Message from Pastor John

The Beautiful Tension: When Justice Meets Mercy

There's a profound truth that often gets lost in our understanding of God's character: the delicate balance between justice, grace, and mercy. These three attributes of God aren't competing forces—they're complementary expressions of divine love that shape how we experience our relationship with the Creator and with one another.

Understanding the Difference

Let's start with three simple but life-changing definitions:

- **Justice is when you get what you deserve.**
- **Grace is when you get what you don't deserve.**
- **Mercy is when you don't get what you deserve.**

Reread those. Let them sink in because understanding these distinctions changes everything about how we view God and how we treat others.

Think about the last time a police officer pulled you over. Maybe you were speeding—perhaps significantly over the limit. You knew you were guilty. You deserved the ticket. That's justice. But if the officer let you go with just a warning? That's mercy. You didn't receive the punishment you deserved.

Now imagine that same officer not only let you go but also gave you a gift card for coffee and encouraged you to have a better day. That would be grace—receiving something good you absolutely didn't deserve.

The Cry from the Depths

The book of Lamentations provides one of Scripture's most raw expressions of human suffering. Written in the aftermath of Jerusalem's destruction, it doesn't sugarcoat the pain: "Life stinks. Life is unfair. My body is wrecked. I can't sleep. I'm broke. I'm overwhelmed with anxiety."

Sound familiar? Maybe you're in that season right now. Perhaps you feel like God doesn't even notice your struggle.

But right in the middle of this brutal honesty comes one of the Bible's most beautiful declarations of hope:

"The faithful love of the Lord never ends. His mercies never cease. Great is his faithfulness. His mercies begin afresh each and every morning."

This isn't cheap optimism. It's a hard-won faith that speaks truth in the darkness. Even when everything falls apart, God's mercy shows up fresh every single morning like manna in the wilderness.

The Problem We All Share

Ephesians 2:1-3 paints an uncomfortable picture of humanity without God's intervention: "Once you were dead because of your disobedience and your many sins. You used to live in sin just like the rest of the world, obeying the devil."

Strong words. But they highlight a critical truth: without Christ, we're subject to God's justice. And if we're honest, that's terrifying. None of us want what we truly deserve based on our thoughts, words, and actions.

But then come two of the most beautiful words in all of Scripture: "But God..."

"But God is so rich in mercy. He loved us so much that even though we are dead because of our sins, he gave us life when he raised Christ from the dead."

We should be grateful that God is not a "fair" God. If God operated purely on fairness and justice, we'd all be in serious trouble. Instead, God operates from a place of being "rich in mercy"—not occasionally merciful, not reluctantly merciful, but abundantly, extravagantly merciful.

Mercy from the Beginning

Some people imagine that God was angry and wrathful in the Old Testament but became loving and merciful in the New Testament. This is a fundamental misunderstanding of God's character.

Go back to the very beginning—Genesis chapter 3. God gave Adam and Eve paradise with one simple rule: don't eat from that one tree. They broke the one rule. What did God do?

God didn't strike them dead. God didn't abandon them. Instead, God sacrificed an animal to make clothing to cover their shame. Even in the moment of humanity's first sin, God's response included provision and protection. That's mercy operating from day one.

The Mercy Seat

When God gave instructions for building the temple—that sacred space where heaven and earth would meet—He was incredibly specific. Exact dimensions. Precise materials. Detailed descriptions of every room and feature.

But right in the middle of it all, God said to create a mercy seat—a place of atonement, a place where people could receive forgiveness and grace.

Think about that. When God designed the house that would bear His name, He put mercy at the center. Not judgment. Not condemnation. Mercy.

The message is clear: when you build your life in a way that honors God, make room for mercy.

The King Who Knew Mercy

King David—the man after God's own heart—had some really good days of following God. He also had some spectacularly bad days. When he realized his sins could bring severe consequences on himself and countless others, he made a telling statement:

"Let us fall into the hands of the Lord, for his mercy is great, but do not let me fall into human hands."

David understood something profound: God's mercy is greater than human mercy. God shows mercy more readily than people do.

