



SERMON REVIEW

"Josiah's Reformation In Judah" (2 Kings 23: 1-29)

Last week Senior Pastor Richard Burguet emphasized that the failure of some parents to disciple their children often led to a pattern of bad kings ruling Judah by doing evil in the eyes of the Lord. Kings like Manasseh and Amon were too kingdom-focused rather than being God-focused. They failed to realize that good things will flow out of our lives when we allow God's word to penetrate our hearts. King Josiah, unlike his predecessors, decides to publicly read (vv.1-3) the Word in the Book of the Covenant that had been recovered from the temple. In doing so Josiah was renewing God's covenant and recommitting himself and the people to the Word of God which is an invitation to repentance and recommitment. All the people turned from their sin and pagan worship, and followed Josiah's lead to repent, renew and recommit themselves to God and his covenant (vv 4-20). They heard God's Word and were obedient and recommitted. They put hearing God's Word into action in their lives, fulfilling a 300- year prophecy made in 1 Kings 13:2. The process would be painful, but the benefits would be eternally significant. It would include renewing the long-forgotten celebration of the Passover which was a major sign of redemption that would come later with Jesus. Despite all Josiah did, the wrath of God would continue to burn because of all the evil done by Manasseh (vv. 26-27). Josiah knew his reforms could not turn away God's wrath, but he obeyed anyway because his obedience to God's covenant was genuine (see John 14:15). Eventually Josiah sins and pays the ultimate price (see 2 Chronicles 35:20-27), proving there is no earthly king who doesn't sin. Six centuries later Jesus, a sinless and perfectly obedient king, would reign. He sits at God's right hand and will forgive the worst of sinners if they humble themselves before him.



HISTORY OF HYMNS: "WHEN MORNING GILDS THE SKIES"

As has often been noted in this column, we would not have many of our favorite hymns without the work of skillful translators. When it comes to preparing a poetic translation that will be sung (rather than a literal prose translation), the result is actually a new poetic creation rooted in the meaning of another language.

This is the case with Edward Caswall's translation of the well-known hymn, "When morning gilds the skies."

One must start with the powerful interrelationship between the text and the music in this hymn. Usually thought of as a morning hymn of praise, the rising melodic motif complements the rising sun that "gilds the skies" of the early morning. Within two phrases we soar an octave above our starting pitch—indeed our voices ascend with the rising sun about which we are singing.

The melody ends on an unusually high note for hymns, proclaiming the text, "May Jesus Christ be praised!" These five words form a brief refrain that encapsulates the intent of the entire hymn. Furthermore, the singer must summon extra effort to sing these words, unabashedly broadcasting Christ as the center of our praise. Even the tune name, LAUDES DÓMINI (Praise to the Lord), captures this idea.

"Beim frühen Morgenlicht" (With the early morning light) is the opening line of the original German hymn. While we are uncertain of the exact origins of the text, it first appeared in *Katholiches Gesangbuch für den öffentlich Gottesdienst im Biszthume* (Catholic Songbook for Public Worship in the [locale of] Biszthume Würzburg). It appears in an altered version in an 1855 Franconian collection of folksongs, *Frankische Völkslieder*.

Caswall himself made two translations into English, in 1854 and 1858. An altered form of the 1858 version has become standard for most hymnals. Carlton Young points out that a stanza that departed from the original German, while revealing something of the style of the time, was better left omitted:

My tongue shall never tire
Of chanting in the choir;
May Jesus Christ be praised:
This song of sacred joy
It never seems to cloy;
May Jesus Christ be praised.

Distinguished English poet and translator Robert Bridges (1844-1930) tried his hand at improving the text, noting in 1899 that, "It is of great merit, and I have tried to give a better version of it than the current one, keeping the original metre, preserving the first lines of the old translation, since it is by them that the hymn is known."

So the hymn we sing today has 19th-century German roots, with a translation by Caswall (1814-1878), a Roman Catholic converted under the influence of Cardinal Newman and one of the foremost translators of hymns of his era, adapted by Robert Bridges, and set to music by English choirmaster Joseph Barnby (1938-1896).

The images of the rising sun carry over to the second stanza as the "night becomes as day" and the "powers of darkness fear." However, stanzas three and four switch from visual images of light to aural images "joyous with the sound" of praising Christ.

We may have been stirred initially by the sight of the rising sun in the first stanza of the hymn, but we conclude in stanza four by singing our "canticle divine"—which becomes our "eternal song though all the ages long" that amplifies our praise to Christ.
