Psalms: From the Heart, Part V 10.5.2025

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Psalm 5 To the choirmaster: for the flutes. A Psalm of David. ¹ Give ear to my words, O Lord; consider my groaning. ² Give attention to the sound of my cry, my King and my God, for to you do I pray. ³ O Lord, in the morning you hear my voice; in the morning I prepare a sacrifice for you and watch. 4 For you are not a God who delights in wickedness; evil may not dwell with you. ⁵ The boastful shall not stand before your eyes; you hate all evildoers. ⁶ You destroy those who speak lies; the Lord abhors the bloodthirsty and deceitful man. 7 But I, through the abundance of vour steadfast love, will enter vour house. I will bow down toward your holy temple in the fear of you. 8 Lead me, O Lord, in your righteousness because of my enemies; make your way straight before me. 9 For there is no truth in their mouth; their inmost self is destruction; their throat is an open grave; they flatter with their tongue. 10 Make them bear their guilt, O God; let them fall by their own counsels; because of the abundance of their transgressions cast them out, for they have rebelled against you. 11 But let all who take refuge in you rejoice; let them ever sing for joy, and spread your protection over them, that those who love your name may exult in you. 12 For you bless the righteous, O Lord; you cover him with favor as with a shield.

"You must love the holiness of God more than your own sin. You cannot love God's holiness if you don't hate your own sin." ~ Pastor Phil

How do you find refuge in Him?

- 1. Peace in Forgiveness of Sin: Ephesians 1:7
 - God doesn't just cover sin. He erases the debt. Grace means our record is clean. Application: Stop dragging yesterday's guilt into your today. If He forgave you, rest freely in His joy.
- 2. Peace in His Presence: Exodus 33:14..."My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest."
 - Peace isn't the absence of trouble—it's the presence of God in the midst of our problems. Application: Don't ask God to stop the storm, invite His presence into your stress.
- 3. Peace Through Justification: Romans 5:1 Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.
 - To be justified means being declared righteous. Application: Stop trying to earn peace with God. Receive it. Jesus paid your debt.
- 4. Peace Through Prayer: Philippians 4:6 do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.
 - Worry is faithlessness in action, but prayer hands it to God and ushers in peace. Application: Replace "panic time" with "prayer time."
- 5. Peace in Bearing Our Burdens: Psalm 55:22
 - God shoulders what we can't. Application: If you're exhausted, maybe you've been carrying what He already said He'd carry.

6. Peace Through the Spirit: Romans 8:6

The Spirit reorders our minds toward life and peace.
Application: Like tuning a radio—He clears the static, so we hear His voice. If your spirit is restless, maybe you're on the wrong frequency.

7. Peace That Guards Our Heart. Philippians 4:7 And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

 His peace doesn't just soothe—it stands watch like a soldier at the gate. Application: Imagine an armed guard keeping intruders from your home. When anxiety knocks, let the Peacekeeper answer the door.

8. Peace Through His Word: Psalm 119:105

 Love for His Word roots us so deeply we don't trip over offenses. Application: A lighthouse warns ships in raging seas.
If your peace is shaky, take in Scripture. It's a lamp to your feet.

9. Peace in Loving Discipline: Hebrews 12:6

 Discipline is grace in action. Application: A gardener prunes the branches so the tree bears fruit. Don't despise correction. It's *shaping* you, not *breaking* you.

10. Peace Through Reconciliation: 2 Corinthians 5:18

Sin made us enemies of God, but grace reconciled us to Him.
Application: If God is reconciled with us, how can we hold grudges against others?

11. Peace in Our Weakness: 2 Corinthians 12:9

 His grace fills the cracks where we're weak. Application: Stop hiding your weakness; let it be a platform for His strength, like young David defeating mighty Goliath with a sling and stones.

12. Peace in eternity: 2 Thessalonians 3:16

Peace is not just for today, but a forever gift secured by Christ. Application: The joy of your salvation can be real because you know your destination. Live with eternity in mind, which is like using a compass. Instead of letting the temporary (comfort, applause, money, and even pain) set your direction, weigh choices against eternity (True North) and what won't rust, fade, or die. Perspective: You measure time by forever, not simply by the calendar. Priorities: What lasts takes precedence over what passes. Relationships over possessions, character over convenience, obedience over popularity. Posture: You carry lightly the world's trinkets because you know they're borrowed. You hold on loosely to what can't enter Heaven and hold tightly to your faith. Purpose: Treat all interactions as seed-planting, knowing that they echo beyond that moment. It doesn't mean ignoring the present but inhabiting the present fully with the horizon of forever in view.

How do I hate my sin and love God's holiness? Imitation vs. Intimacy: The True Power of Knowing Jesus. Acts 19:11–20.

I. The Difference Between Borrowed Power and Birthed Power:

God's power is never for show. Paul's miracles weren't human performances. God's holiness doesn't cooperate with your sin.

II. The Test of Authentic Authority:

Demons recognize true authority. Spiritual darkness knows when faith is real. They said, "Jesus I know... but who are you?" Imitation echoes words; intimacy carries presence.

Religious proximity is not relationship. Being a priest's son didn't make them sons of God. Heritage may introduce you to the temple but only surrender introduces you to the King.

III. The Exposure of Pretended Power:

God exposes hypocrisy for the sake of truth. He allows embarrassment to become enlightenment. Imitation gets stripped; intimacy gets strengthened.

Sin makes us spiritually powerless. When the vessel is unclean, even the right words fall flat.

IV. The Fruit of Holy Fear and Genuine Repentance:

The fear of God restores rightful reverence. The people saw, trembled, and honored the name of Jesus. Intimacy begins when fear of the Lord returns

True repentance destroys what once defined us. They burned their magic books. Intimacy with Christ requires cutting ties with every counterfeit comfort.

God's holiness cannot be shared with idolatry. Imitation adds Jesus to the shelf; intimacy bows before Him alone.

V. The Overflow of Intimacy:

Holiness magnifies the gospel. When sin is renounced, the Word "increases and prevails." Imitation drains influence; intimacy multiplies it.

God's kingdom advances through humility, not spectacle.

Paul healed quietly; the sons shouted loudly. God moves through hidden hearts, not headlines.

Sin promises control but ends in exposure. The sons of Sceva ran out naked — a picture of every pretender stripped of pretense. Intimacy clothes us with righteousness; imitation leaves us uncovered.

Closing Challenge: The seven sons of Sceva used His name; Paul knew His name. One imitated authority — the other abided in it. True power doesn't come from saying "Jesus." It comes from knowing and being known by Jesus. Weigh your choices against True North (what won't rust, fade, or die).

James 4:8 Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded.
