



A Time to Pray

“Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.” 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Prayer...When you see that word, what comes to mind? For many, an honest response might be, “Oh yeah, prayer... that’s something I need to do more often.” For many Christians, the practice of prayer is like choosing to exercise and eat the proper foods to be in good physical health. We know that by doing so we will benefit, but as our minds rewind 2025, we realize around March we lost our motivation and the physical consequences followed. In the same way, our practice or neglect of prayer impacts our life of faith with Jesus.

In a recent sermon, I shared about the “gospel of self-sufficiency” that is communicated to us constantly. This “fake gospel” tells us we can take care of things on our own, we don’t need to rely on anything or anyone. Instead, the good news of the gospel (in the Bible) reveals that we must depend on Jesus for our salvation and the process of sanctification (a devotion to Jesus) that follows. When we pray, we are in a sense “waving a white flag of surrender” to let the Lord know we depend on Him in all things.

In 1 Thessalonians 5:17 we read these three words: *pray without ceasing*. You might be wondering “How am I supposed to pray all day without stopping?” A better way to define this phrase is to maintain a constant, unbroken connection and conversation with God, making prayer your first response to any situation. This is how we reflect a life where we pray without ceasing and practice one of the spiritual disciplines that is God’s will for our lives.

Now that a New Year has arrived, I want to share two specific ways we will focus on prayer at Journey. First, beginning January 1, we will launch a 31 Days of Prayer initiative. Each day we will have a prayer focus to go deeper in pursuing our vision at Journey to Make Much of Jesus a reality.

Second, as we gather on Sundays for worship, we will launch a new sermon series titled “Great Prayers in the Bible.” This series will allow us to look at prayers in the Old and New Testament. We will see how David, Nehemiah, Jesus, and others interacted in prayer with God and how this can apply to our life of prayer.

I’m excited to begin 2026 with a focus on prayer and seeking the Lord individually and corporately as a church family! Whether you see yourself as a prayer warrior, or struggle to be a man/woman of prayer, I want to encourage you to begin right where you are. As we look ahead to the year before us, this is a “time to pray” to seek the Lord and trust His power to do what we can’t.

May this be a season where we maintain a constant, unbroken connection and conversation with God, where prayer is our first response in any situation. In doing so, we will practice and reflect the vision to **Make Much of Jesus** in ways only He can make possible!

Men Called to Faithful Discipleship

In every generation, God calls men to step forward—not in arrogance or bravado to make much of themselves, but in humility, obedience, and courage to **Make Much of Jesus**

Jesus. Jesus’ invitation to “Follow Me” was never casual. It was and remains a call to surrender comfort, lay down control, and live lives that point unmistakably to Jesus.

Faithful followership of Jesus begins in the heart, but it never stays there. When a man is truly following Christ, Jesus becomes central in how he speaks, how he works, how he leads his family, how he treats others, and how he responds when no one is watching. Being a man of God is not about appearing strong or having everything together; it is about living in such a way that Christ is clearly seen.

Our culture offers many hollow versions of masculinity—strength without sacrifice, confidence without character, power without responsibility. Jesus offers something far better. He shows us servant leadership, humility, obedience to the Father, and love that gives itself fully for others. When we **Make Much of Jesus**, our lives reflect His priorities rather than the world’s expectations.

Men, the church and the next generation do not need passive spectators. They need men who live visibly dependent on Christ—men who pray because they need Jesus, men who open the Scriptures because they want to know Him, men who repent because they trust His grace, and men who stand firm because their hope is anchored in Him. Faithful discipleship is not limited to Sundays; it is lived out in everyday faithfulness where Jesus is honored in both word and action.

² To **Make Much of Jesus** means choosing faithfulness over familiarity. It means refusing to drift with culture and instead anchoring our lives in Christ. It means pursuing holiness not to earn God’s approval, but because Jesus is worthy. It means walking in accountability and obedience so that our lives clearly point others to Jesus.

The question before us is both simple and searching: Are we **Making Much of Jesus** with our lives, or merely fitting Him into them? Faithful men order their lives around Christ, not around convenience, comfort, or personal success.

Now is the time to recommit—to prayer that exalts Jesus, to God’s Word that reveals Him, to Christ-centered community that reflects Him, and to lives that exist for His glory. We do this not to prove ourselves, but because Jesus is worthy of our whole hearts, our whole strength, and our whole lives.

“Be watchful, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love.” 1 Corinthians 16:13–14

As men of Journey Church, we commit ourselves to faithful discipleship so that in every area of life, together and individually, we **Make Much of Jesus**.

Let’s strengthen our faith-walk together in this new year by joining other men of Journey in attending the men’s breakfast planned for **February 7, 8:30a-10:00a**. More details will follow but for now, just know that we are much stronger when we fellowship together.
