DON'T EAT ALONE

What Montreal taught me about the Gospel at the Table

"If you are eating alone, just take an open seat at the bar."

That's what the manager of Schwartz's Deli told me shortly after I landed in Montreal for a mission's exposure trip. Schwartz's Deli is a longstanding and beloved spot in the city, known for its kosher-style smoked meat.

When the manager discovered there were no seats available at the bar, he kindly sat me by myself at an open table for eight before walking off. Within a minute, six guys walked in and two seats at the bar cleared out. Wanting to be polite, I offered them my table and said I'd move to the bar instead.

They gave me an awkward "thank you." The short-order cook behind the bar looked at me with mild frustration, and the manager came back over and said, "You're not from around here, are you?" After nicknaming me "Texas," he patiently explained that Schwartz's Deli follows an open-seating policy—guests share tables with strangers.

The next morning, I told my new friend Raphael, a French church planter in Montreal, about the experience. He laughed and then helped me understand that sharing tables with strangers isn't just a Schwartz's Deli thing—it's a Montreal thing.

My independent American way of eating might afford me and my group a private table in public, but the French-Canadian culture has given Raphael many chances to make new friends around a shared table—and even to share the Gospel with them.

There's something deeply biblical about sharing a meal with a stranger. Common tables create uncommon friendships.

On Wednesday, November 19, South Main will host two Friendsgiving meals before Thanksgiving. Lunch will be served at noon (following the Twice-Fed schedule), and dinner will be held at 6:30 p.m. Both will feature the same menu—ham as the main entrée, since turkey tends to get all the attention the following week.

The dinner time has been adjusted to 6:30 p.m. because I've invited friends from two other churches to join us. Pastor Robert Thomas of Olivet Missionary Baptist Church in Houston's Fifth Ward will be coming with members of his congregation. Robert and I became friends shortly after Hurricane Harvey. Also joining us will be Pastor Leo Mendoza and members of Iglesia Cristiana Los Hechos, the Spanish-speaking congregation that meets in South Main's Family Life Center on Sundays.

If you'll be joining us for the evening meal, let me encourage you to sit at a table with friends you don't know yet. Get to know them as we eat and worship together in a unified, Christ-glorifying way.

If lunch works better for you, invite friends from outside South Main and show them how good it is not to eat alone—but to share time and a table with those who love Jesus.
