
Women's Coffee





Denominations from evangelical to mainline continue to experience deep

divisions over universal social issues. The underlying debate isn't about a particular social issue, but rather about how we understand the nature of scripture and how we should interpret it. The world's best-selling, most-read, and most-loved book is also one of the most confusing.

In Making Sense of the Bible, Adam Hamilton, one of the country's leading pastors and Christian authors, addresses the hot-button issues that plague the church and cultural debate, and answers many of the questions frequently asked by Christians and non-Christians alike. Did Jesus really teach that everyone who is not a Christian will be assigned to hell? Why would Paul command women to "keep silent in the church?" Were Adam and Eve real people? Is the book of Revelation really about the end times? Who decided which books made it into the scriptures and why? Is the Bible ever wrong? In approachable and inviting language?

Hamilton addresses these often-misunderstood biblical themes, leading readers to a deeper appreciation of the Bible so that we might hear God speak through it and find its words to be life-changing and life-giving.

Here are the highlights from the First UMC Council meeting held on Thursday, September 18

CELEBRATIONS:

All Church Gathering:

 What went well: The ice breaker was fun, the meal was enjoyable, and the Humble Servant award was a pleasant surprise for Pat Grimmius. Appreciation had been voiced for the lists of committees and their members.

- What didn't go well: Attendance wasn't great. The council questioned if this was due to timing, a lack of interest by church members (or perhaps not believing the meeting applied to them), and/or a lack of communication. The meeting had been communicated for a significant amount of time prior to the event via bulletins, email, and verbally during services.

- What should we do differently?

Stay away from King Turkey Day weekend.

A suggestion of a mailing (postcard?) was made to possibly reach those who primarily watch the service online and to help ensure everyone knows the importance of the meeting and that all are invited and encouraged to attend.

Communicate more often (particularly right before the event) with Pastor Angel and Lourdes to avoid a misunderstanding regarding facility use.

Guest speaker? There are pros and cons of this, depending upon how familiar the speaker is.

Connect – first event was held on Sep. 17

- **What went well:** Good turnout with 50+ individuals in attendance
- What didn't go well: Only one visitor from outside the church

- What should we do differently:

Turn on closed captioning in the video Feature The Chosen viewing in event advertising Ensure no one is sitting by themselves during dinner

CHALLENGES:

Filling leadership & committee openings

- The most urgent current need for members is the Memorial Committee.
- Some committees are limited in numbers by the Book of Discipline while others can have as many persons as are interested.

CURRENT FOCUS:

Family Life

Revisit at a later date: A question was raised by Pat G. about doing a decorative "refresh" on some rooms (particularly the Fireside room and Fellowship Hall) – paint paneling, contemporary artwork, shampooing carpet in multiple rooms. The question was asked if cleaning carpets is an expectation of the custodians or if it must be hired out (Grothes). Ellen cautioned that we must weigh the cost of supplies and carpet cleaning vs. apportionment payment needs

- Costs to consider: supplies (paint), carpet cleaning, electrician to look at enhancing lighting in the Fireside room.

 - Memorial gifts need to be offered to their family first if they

In its role as the administrative agency of the charge conference, it ensures that all aspects of the church's work are aligned with its larger vision. Additional responsibilities of the church council include reviewing membership within the congregation, filling vacancies on other program committees between charge conferences, collaborating with the finance committee to develop the annual budget, and reviewing recommendations from other committees.


