Understanding The Faces of Pocatello's Homeless

Who are the individuals on the streets of Pocatello? Is it true that all the homeless merely "pass through" our city, consuming vital resources? Are they all simply struggling with addiction, mental health issues, or a combination of both? Recently, one of our Board members heard a remark that encapsulates this misconception: "There aren't homeless people here... it's all fabricated."

These attitudes highlight a grim reality within our community regarding homelessness – many lack a true understanding of the issue. If they do have an opinion, it is often shaped by media portrayals, television, movies, or interpretations of situations observed in other cities. The truth is that homelessness takes various forms and differs from one community to another.

The individuals we see on the streets of Pocatello and Chubbuck are residents of our community. While we do encounter some with alcohol-related challenges, the majority of those living on the streets are neither addicted or grappling with severe mental health issues, although homelessness can undoubtedly lead to psychological struggles. Many of the over 80 individuals we have connected with this year alone are intelligent, eager to change and grow, and seeking a hand up rather than a handout. They find themselves in this situation due to various circumstances, including losing their home, job, facing a financially devastating medical emergency, or experiencing significant relationship challenges. They are real people with genuine problems, earnestly seeking real solutions.

Will Valley Mission be the ultimate solution? Perhaps not, but we will certainly be a part of the solution. It is crucial that we open this building as soon as possible to initiate real change in lives – one person at a time!

Building Progress: Next Steps

While we wait, there are plenty of little things that will be getting done.

Our construction crew is busy getting the rest of the sidewalk concrete poured out front, allowing us to clean up the exterior and get the planter beds ready for winter.

While we wait on sprinkler stuff, we've had the laundromat door and a window cut in the brick so the crew can get proper measurements and sizing for windows and room heater/AC units. We are also updating some the parking lot, removing the big planter in the middle and rearranging some parking spaces.

And we're getting ready to launch a new 'fun' way to raise some funds for the sprinkler system. You can check out the Valley Mission website for an update sometime in August.
