Christ's Suffering and Death Bring Division



Background: The lessons for this Trinity period have emphasized getting your priorities right. God wishes that every person will be saved and live with him in eternal Glory. Yet as Luther said, “We cannot by our reason or strength join with Jewus as our Lord and Savior. Without Christ, we are simply going to hell. So how do we find Christ and join with Him? We don’t! God the Holy Spirit is constantly calling us to repentance, to worship regularly, to use the Sacraments, be regular in our study of the Word, and lay up “Spiritual Treasure” as was discussed last Sunday. We recognize that Christ’s Suffering, death and Resurrection was all for us. So god’s plan of salvation for us is: He sent His son to be the perfect sacrificial lamb for all our sins, and enabled by the poser of the Holy Spirit, we confess our sins to God, asking for forgiveness, knowing that while we are still asking, He is already forgiving our Sins. Thus the message of the angels that first Christmas Day becomes a reality: we are no longer enemies or at war with God, but at PEACE with God.
