts, Lauenti also included emotional enthusiasm in his hymns. Like the hymn described in number one, this hymn also speaks of the Bridegroom's midnight arrival and the need to have lamps ready. How do we prepare our lamps? "Up, pray and watch and wrestle" is the hymn-writer's answer. Once the Bridegroom appears, the saints look forward to eternal life with the Lamb. On this "benighted sphere," the Bridegroom cannot come soon enough. The final stanza pleads for the Lord's appearance.

The final end-times hymn has four stanzas, but at one time had thirty-four. It was written by the German Lutheran composer and poet, Johann Walter (1496-1570). A contemporary of Martin Luther, he spent time at Luther's house working on music for Lutheran services. The text of this hymn copied the form of a folk song from the mountain mining parts of Saxony, earning it the heading of "A beautiful spiritual and Christian new miner's song of the Last Day and eternal life." Also a hymn referencing the Bridegroom and oil-burning lamps, the poet bids the faithful be watchful and ready. Our Redeemer's glorious return and a joyous reunion with those who have gone before is the subject of stanza two. We sing in the third stanza of our release from sin, the devil, and all the troubles of this world. Saints join angels in musical celebration and praise at the heavenly feast in stanza four.

While our *End Time* hymns counsel preparedness because "the end is near," they also herald the beginning of a glorious life with the Lord. May the Lord bless your observe the end of the church year, and grant you a happy Thanksgiving also.



### FOOD PANTRY

St. John's food pantry is having its 4th consecutive record setting year for families served! As you may imagine, this takes an incredible amount of volunteer hours to continue our mission to serve families in need. Here is some 'food for thought' on what goes on behind the scenes:

- On an average Tuesday, there are around 14 individuals serving anywhere from 2-5 hours (equal to 45 man hours!) just for packing and distributing!
- It takes 27 hours of donated time to complete the restaurant and grocery pick-ups each week
- It takes an average of 4 hours a month to prepare and submit the mandatory reports to Riverbend





## From the CID

I, I am he who blots out your transgressions for my own sake, and I will not remember your sins.

Isaiah 43:25

Due to advancing age, illness, or other maladies many of us struggle to remember things. It can be very frustrating! I forget where I put my keys or my cell phone. And I quickly forget names. Yet I have trouble forgetting some things, like something a person says or does that offends me. And I may ruminate for days about my sins or mistakes.

The inability to forget some things and to remember others is a weakness with us. But God has the amazing ability to forget what he does not want to remember. And he always remembers what he doesn't want to forget. He remembers his promises and his love for us. When he says, "I forgive you" he immediately forgets the sin and wipes it from his mind as if it never happened. This is an amazing strength that is beyond our comprehension!

Satan tempts us to doubt God's word and to mistrust his promises. He wants us to believe his lie that God holds grudges and bears resentment. Satan wants us to argue with God by condemning ourselves or others for sins that have been absolved and that He has chosen to forget. We must always remember the verse above. Romans 8:1-2 reminds us, Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death.

When our pastor pronounces Christ's absolution and when we confess our sins in Christ to one another, we are set free from condemnation and the fear of punishment! Satan cannot condemn us, and our guilty consciences and resentful hearts are silenced by Christ's true and holy Word!