And here's where it gets uncomfortable for those of us who follow Christ: we who have received the most mercy are often the least merciful toward others.

It sits right at the center.

The Mercy Crisis

One of the biggest obstacles to people embracing Christianity today isn't intellectual doubt or scientific questions. It's the perceived hypocrisy of Christians who claim to follow a merciful God but show little mercy themselves.

We're often high on justice and low on mercy. Quick to judge. Slow to forgive. Harsh in our assessments. Stingy with second chances.

James 2:13 declares boldly: "Mercy triumphs over judgment."

Not that judgment doesn't have its place. Not that justice isn't important. But when mercy and judgment face off, mercy wins. That's God's economy.

Making Room for Mercy

So what does it look like to make room for mercy in your life?

First, it means receiving mercy. This is harder than it sounds. We're wired to earn, to deserve, to prove ourselves worthy. Receiving undeserved mercy requires humility and trust.

Second, it means extending mercy. When someone hurts you, disappoints you, or fails you—especially repeatedly—mercy means not giving them what they deserve. It means choosing compassion over condemnation.

Third, it means starting fresh every morning. Just as God's mercies are new every morning, we can choose to release yesterday's grievances and begin again.

The Promise That Sustains

Whatever season you're in—whether you're thriving or barely surviving—this promise holds true: God's faithful love never ends. His mercies never cease. They're fresh every single morning.

.You may feel dead in your soul because of past mistakes. You may feel subject to judgment you know you deserve. But God is rich in mercy. Not stingy. Not reluctant. Rich.

Make room for that mercy. Receive it deeply. Then give it freely.

Because in God's kingdom, mercy doesn't just have a seat—it sits right at the center






Here are the highlights from the First UMC Council meeting held on Thursday, November 20

CELEBRATIONS:

- Jewelry Make & Take was a fun event and brought in \$400 for Mission Haiti. Many thanks to Myra Palmer for leading this event and donating her supplies and time!

- The Thanksgiving Connect was an entertaining, light-hearted

event for all who attended.

- Due to many other events happening in December, Wednesday Connect will reconvene Jan. 7, 2026.
- Four individuals attended the Area Charge Conference and submitted all necessary paperwork for the continuation of Pastor John's assignment in Worthington.

Mission Haiti update:

- \$2898 has been raised so far through fundraisers and some personal donations.

- Dec. 21 will be the last noisy offering

- 180 Operation Christmas Child boxes were filled by First & Adrian churches.
- Many events are still coming up this year:

- Bingo - Nov. 22

- Church decorating and lunch Nov. 23
- Ladies' Advent bible study begins Dec. 1

- Ladies' Christmas party – Dec. 5

- Cookie decorating during pre-church fellowship time – Dec. 7
- Christmas program—Dec 14

CURRENT FOCUS:

- Advent gift bags have been prepared and will be delivered by volunteers in the coming weeks.

- Church decorating will take place after the service Nov. 23.

Soups and desserts will be provided.

 Decorative "refresh" in Fireside room and Fellowship Hall update: rolling vs spraying of paneling in Fellowship Hall is being assessed. An electrician has been contacted but has not yet come to assess the lights in the Fireside Room.

CUTTING EDGE ISSUES:

 Prayer List: The council discussed and approved listing only the most recent prayer concerns (in last 2 weeks) in the Sunday bulletin. On-going/long-term prayer concerns will be listed in the Friday email, newsletter, and in a separate list available in the Narthex. This change will be initiated the first of January. Any individuals who would like to be removed from the prayer list may contact the church office.

- Concern for potential burnout of volunteers was voiced.

- It is common for a similar group of volunteers to be involved with many activities, and new/different volunteers would always be welcomed in helping carry out the mission of our church.

 During the last Trustees meeting, the repairs and updating of the Fireside room was discussed. Kyle Johnson will be assessing necessary repairs.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

There were some higher expenses earlier in the month for Congregational Care items. However, giving was up and two months' apportionments were paid; leaving \$4714 in past apportionments, plus December's to be paid.

- The council unanimously approved the purchase of a new computer (capped at \$750) for the Family Life position because the current laptop is very old and lagging.
