# From Pastor's Pen:

"I rejoiced with those who said to me, 'Let us go up to the house of the Lord.'" (Ps. 122:1) My Dear Family In Christ,

After so many years in the Lord's service to this congregation my heart has grown heavy over the number among us who do not make regular worship with their fellow believers a priority in life. I understand that it is unlikely that those Who do not worship frequently will read this. I pray, though, that it is a message that will keep you steadfast in worship and give you opportunity to speak to your friends and family about their worship practices. Have you ever heard someone say, "You don't have to go to church to be a Christian!" People who feel this way are right, in a way. Faith in Christ, not the outward act of worship, is what makes one a Christian. Why, then, do we gather together for worship? What is worship? And why is it important for us?

First of all, we have to understand that worship is communion with God. God comes to us with His gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation, and we offer our joyful response of praise and thanksgiving.

In our worship it is God who acts first. He ACTS. He <u>A</u>bsolves the repentant of their sins, <u>C</u>onfirms the believer's faith in Christ, <u>T</u>eaches the believer the way of life, and <u>S</u>ends His people the Holy Spirit. God wants us to worship so that He can come close to us and bless us through things that are found nowhere else in our lives.

After God ACTS we then respond with faith that receives God's gifts with a grateful heart. In worship we reach out with hearts that are aware of our need for God's love, and seek the fellowship of God and His holy family. Faith leads us to confess our sins and to look to the LORD for forgiveness and strength. It also leads us to confess our faith before God and our fellow saints so as to encourage and spur one another on. Our faith also causes us to give thanks and praise to God in prayer and song.

All too often we think of worship in terms of what we give up; our sleep on Sunday morning, the time we could spend doing other things, or the money we are putting into the offering plate. If we attend worship simply because we must, and it has been drilled into us from little on that you are required to go to church, then we've taken all the joy out of it. The Lord invites us to worship not because we "have to", but because we "want to." That desire comes from faith in the heart. I dare say that where there is not such a desire the existence of living faith is in question.

We would all do well to think of worship in terms of what we receive rather than what we give up. In worship we receive the assurance of God's continued love and presence in our lives. In worship we receive the forgiveness of sins through the merits of Christ. Through worship God creates and strengthens our faith and gives us a living hope of eternal glory. It is true, the act of going to Church does not make us Christians, but by going to Church God makes us Christians through the Gospel, and empowers us to serve in His name. Dragging our tired old bodies out of bed and getting them into Church is probably the single most important thing we can do, because worship is important to us as Christians. It is

most important thing we can do, because worship is important to us as Christians. It is probably the single most blessed and beneficial time of our week. With the Psalmist, let us say: "I rejoiced with those who said to me, "Let us go up to the house of the Lord " (Ps. 122:1)

### Vicar's View

### **Christians and Conspiracy Theories**

This month I've decided to share my perspective on a topic that I think is very relevant to our present culture and that I was asked to write about last year for a class: how should Christians respond to conspiracy theories? Right away that raises other questions: what exactly is a conspiracy theory? Isn't "conspiracy theory" just a term that gets used to discredit certain beliefs without discussion? In this confusing age of competing narratives, what if we disagree about whether an idea should be called by that name? These are valid and important questions. But I believe that we as Christians have a way of cutting through all of that with the 8th commandment.

First, let's try to answer the question: what is a conspiracy theory? I think it's easier to define than we might think. Merriam-Webster defines the term as "a theory that explains an event or set of circumstances as the result of a secret plot by usually powerful conspirators." Notice that, by definition, a conspiracy theory assigns malicious and wicked motives to a group of people in power, and the fact that it is a "secret plot" means that a conspiracy theory is always based on disputed evidence and usually goes against official explanations or accounts by experts and scholars. This means that conspiracy theories are inherently difficult to prove, especially for your average private citizen.



This is where the 8th commandment comes in, which we know as "you shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." Luther's Small Catechism teaches us that this means that Christians should be people of the truth who "explain everything in the kindest way." That is, we should always assume the best about people unless they prove otherwise. We also should not spread harmful rumors about people (even if we know them to be true!). That includes people in power. Therefore, the best response for a Christian to anything that might meet the above definition is this: avoid it! Don't spread it. Because conspiracy theories assign the worst motives to people, Christians should be automatically hesitant to believe them without solid proof. And because they are inherently hard to prove, spreading conspiracy theories puts a Christian at risk of spreading falsehood.

But couldn't it still be true? Yes. It is a possibility. We live in a sinful world where people in power do often conspire for evil. Officials and experts can be wrong. But the question is, is it your responsibility and calling as an ordinary Christian citizen to prove and expose this conspiracy to the public? I can't rule out the rare possibility that you might be in that situation. But 99.9% of the time, no. You probably aren't the person God is calling to thwart a conspiracy. So, my humble advice is this: stay informed about what's going on, listen critically and with an open mind, and always keep the 8th commandment in mind. And when you've done your due diligence as a citizen, pray to God and be at peace. God can thwart evil and conspiracies in this world even without your help. And I think that's a comforting thought.



### 2023 Life Conference

The world today pressures people on all sides to reject God's design for human life.

The 2023 LCMS Life Conference, which is part of *Making Disciples for Life*, is set for March 2–3, 2023, in St. Louis and online. The conference will provide Lutherans with the resources to faithfully proclaim what God's Word teaches about life, health, marriage and family.

Presentations at the 2023 conference will focus on three main subject areas: advocacy for the sanctity of human life and God's design for marriage and the family; teaching God's Word to people of all ages so they learn the truth about life, health and family; and sharing Christ's love and mercy with a focus on life, health and the family.

### **In-person registration**

The in-person portion of the conference, which will be held at the LCMS International Center in St. Louis, is limited to 100 participants. Registration, which is \$49 per individual, includes meals and snacks. Attendees will also have access to view recorded sessions for 60 days after the conference ends.

The deadline for in-person registration is Feb. 17.

### Online registration

Online participation is unlimited. An online registration, which is \$29, can be used by an individual, couple, family or group. Registration provides access to view recorded sessions for 60 days after the conference ends.

Participants attending virtually can register until March 2.



Report on signage- Preparation for new sign is complete, just waiting for sign to arrive.

Brick sealing- the board has received 2 bids for the brick sealing project, 75k and 42k.

Roof replacement- Roof on gym and sanctuary are old but holding up as of now. Going to need work- only been resurfaced twice in the last 60 years.

Pastor Umbarger brought up the possibility of using a fund for building projects, some discussion followed.

Pastor conference to be held in October at St. Johns. Church getting new ceiling in Janssen Room, Keyl Room and front of church to be pressure washed.
